<u> Andrew Pensol</u> **New Mount Vernon City Administrator** to start in September

Rockcastle County's Andrew Pensol, has been named the new Mount Vernon City Administrator by unanimous vote.

Choosing the new Mount Vernon City Administrator, after the recent resignation of Jim Bowman, was an important job, according to Mayor Tim Roberts. "Making the right choice for the city was of the utmost importance to us," said Roberts. "It was not something we could take lightly. The city administrator plays a huge role in the daily operation of the city and we had to get it right."

So, though the person to fill the open position would be recommended by the mayor, Roberts enlisted those who were very familiar with the position to help him choose the right candidate. "I put together a committee to help interview each of the three candidates," he said. And Roberts picked three helpers who know the job well.

The interview committee included Roberts, past city administrator and State Representative Josh Bray, past city administrator Jim Bowman and Mount Vernon City Attorney Bobby Amburgey. "This was a group that knew exactly what it would take to make the best city administrator and I appreciate their help," said Roberts.

The team interviewed three candidates and Roberts said all three had very positive attributes. "It was a very difficult choice for all of us," he said. "Each person had skills that would benefit the city."

However, in the end, Pensol was the final choice. "We just felt with Andrew's background in federal and state work and his experience with emergency management, that he had more of what the city needs. We all finally agreed that Andrew was the best choice. But it wasn't easy."

Arson victim arrested after short search

According to a press release from the County Attorney's office, Nancy Howard, 39, of Brodhead was arrested last week after a short search.

The release says Howard was the victim of an arsonist at her home earlier in the week but fled the residence before first responders arrived, due to having an active arrest warrant. (Two suspects in the arson are still at large.)

Mount Vernon Police located Howard at a local hotel and served the arrest warrant on Wednesday, July 24 adding additional charges to her warrant.

Howard was transported to the Rockcastle County Detention Center where she was charged with tampering with physical evidence, promoting contraband, pos-

Wash Day Dear Journal,

Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, etc. However, Washday, where does that fit into the days of the week? When I was a little girl growing up back home, my mom would always speak of "wash

day" and not knowing any better, I thought this was a weekday. I remember, too, that it was a dreaded day. Looking back on it

now, I can understand why. Mom and my grandma always worked together in doing the family wash. There were six of us with clothes that required washing. It began in the mid-morning and continued most all day, if not continuing into the next day. The dreaded process began in Grandma's basement with an old Maytag wringer washer and the clothes being separated into whites, colors, etc. I was always on hand to help. I would help sort, carry water and rinse. We

had an electric pump that brought water into the house and a water heater that supplied our hot water. There were water faucets there in the basement, as well, with hot and cold running water not too awfully far from the washer. It took about five or six buckets of water to fill the washer with the desired amount of water.

Then wash powder was added and/or bleach .Gradually, through the years, bleach was phased out. There was a product called "blueing" that aided in whitening the whites. I never understood how something as blue as ink could make anything white. The clothes would wash for a bit, then the wash water was drained out through a spout and back into the bucket and carried across the basement to a drain. Then began the filling of the



Livingston officials working hard to upgrade water system

The City of Livingston is getting closer to having a greatly improved water system, according to city officials.

Deficiencies in the Livingston water system have caused a lack of grant monies for the city for decades, according to Mayor Sandi Singleton.

Officials are currently involved in several meetings with Rural Water and with the Division of Water to better understand what needs to be done to bring the system up-todate and become eligible for grant funding. "We have met with a lot of water experts and we have learned a lot about what the system may need to conform to all guidelines,' said Singleton. According to Singleton, and City Clerk Samantha Smoker, the city water system must meet certain requirements to be eligible for available grants. "Our biggest problem right now is finding a certified operator," said Singleton. "There is a real shortage across the state. But we are searching and

we will find one." According to Singleton, city officials are now waiting on a letter from the Division of Water that will detail what upgrades and improvements must take place for the local system to conform to requirements. "Once we get that letter, we will have a much better idea what needs to be done," Singleton said, "We already know we have cross connections and valve issues. Once we get the upgrades completed, we will be one signature away from getting grant funds to completely upgrade our water tank and valves."

Singleton says once the city is aware of exactly what upgrades are needed, and has a timeline for the work, she will inform the public of plans to proceed. Singleton says she has full confidence in current officials and she is looking forward to bringing the system up-to-date. "It has been a long time coming but we are moving forward now and soon we will have a much better system."

