Nearly \$80 million coming to county in 2025-26 state budget

It appears that Rockcastle County will be building a multimillion dollar recreational complex. It also looks like the State of Kentucky will purchase over 1,400 acres of land that will become a part of the new RGL (Rockcastle, Garrard, Lincoln) Industrial Park. According to the Kentucky 25-26 budget, the Rockcastle County School system will also receive \$13 million in supplemental funds so that the district can build

A 160-acre RGL Regional Industrial Park was recently purchased in Rockcastle County and is up for lease to industry with natural gas on its way.. Though the two sites do not connect, the additional 1,400+ acres would become a part of the RGL Regional Industrial Park.

The deal is not set in stone, however, it is close to complete. according Kentucky State Representative Josh Bray who sponsored the bill. The \$4+ million allocation for a recreational complex and the \$62 million for

the 1400+ acre property purchase as well as the \$13 million for a middle school has passed the House and is on its way to the Governor's desk.

Some expect Governor Andy Beshear may veto some line items. However, Bray says the House has the authority to override any vetoes the Governor may exercise, making the prospect that the budget will become law very high.

"Until it is a done deal, all I can say is we are extremely excited that we are in this position," said RCIDA (Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority) Executive Director Jeff VanHook. "This is huge and is made possible because of the extraordinary leadership of Speaker (David) Meade and State Representative and Vice Chair of Appropriations and Revenues Josh Bray. They have provided us with a transformational opportunity."

VanHook had been working for the past several years to create a regional approach to Rockcastle County devlopment and had located the 1,400 acres as an ideal location for industrial development.

VanHook, with the help of the RCIDA

The Moon is 400 times smaller than the Sun, and is 400 times closer to the Earth than the Sun, causing the two entities to appear the same size in the sky. Earth is the only planet in the solar system with that situation which allows for a total eclipse when the moon passes directly between the Earth and the Sun. Experts say there can be no such full eclipse on any planet discovered in the universe, except Earth.

The darkness caused by the Moon blocking the Sun is caused by the shadow the Moon casts onto the ground on Earth. Next Tuesday's eclipse will last slightly over three minutes and officials at the Rockcastle County School system are not going to let the op-

portunity go to waste. Officials plan to allow all students at each school to go outside during the historic event to view the eclipse. The school board has purchased safety goggles to be used by all students and faculty for viewing the eclipse since looking directly at the sun can cause permanent damage.

However, there is a safety issue being considered since there is no way for teachers or staff to guarantee that every student will keep those safety goggles on during the event. Parents are being asked to go to the school website and inform the school district if

Owners of local plant receive eviction notice

The Commonwealth of Kentucky has issued an eviction notice and notice of eviction hearing to Karl Crase of Microfoodery Holdings. LLC.

According to the notice, filed on March 11 by Heritage Way LLC, of Edwardsville, Ill., Crase signed a lease agreement for the commercial property in Mount Vernon, which houses the Microfoodery plant, on February 1 of 2022.

According to the complaint the lease required the tenant Microfoodery to pay \$25,000 per month rent.

However, the complaint says Crase failed to pay the lease amount from July of 2022 to February of 2024. The total amount of back rent and late fees owed to the plaintiff from defendant is \$444,093.68, the com-

plaint says. The complaint also has a note under "other violation of lease" reading "failure to pay property

According to RCIDA officials, and CVADD representatives the Microfoodery plant is in full compliance with all requirements of the million dollar CBDG grant provided to the company

There was outrage across the country when pResident Biden proclaimed Easter Sunday as "Trans Day of Visibility." Meanwhile the White House banned children from submitting religious-themed Easter Egg designs at annual event for military families. When asked by a reporter Monday about signing the proclamation, Biden said "I didn't do that," which means either he actually didn't someone on his staff did or he did it and doesn't remember it -- after all he is an "elderly gentleman with a poor memory."

Democrat New York Governor Kathy Houchul also issued a proclamation Saturday declaring March 31st. Easter Sunday, to be Transgender Visibility Day. She ordered state landmarks, including One World Trade Center in New York City and Niagara Falls to be illuminated in the colors of the transgender flag.

