
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

Three homes burn this week



Three homes were destroyed in the past seven days due to fire. Members of the Mount Vernon Fire Department were dispatched to a residential fire on Maple Grove Road in Mount Vernon Monday morning (shown above). Upon arrival, firefighters found the structure fully involved in flames. The Climax Fire Department was second due and also provided mutual aid and the Livingston Fire and Rescue was called for extra manpower and an extra tanker. The home was a total loss but no injuries were reported. Officials say the residents of the home were not home and found the fire upon returning at 12:30 a.m. Approximately seven dogs and four birds were lost in the fire. Firefighters cleared the scene but the homeowners have requested an investigation into the blaze. Last Friday, firefighters also battled a mobile home blaze (shown below) on Floyd Street in Mt. Vernon. This home, owned by Peggy Mills who owns several rental properties, was also a total loss and an investigation is underway. Firefighters were then called to another mobile home fire Tuesday morning which resulted in another total loss. The MVFD, Western Fire Department and Brodhead Fire Department battled the blaze for three hours on Acorn Fork Road. Two firefighters were transported to the hospital for injuries sustained during the Tuesday fire. The condition of the two firefighters is not known at presstime.



Speakers coming jail revival

Vandals damage Brodhead Fairgrounds with county's own stolen equipment

The Signal recently reported increased vandalism and increased police presence in watching for vandals in Rockcastle County. According to Judge/ Executive Howell Holbrook Jr., a few days after the report, more vandalism was found at the Brodhead Fairground.

According to Holbrook, work crews had left a construction loader, also known as a "Bobcat," inside the fenced in area near the Brodhead Fairgrounds. "No one dreamed vandals would break into the locked fairgrounds and use the Bobcat," said Holbrook.

According to reports, the suspect(s) started the Bobcat with the key that was left in the ignition and broke through the garage door of the Fairground Pavilion

building. Once inside the vandal(s) damaged equipment and materials that was inside the building, including the bleacher system.

Holbrook met with insurance officials last week to determine the damage. Though exact cost estimates were not available at press time, rough estimates indicate the cost of the project may increase the crime


Somehow, we are going to have to get past our bias and social influence and look at things as human beings again. In today's


world, one has to be open minded to see past the rhetoric and propaganda and see the truth.





Luke 18:10-14 tells us two men went up to the temple to pray: the one a pharisee and the other a publican.



(Continued from front) have revival in the dark places of Rockcastle County." Two days later Carter called Cromer with an idea. The two worked out details with help from above, according to Cromer, and now the First Annual Rockcastle County Jail Revival is scheduled for Saturday, September 2 at the local detention center courtyard.

"Everyone is invited and it will give families a chance to come be with there loved ones and have revival," said Carter.

The inmates will be inside the fenced area at the courtyard and seats will be provided outside the fence. "Families will have the opportunity to see their family members be saved. That's something they wouldn't want

to miss," he said. Carter said he had been thinking about starting the program since each Sunday he watches the inmates on his cell phone through jail security cameras. "I see these grown, tough men crying like babies and testifying before a room of people with their hands in the air," he said. "They need this kind of opportunity."

So, Carter contacted Cromer, who said he, too, had just started praying about the issue.

Cromer is also working on several other Christian projects, including the first ministry church in India, his Apostolic Facebook page alongside his work at the local church. "God just told me to go to the dark places in Rockcastle County and 'collect what is mine' and then Nathan called and this revival

was underway," he said. Carter said church services are held five nights each week at the local jail and Cromer visits to perform baptisms regularly. And, with this new program, family members and anyone else who "wants to hear God's Word in a ministry lineup that we have ready, can join us."

needed equipment.

According to Carter and Cromer the line-up includes quite the top names in Christian ministry in Kentucky. "Maybe with this revival, some of our people can turn their life around," said Carter. "I have seen it many, many times. Once they get out of jail they live a different kind of life altogether and I hope these guys never darken my door again."

Carter and others involved say some critics may protest or complain about the spreading of God's Word outside the church, but these dedicated Christians will not back away from what they believe to be a calling from God Himself.

Some critics also may suggest that some inmates use such services only to get out of their cell. Carter says that's fine with him. "I'm sure there have been some who may go to our services just to get out of their cell," he said. "But I have seen it with my own eyes. They may start out that way, but God can touch their heart no matter why they came. Just because someone may have backslidden and came to jail doesn't mean they can't be a Christian. Nor does it mean they end up in jail. This may just be the stepping stone they needed."