School bus safety tips for back to school 2024

Electrical dangers are everywhere, even on the school bus or at the bus stop. And Jackson Energy wants to remind students and parents that even something that seems like a minor risk in the moment could end up



With your children, plan the different scenarios they could find themselves in. If your children must exit the vehicle, advise them to always listen for instructions from first responders or the bus driver.

In an emergency, the kids on the bus may need to jump out of the vehicle, with both feet together, avoiding contact with the bus and the ground at the same time. Then, they should shuffle away with small steps, being sure to keep both feet together and on the ground at all times until at least 40 feet away. This will reduce the risk for electrical shock or electrocution.



Rockcastle County CSEPP and was being trained as co-director of Rockcastle County Emergency Management since CSEPP is ending soon. However, when Bowman resigned his position as city administrator, Pensol was approached to fill the position and decided to accept the offer.

debt, plus penalties and fees, from the property owner. Once the debt is purchased, those with delinquent taxes no longer owe the county but instead now owe whomever bought the debt.

According to Allen, anyone is eligible to purchase the debt as long as they are registered with the county or with the Department of Revenue if they are buying more than three debts or spending more than \$10,000. Allen also said there is legislation capping the amount that a third party can add onto a tax bill for collection.

That purchaser may then begin collection from the property owner, after they have added their own fees and expenses to the total bill.

Allen said the debt is paid in full to the county when a tax debt is purchased by a third party so that the county collects the taxes owed in most cases. "There are always some that do not sell for one reason or another," said Allen. "There are always some taxes that aren't collected and no third party purchases them, but the county then has the option of forcing the sale of that property or pursuing collection."

Allen said all property owners should make certain their tax bill is paid. "There are times a contract calls for the buyer to pay those taxes. But then if they don't for any reason, it is the seller who name is associated with the delinquent tax," she said. "At the same time, some contracts call for the seller to pay the taxes. Sometimes the seller doesn't and a lien can appear on the property you just purchased. Everyone who bought or sold property in 2023, should contact our office and make certain their taxes got paid. Even if someone else was supposed to pay it, they better see that it was done."

Anyone whose name was published last week, may still pay the taxes due before a purchaser adds fees and penalties to the amount due. Anyone may pay off their delinquent taxes until the close of business at the county clerk's office on August 26. No payments will be accepted after that date.

Allen said all 120 Kentucky counties work in much the same fashion and tax bills are sold to third parties,

plied that since the lane does not meet the requirements to become a city street, the city may be out a large expense to bring the street up to city requirements.

It was also pointed out that if the city accepts the lane into the city maintenance program, there could be many others who may make similar requests, potentially costing the city massive funds to bring all roads up to code requirements. Lewis argued that she believes the city should not accept a street that does not meet city requirements. In a previous meeting, Lewis suggested the city had voted

However, since Higher Ground Lane leads to a cemetery (Crest Haven Cemetery), council members Gertha Mink and Wayne Bullock, among others, argued that providing a maintained lane leading to the cemetery should be something the city offers to its citizens. Bullock made the original motion to accept the street, regardless of it's current condition and Mink made the motion to approve the second reading of the ordinance last week.

VanWinkle spoke up during discussion of the motion asking about the finances involved. "Are we taking on great financial costs and how many other roads fall into this category?" he asked. "I don't understand how we can take on this road and not others."

However, Mink said the cemetery makes this lane different than others. State Representative Josh Bray, who was also present at the meeting, said roads leading to a cemetery are indeed "treated differently under the statute."

** Bullock seconded the motion by Mink which then passed 4-2 with VanWinkle and Lewis voting against the motion.

voting against the motion.

The council then entered a lengthy closed session to discuss the appointment of a new city administrator. Upon reopening the meeting, Andrew Pensol was named to fill the position. (see related story.)

Lewis then presented a Municipal Order dealing with the "Conduct at City Council Meetings" in the City of Mount Vernon.

"To my knowledge this is the first municipal order the city has done. I used a template from another city and changed two or three things to meet Mount Vernon-specific meeting times and such things," she said.

The six-page order provides standard procedures and practices as well as definitions of the role of the Mayor and council members and proper meeting procedures.

dures. "We don't need a vote tonight. This is to look at and we can discuss any part of it and change whatever we need to change," she said. (See related story).

The council also heard the All America Club report of trash picked up by the club throughout the city.