Transgender Day of Visibility was started in 2009 by an activist who chose the date of March 31. It is not a federallymandated day of observance, such as Vietnam Veterans Day.

Biden, and Democrat officials, decided to go ahead with observing the day on Easter Sunday this year, rather than push it off for a day out of respect for Christians who consider Easter the holiest day of the year.

I guess Democrats don't feel that those, passed legislation but a 10,000,000 (and counting) extra voters that have been welcomed illegally into our country

since January of 2021 (and who can obtain drivers licenses in many states which can then be used as ID to illegally vote in our elections), are enough to guarantee his reelection this November so they are courting the approximately 1.03% of the nation's adult population (according to USA Facts), that identify as transgender.

To all the youngsters out there who think about things like I did, I have a secret for you.

I always thought, "when I get older and bigger and tougher, things won't be as scary and I will take pain better." I got that notion from watching my dad who was the toughest man I ever knew.

Dad was a hard, hard worker. So, of course, he very often had a wrench slip or a board break or a ladder fall. But each time, I would witness the massive slice into his hand or finger and I would leap to my feet ready to call 911, or even the coroner. But instead, dad would shake his hand once and go back to work as blood was covering whatever he was working on. I've seen blood run down his arm and drip off his elbow and he just kept working.

As I felt my head swimming and was about to pass out, I could usually muster the quivery words, "are you okay Pop?" He would usually answer with "yeah I'm fine. Why?" He didn't even think it was important.

When I mentioned it, he would at least usually take the time to raise up his arm and look to see how much blood he was losing. If I hadn't said something, he wouldn't even have slowed down his

job. "Oh that. Yeah, it stings a little but it's too far from my heart to kill me." And back to work he would go.

So in my mind, I thought, it must be his age. Maybe 40 yearold men don't feel pain. Perhaps you go numb at 35 or so. I never once saw him do my "leaping up and down, hand slinging, scream" that ended in the fetal position. The more I could roll on the ground and flop around like a fish out of water, the more it seemed to help when I got hurt. And quitting work for the rest of the day went without saying. If I got hurt, my day ended

right there. Yet dad would slice his hand open and unless I pointed it out, it didn't seem to interrupt his day at all. I thought to myself that I couldn't wait to reach 35 or 40 years old so that things would stop hurting or I would be tougher.

Here is the big secret information, it wasn't age, it was dad's childhood and life experiences. I am well past 35 and everything still hurts just as much as it used to. You don't grow out of it.

As it turns out, my dad (as most of that generation) was just plain tougher than I am. As for my generation, I am ranked pretty

One man, Mike, remembered how he and his brothers dyed their eggs on the Saturday before Easter as they sat table. Of course, back then it was real eggs. Mike just knew that those colored eggs tasted better than any other eggs that were served any other time of the year.

I was telling him that Mom and I colored eggs that Saturday, too. She used her set of Fiestaware dishes. They were those dishes that everybody had

in which every place setting had a different color. She would put the blue dye in the blue cup, etc. You had a little tablet of dye that you placed in a cup and then added a teaspoon of vinegar to the cup and then hot water. You let the eggs soak for about three minutes each and then scooped them out with a little wire scoop that was included in the Paas egg coloring

On Easter Sunday morning, I could always look forward to getting an Easter basket that the Easter bunny had left during the night. He and Santa always seemed to work at night. I always picked Mom Grandma some Easter daffodils that grew in the vard to put on the dinner table for our Easter dinner. The Easter dinner was always sooo good. We usually had a good old ham, sweet potatoes. green beans, corn and deviled eggs. For dessert, Mom always made her special Easter cake. It was a white cake with her boiled divinity icing. Then she would decorate it with yellow Peeps and jelly beans in a nest of coconut dyed green to around their kitchen look like grass. This grass was all over the cake, too.

The following items may be recycled:

Newspapers w/inserts, magazines, catalogs, office paper, junk mail, shredded paper (needs to be bagged), books, phone books (paper products cannot be plastic lined or coated), cardboard (both corrugated and slick), plastics #1 Pet or Pete, plastics #2 HDPE, (no sheet plastics or plastic bags of any kind; no buckets or totes, no matter what number is on it), metal cans, aerosol cans, aluminum cans, aluminum foil, aluminum pie plates, glass bottles and glass jars (lids must be removed and discarded), old cell phones, car batteries, empty printer and toner cartridges, old computers (no monitors of any kind) and computer accessories, telephones, radios, digital clocks, (no televisions of any kind), rechargeable batteries (if the battery says rechargeable on it, then it is recyclable), and large bulky metal items.

Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Road Department Garage. Recycling Drop-Off Trailers are available for use at: Brodhead (behind City Hall)

(Continued from front) Board and Judge/Executive Howell Holbrook, Jr., and others, brought the idea for the mega-site located on US-150 and Spiro Road, to Frankfort officials.

Bray, who served as Mount Vernon City Administrator for several years, was elected as Kentucky State Representative in 2021 and has concentrated his efforts on providing funding for projects and growth in his district, said several local officials. Bray and Meade have now lobbied for and successfully included \$62 million in line item 177 of House Bill 1 "to the economic development budget unit to be distributed to RGL Regional Industrial Development Authority for the purchase of real prop-

If passed, the State of Kentucky would provide the funds to purchase over 1,400 acres near Spiro Road in Rockcastle County, to become part of the new RGL Industrial Park. The 160 acre regional industrial park is set aside for regional industrial development purposes and the additional

1,400 acres would be under the same RGL Board's authority as well. The line item continues on to say "the land shall be used only for purposes approved by the Cabinet for Economic Development and the Kentucky Economic Development Finance Authority."

Also included in the same budget, is line item 76 which includes \$4,667,000 over two years "to the Department of Local Government Budget unit to be distributed to the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court to support a recreational complex." Bray sponsored the bill and carried it on the floor saying, "this is an historic investment in the Commonwealth." Bray said the Spiro Road site has been noted as one of the top five sites in the country and its industrial development will be transformational for Rockcastle County and the region. "This is a big deal and we have to stay smart and make good decisions throughout the projects," he said.

Holbrook said he is proud to see the opportunity in the area. "David Meade and Josh Bray have been amazing assets for Rockcastle County and the region," he said. "We don't know who will take advantage of the mega-site yet but we know it is one of the best sites in the country and big things will happen from here," he said.

As for the recreational project, Holbrook and VanHook said if the bill is passed into law, officials will begin immediately with discussions concerning location of the complex and what type of recreational complex to build. "We have to think of the future," said Holbrook. "We have to consider upkeep and maintenance and more. That \$4.6 million won't be there when it comes time to pay the monthly bills. You can't use the money to build something that you can't afford to keep up. There are a lot of conversations coming soon."

Though Rockcastle County will receive the \$62 million for land purchase and \$4.66 million for a recreational complex if the bill is made into law, there was much more in the budget for Rockcastle County as

A long awaited goal of the local school board has

been to have the state fund school transportation. Finance Director Jenny Sweet has mentioned the desire at several school board meetings. This bill includes funding transportation after two years, Bray said.

The bill also answers a big complaint of all schools in Kentucky after the unfunded mandate to have an SRO (School Resource Officer) at each school campus. "The bill would provide \$20,000 for each SRO," Bray said.

The bill also includes SEEK funding increases from \$4,100 to \$4,326 per student in 2025 and \$4,586 per student in 2026.


To the relief of many who were hoping for a new Rockcastle County Middle School, the bill also provides an additional \$13 million for the construction of the new RCMS.

The board had fought to start a new RCMS project last year by acquiring grants and gathering funding for the project. However, bids were about \$4 million higher than expected and the project was tabled late last year. However, the additional \$13 million is expected to allow the board to begin the project. "This is even more than they need to build the new middle school," said Bray. "This was a real need for the Rockcastle County School District."