The council also heard a report from the Mount

Vernon Fire Department. According to the report, the department made 55 runs in June using 6,250 gallons of water. Of those runs, there were two structure fires, 21 accidents, six illegal burns, four coroner assists and many other calls.

The Mount Vernon Police Department reported 407 total calls in June. Of those calls, 34

were vehicle accidents. There were 27 total arrests, 14 drug charges, 20 traffic violations and nine warrants served, among other calls.

Having no further business, the meeting was adjourned. The next regular meeting is scheduled for Thursday, August, 15 at 6 p.m. at City Hall. The public is invited to attend.

Lewis presents new Municipal Order for council discussion

Members of the Mount Vernon City Council met recently with two attorneys from the Kentucky League of Cities (KLC) to discuss "City Governance 101." The attorneys provided a presentation concerning the role of mayor, as well as sitting city council members, and answered questions from council members concerning proper meeting procedure and proto-

Council members agreed the presentation was useful and, as a result of the detailed information, council member Shelly Lewis created a new Municipal Order providing procedure and protocol for meetings of the Mount Vernon City Council, She presented it to the council at a special called meeting last Thursday evening.

The order was presented as a draft so that members of the council, and the mayor, may make suggestions or changes before any official action is taken, according to Lewis.

Lewis explained that she used a template from a similar city but made a few minor changes to meet Mount Vernon-specific requirements.

According to the order the "aim of this Municipal Order is to provide guidance and ensure that city council meetings of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky maintain order and complete city business in a professional, successful and constructive manner."

The six-page order provides details concerning all aspects of city council meetings and the role of those involved, as well as communications with the public.

The order lists duties of the presiding officer (mayor) as well as the legislative body (council) and the city clerk. The order lists the city attorney as the parliamentarian who gives explanations or advice on procedural matters.

The order also describes protocol for creating an agenda and notifying council members and the media of upcoming meetings.

The order also addresses public comments during official meetings. According to KLC attorneys, the city is not required to allow members of the public to speak at a meeting. However, the order includes listing recognition of groups or individuals as an option, if the council agrees to include such an item on the

agenda. The order goes on to suggest that comments of individuals be limited to three minutes if there is a group of guests or ten minutes if there is only one individual.

The order also describe many types of motions, including subsidiary, privileged and incidental motions and standing rules for meeting etiquette.

The order includes many other aspects of council meeting protocol and officials say the order will help keep the city more transparent and efficient.

Lewis suggested council members, and the mayor, study the draft order and come to the next meeting with suggestions. The order would be put to a vote after all have agreed on the wording within the order.

According to American Legal Publishing, (ALP) a municipal order is a less formal means of establishing rules and procedures without the need of an ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY ACCEPTING THE DEDICATION OF HIGHER GROUND LANE WITHIN THE CITY AS A CITY STREET AND PUBLIC WAY FOR ALL PURPOSES

WHEREAS, there exists in the City a certain street known as Higher Ground Lane which has been continuously open to the unrestricted use of the general public as a City street for a period of time well in excess of five years; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the provisions of KRS 82.400 such unrestricted use of Higher Ground Lane by the general public gives rise to a conclusive presumption that Higher Ground Lane has been dedicated to the City as a public way; and


WHEREAS, the City Council for the City of Mount Vernon finds it to be in the public interest that such dedication of Higher Ground Lane as a City Street and public way be accepted by the City; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED that the dedication of Higher Ground Lane, a street within the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky running from its intersection with Limestone Street to the entrance of Bible Baptist Church and entrance of Cresthaven Memorial Cemetery, be, and the same hereby is, accepted. Higher Ground Lane shall henceforth be a City Street and public way for all purposes

This Ordinance shall be effective immediately upon its adoption after second reading and publication in accordance with the requirements of applicable Kentucky law.



Mount Vernon receives two more grants this year

Members of the Mount Vernon Fire Department have announced the receipt of two more grants. "Such grants improve services for all residents with minimal impact to local taxpayers," said Chief Adam Bales.

The latest grant came from the Kentucky Division of Forestry to

provide assistance in purchasing equipment used to fight forest fires. Officials say the grant was a 50/50 match totaling \$3,692, meaning the department provided \$1,846 and the grant provided the remaining \$1,846.

The grant was used to purchase chain saws and PPE for chain saws, backpack blowers and hand tools used in

fighting forest fires.

The second grant was awarded from the Kentucky Fire Commission that provided protective gear for three firefighters. The gear includes helmets, hoods, gloves, boots, coats and pants that are made specifically for firefighters.