The bill also provides \$150,000 for the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame for new displays.

"This is a good budget that does a lot of good for the commonwealth." Bray said.

"This project and partnership will make a huge difference for Rockcastle, Lincoln and Garrard Counties, as well as our entire region. The investment lays a foundation for future economic development and job growth down the line," said Speaker Pro Tempore Meade. "I appreciate the hard work of Vice Chair Bray and our colleagues."

ing funds. "The \$60,000 grant just wasn't enough because we couldn't afford to pay for the rest of the project," he said.

However, recently, a new bid from different companies dropped to about \$260,000. "I have talked with the governor's office and they are pretty sure they can come up with the rest of the money for the project. If they don't we are not obligated to the project," he said.

Unless Holbrook signs the grant, the county will lose the \$60,000 grant. "I recommend we go ahead and sign the grant and try to get the rest of the project funded," he said. The request passed unanimously.

The court also realized that it had missed the last two quarters of program support to the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority (RCIDA) of \$25,000 per quarter. "Somehow it slipped through the cracks," said Holbrook. The court had agreed to pay \$100,000 per year to the RCIDA. The City of Mount Vernon provides \$12,000 per year to RCIDA for program support and they, too, were well behind but have now caught up, according to officials.

The court voted unanimously to pay the \$50,000 for the two

missed quarters. The court also agreed to pay claims totaling \$276,708, which were received since the last regular meeting. The total includes the \$197,314 for the Goochland Cave

Road project.

County Treasurer Vickie Miller requested a transfer of \$50,000 from the Occupational Tax fund to the General Fund. The request was approved unanimously.

Having no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Officials are still accepting vendors. Anyone interested in having a booth at the festival should contact Matt Whittaker at the high school as soon as possible to be included.





Social Security News

Administration announced it will decrease the default overpayment withholding rate for Social Security beneficiaries to ten percent (or \$10, whichever is greater) from 100 percent, significantly reducing financial hardship on people with overpayments.

"Social Security is taking a critically important step towards our goal of ensuring our overpayment policies are fair, equitable, and do not unduly harm anyone," said Martin O'Malley, Commissioner of Social Security. "It's unconscionable that someone would find themselves facing homelessness of unable to pay bills, because Social Security withheld their entire payment for recov-

ery of an overpayment." The agency works to pay the right people the right amounts at the right time, and Social Security issues correct payments in most cases. However, there is room to improve, as people count on the agency to prevent overpayments from happening and make it easier to navigate the recovery and waiver processes when they occur.

When a person has been overpaid, the law requires the agency to seek repayment, which can create financial difficul-


The Social Security ties for beneficiaries. As of March 25, 2024, the agency will collect ten percent (or \$10, whichever is greater) of the total monthly Social Security benefit to recover an overpayment, rather than collecting 100 percent as was previous procedure. There will be limited exceptions to this change, such as when an overpay-

ment resulted from fraud. There will be a short transition period where people will continue to experience the older policy. People placed in 100 percent withholding during this transition period should call Social Security's National 800 Number at 1-800-772-1213 to lower their withholding rate.

The change applies to new overpayments. If beneficiaries already have an overpayment with a withholding rate greater than ten percent and would like a lower recovery rate, they too should call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 or their local Social Security office to speak with a representative. If a beneficiary requests a rate lower than ten percent, a representative will approve the request if it allows recovery of the overpayment within 60 months - a recent increase to improve how the agency serves its customers from the previous policy of only 36 months. If the beneficiary's proposed rate would extend recovery of the overpayment beyond 60 months, the Social Security representative will gather income, resource, and expense information from the beneficiary to make a determination.