This grant was a 100% grant and totaled \$9,000, with no financial responsibility from the department.

Bales said the recent grants bring the total grant awards from both state and federal sources to about \$750,000 since 2009.

Officials say the department is working to secure other grants at this time. "We will continue to pursue every opportunity available for additional funding to improve the services we are able to offer to citizens and better protect our community," said Bales.

Officials expect more grants that will help the department better serve the community for years to come.



In fact, the key difference between a mere wish and a reality is good oldfashioned hard work combined with determination and a dash of talent. I firmly believe that. Rockcastle history is full of individuals who are cut from that cloth. Rockcastle County has several heroes who have the gumption, the stick-toitiveness, the strength of character, and the will to have a dream and then work hard to go after that dream to make it a reality. George Washington Payne was one such individual, one such Rockcastle Countian cut from that fabric of American stubbornness not to give up. George Payne is the only baseball player out of Mt. Vernon to make it to the big leagues.

George Washington Payne was 5' 11, 172 pounds. A right-handed pitcher. According to the website, Baseballreference.com, Payne's baseball career began in 1913, at the age of 24. He played one game for the Charleston Sea Gulls, a minor league team of the South Atlantic League that year. From 1913-1920 he played for different minor league teams. Binghamton Bingoes, in New York State, the Warren Bingoes, the Marshalltown Ansons, The Des Moines Boosters, and the Nashville Volunteers. He did not play in 1918, due to his military service. Another source, Carl Bunch. Payne's great-nephew, says in a response on the bill37mccurdy.com blog site, corrected some previous information. He states, "his career started in 1914 with the Charleston Seagulls and ended in 1940 with Columbus, Ga., In 1913 he was in the Army stationed at Fort Moultrie, Sullivans Island S.C., playing for the Army team which is how he became a Seagull. He also had the minor league record averaging just 1.5 walks per nine innings



Sox. He pitched sixteen games in all for the White Sox. That year the White Sox played 154 games, won 96 and lost 58 in the regular season. They finished second overall. On a side note, this was just one year after the 1919 Black Sox Scandal. The year that members of the team conspired with gamblers to rig the outcome of the 1919 World Series. (Rockcastle's hometown hero was not a part of that dark spot in White Sox history.)

That year, the signal published this: "PAYNE PITCHES SOX TO VICTORY OVER COLONELS SCORE Is 6 to 3 in Chilly Game at Louisville" ON FRIDAY

APRIL 16, 1920. The article goes on to report the following: "George Washinton Payne and his White Sox mates defeated the Louisville Colonels this afternoon, 6 to 3. The Colonels had walloped the Philadelphia national the day before and were a cocky bunch when they took the field. Their attitude soon changed, however, and they were thoroughly tamed at the finish. It's a good thing for Payne that he won his game. Mrs. Payne came in from the home in Mount Vernon, KY to see her hubby perform. She had never seen him in his baseball uniform, but allowed that from now on she is a baseball fan. The Colonels didn't score on Payne until the sixth inning. The Sox 🔊 had the game sewed up 6 to 0 when the home sixth rolled around. Payne eased up a bit and before he and his mates could get the Colonels out. Til this inning, Payne had allowed only two hits. I put in the hard work to

allowed three hits in the sixth. George is one of our local boys and has many friends here who rejoice over his success."

After his short stint in the Majors, he returned to the Minors for the remainder of his career. The website https:// bill37mccurdy.com/ has a detailed article on Payne titled "George Payne: An Oldie But Goodie!" the article reports some of the stats for Payne from 1922 to 1940. "Payne is in double digits for the win column every time, reaching twenty-plus wins in half of those years. A 28-12 record with Wichita Falls in 1929 eventually lands Payne with Houston in 1930, via a short early stay in the spring with Indianapolis. George Payne went 13-10, with a 3.51 ERA, for the '30 Buffs. Following his 23win year in 1931, Payne worked three more years for Houston (1932-34), winning 18, 19, and 13 games. He won 15 and lost 7 for his last doubledigit win year at Class C Springfield in 1935. After laying out during the 1936 season, Payne returned for eight more wins over three final years in the lower minors (1937-38, 1940) before hanging 'em up for good at age 51." He included an addendum from Tony Cavender, "George Payne won 348 games in the minors and collected 307 hits in his long minor league career. He was able to play through the Depression, which must have been a motivator."