The agency also is working to reduce wagerelated improper payments by establishing information exchanges with payroll data providers that will significantly reduce the number of improper payments, once implemented (See Press Release | Press Office | SSA for more information). The agency will continue examining programmatic policy and making regulatory and sub-regulatory changes to improve the


overpayment process. Additionally, people have the right to appeal the overpayment decision or the amount. They can ask Social Security to waive collection of the overpayment, if they believe it was not their fault and can't afford to pay it back. The agency does not pursue recoveries while an initial appeal or waiver is pending. Even if people do not want to appeal or request a waiver, they should contact the agency

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







BLUEBERRY APPLESAUCE BREAD 1 large egg

1 cup unsweetened applesauce

1/3 cup sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

4 tablespoons light butter, melted-1 and 1/2 cups + 1 tea-

spoon all-purpose flour, divided 1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon baking pow-1/2 teaspoon salt

1 and 1/2 cups fresh blueberries, rinsed and dried

Pre-heat the oven to 350 degrees. Mist a 9" x 5" loaf pan with cooking

spray and set aside. In a large mixing bowl, add the egg, applesauce, sugar, and vanilla extract and stir together until well combined. Add the melted butter and stir together. In a separate mixing bowl, add 1 1/2 cups of the flour, the baking soda, baking powder, and salt and whisk until combined. Add the dry ingredients to the wet ingredients and stir together until just combined into a batter. Toss the blueberries in the remaining teaspoon of flour until coated. Fold the blueberries into the batter until combined. Pour the batter into the prepared loaf pan. Bake for 45-55 minutes until a toothpick inserted into the center

comes out clean. Transfer the bread in the loaf pan to a wire cooling rack and cool in the pan for 10 minutes. After 10 minutes, invert the pan to release the bread onto the cooling rack and then flip it over so that it's right side up. Allow the bread to rest directly on the rack until cool.

HONEY BLUEBERRY SHEET CAKE

1 cup sugar 1 cup canola oil 1 cup honey

3 large eggs 1/2 cup orange juice 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 3 and 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon salt

2 cups fresh or frozen blueberries

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease a 13 x 9-in. baking pan. In a large bowl, beat sugar, oil, honey, eggs, orange juice and vanilla until well blended. In another bowl, whisk flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt; gradually beat into sugar mixture. Transfer to prepared pan. Bake for 15 minutes. Sprinkle top of cake with blueberries. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean, 30 to 35 minutes longer. Cool completely in pan on a wire rack

of Jesus Christ brings us hope and has the power to free believers from the fear of death.

Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 15:1-19 the importance of the resurrection:

Paul is explicit in stressing that if the resurrection did not occur, then the entire faith is in vain. It signals the importance of the resurrection as the cornerstone of Christian belief. The fact that Jesus conquered death gives believers hope for eternal life.

We should never doubt the resurrection because there were Witnesses and evidence of it as Paul talks about various individuals to whom the risen Jesus appeared. This underlines the historical basis of Christian faith. It tells believers that their faith isn't baseless or grounded in myth, but in events witnessed and attested to by trustworthy individuals. Paul also speaks of his own grace and transformation. Paul's own story of transformation from a persecutor of the church to an apostle is a reminder of the power of God's grace. It shows believers that change is possible, no matter what their past has been. Paul's life itself serves as a testimony to the transformative power of the Gospel.

The message preached by Paul and the other apostles is with truth and is always consistent. This consistency in the message of the Gospel provides a sense of confidence and trust in the authenticity of the Christian faith.

There is truth in the Gospel and it reminds believers that the Gospel-the story of Christ's life, death, and resurrection-is the essential truth of Christian faith. It is upon this message that believers rest their faith. It reminds believers of the primary mes-



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
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Guest Column

"Church Importance"

Church is an important part of life for many of us. In the experience of "church" we are linked to a long and solemn tradition of witness, work and worship. My thoughts on this subject came from a couple of disconnected experi-

reading Chris Watlington's article in Center's Light and Champion newspaper around the year of 2012 on the

ences-one was

salvation of his son on Good Friday and his baptism on Easter Sunday. That wonderful story raised many fond memories of my own personal salvation and baptism many years ago, April 24, 1959, in First Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky. While that seems like "ancient history" now, it wasn't that long ago in the course of Christian history. The second important experience that triggered my thinking about "church" was historical. I was preparing to teach "Church History" during May Term in 2012 at East Texas Baptist University. I had been thinking about the discussion we always had about defining "church" and how it came into being. An important part of that discussion has to do with institution and organization across history and in

the present. This obviously has to do with the question of "what is church?" Is the church an institution? Is it an organization? Is it both? How does this relate to the collection of documents that we call "the New Testament?" When the church came into being during Jesus' ministry those many years ago there was no such thing as a "New Tes-

> tament." Jesus and His disciples obviously had a "Bible," the documents we know today as "the Old Testament." Jesus

knew and used the books that would ultimately be collected and arranged in the Old Testament. He quoted the Psalms, the Prophets and many of the other Old Testament books. He read and quoted from the writings of Moses. There are volumes about Jesus' life and witness, His quoting and referring to many of these ancient documents contained in the Old Testament. Jesus founded His church and He is still building it. The church is more than just a human organization or institution. It is an institution of sorts, but it is far more than just a formal, dulyconstituted, registered institution.

Church must also be considered as an organization. The very term "organization" obviously leans toward structure, authority, association, relationship. To some extent the church as an organization demands some kind of formal and ordered association. Institutions and organizations are human creations. The church is far more than what human beings can create and sustain institutionally or organizationally. Jesus said to Peter, "You are Peter, and on this rock, I will build My church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it" (Matthew 16:18). Jesus recognized Simon Peter, his personal confession of faith in the Christ and the revelation that the Father had given to him. It was this personal confession and faith that Jesus was referring to as being the foundation of His church, not the individual human being Simon Peter. The church is made up of living stones, individuals confessing the reality of Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.

The church is not just one person. The church is not just a human institution or organization. The church is a living body, an organic entity, manifesting the presence and power of the Living God through the living individuals who make up its being. This is how Paul expressed this fact to believers at Rome, "Present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service. We have many members in one body, but all the members do not have the same function, so we being many are one body in Christ, and individually members of one another" (Romans 12:1,4-5). Many years ago I wrote in the margin of this passage in Romans these words, "Many living sacrifices make one living body." The church is a "living body" bringing together many individuals, gifted and contributing, unselfishly sacrificing.

It is unfortunate that many refuse to make this "living sacrifice" in order to maintain the one living body that honors Jesus Christ. Hence we have so many human creations in churchly institutions and organizations. Of course, each of these creations think of themselves as "the church of God," "the church of Christ," "the assembly of God," "the Baptist Church," "the Christian Church."

There are many who identify the church with buildings and physical locations. The church is not just a physical location or facility. It is a living body made up of individuals who sacrificially join together to bear witness to the living Christ.

It is at this point that other questions should be raised—what is the church for? Why is the church important? What is the purpose of the church? When you drive around and look at church signs and properties you can determine a great deal by looking at


what you see physically and reading the signs. As you drive around East Texas you will often find in the church yard volleyball nets, playground equipment, fellowship halls, gymnasiums and other kinds of activity buildings. These kinds of items suggest that the church involves more than just spiritual, educational, worship kinds of things. In all too many cases the church is more "a social club" than it is a living, spiritual body.

In such cases the church has become more an entertainment, a recreation, an exercise, a social center than it is a worship or witness center. Thus people come, not to experience worship or witness, as much as to enjoy the music, perform or socialize. For many it is not what is believed, but what is enjoyed or experienced. The church is more like a social club, an entertainment center, a friendship experience or a place to perform for those who sing and play. This certainly isn't what one finds in the New Testa-

ment or what one finds historically in the records of the "primitive church." So much that we do today has nothing to do with what Jesus started during his ministry, even when we claim that what we are doing is what He would have us do.

There is so much more than can be said and shared about "church." I would be interested to know what you think about "church" and what it is. What do we say to the world in the facilities. the signs, the physical properties and the publications we distribute about our churches? Read Acts, 1 and 2 Corinthians, 1 and 2 Peter, and Colossians to gain more insight into what has been said here. Take some time to think about and respond to this column. Let me know what you think. 