So now, beginning at noon on September 2 Carter will address anyone and everyone who wants to hear the word or join their family in a revival service. At 12:30 Brian and Tassa Cromer will provide opening service and then at 1 p.m. Steve Robinson of the Rockcastle County Detention Center Chapel will speak. Beginning at 1:30 Chris Miller of Rock Strength and Fitness will speak and at 2 p.m. Brian Gabbard, Jackson County Jailer, will speak to those present. At 2:30, local pastor Randy McPheron will speak and at 3 p.m. Darren Allen, wellknown motivational speaker, will address those present. At 3:30 Pastor Robert Miller will speak until a break at 4 p.m. At 5 p.m. David Fletcher will provide a motivational speech and at 5:30 Brian Cromer will close the event.

"We have it scheduled to end at 5:30 but we do what God leads us to do," said Carter. "If it lasts longer, it lasts longer. Who are we to get in the way of God's plans?"

Carter says he is not familiar with another annual program such as this at any jail in the state but he hopes the event will grow and spread to other jails around Kentucky and even further. Anyone who would like to visit Cromer's message is invited to go to Apostolic Forge on Facebook.

According to Davis, VanZant was the passenger and the owner of the





Cover Crop Guidelines

The Farm Service Agency (FSA), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and Risk Management Agency (RMA) worked together to develop consistent, simple and a flexible policy for cover crop practices.

Cover crops, such as grasses, legumes and forbs, can be planted: with no subsequent crop planted, before a subsequent crop, after prevented planting acreage, after a planted crop, or into a standing crop.

Termination:

The cover crop termination guidelines provide the timeline for terminating cover crops, are based on zones and apply to non-irrigated cropland. To view the zones and additional guidelines nrcs.usda.gov/wps/portal/nrcs/main/national/ landuse/crops/ and click "Cover Crop Termination Guidelines."

The cover crop may be terminated by natural causes, such as frost, or intentionally terminated through chemical application, crimping, rolling, tillage or cutting. A cover crop managed and terminated according to NRCS Cover Crop . Termination Guidelines is not considered a crop for crop insurance purposes.

The intended use of cover only will be used to report cover crops. This includes crops

Reporting:

that were terminated by tillage and reported with an intended use code of green manure. An FSA policy change will allow cover crops

Program eligibility for the cover crop that is being hayed or grazed will be determined by each specific program.

If the crop reported as cover only is harvested for any use other than forage or grazing and is not terminated properly, then that crop will no longer be considered a cover crop.

Crops reported with an intended use of cover only will not count toward the total cropland on the farm. In these situations, a subsequent crop will be reported to account for all cropland on the farm.





Camp Nelson stages biggest Civil War event of the year

Camp Nelson National Monument will stage their biggest Civil War event of the year beginning on the afternoon of Friday, August 11 and continuing through Sunday, August 13 in Nicholasville.

The event commemorates the 160th Anniversarv of the Knoxville Campaign when the Army of the Ohio launched the East Tennessee offensive from Camp Nelson. The campaign successfully liberated civilian Unionists who had suffered under Confederate occupation since

"The Knoxville Campaign is what first put Camp Nelson on the map as a supply depot in 1863," said Camp Nelson Park Superintendent Ernie Price. "It's our biggest event of the year."

"There will be soldiers set up in encampments where you can walk in and talk to the soldiers and refugees and see the equipment they were using to live day to day," Price said.

The commemorative weekend features immersive living history demonstrations and programs, ranger guided tours, history presentations, horses and children's activities.

Visitors can visit an authentic Civil War era photography booth and a Civil War sutler store. Tables and tents will be set up throughout the park with activities and information about Camp Nelson history and the Junior Ranger program, in addition to the visitor center museum, barracks exhibit, and interpretive walking trails.

During the Civil War, Camp Nelson was a large supply depot created under orders from Major General Ambrose Burnside who was the Commander of the Army of the Ohio, a district that included Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin Ohio and Kentucky.

"General Burnside was stationed here at Camp Nelson just prior to his Knoxville Campaign which he began in August of 1863," said Dr. McBride. "In fact, one of the reasons for the construction of Camp Nelson was as a supply depot for that campaign."

"Someone entering Camp Nelson in 1863 would see a very busy and active depot" said Dr. McBride. "There were roughly 300 standing wooden buildings here. The camp was an industrial center. It had a shop which manufactured wagons and harnesses, shoed horses, made hardware, had a sawmill and a woodworking shop. These shops provided materials or means of transportation to provide soldiers with the supplies they needed."

"When Camp Nelson was occupied between 1863 and 1866 there were typically between two and eight thousand Federal soldiers here," said Dr. McBride. "There were also between one and two thousand civilian employees."

"The story of the Civil War is not just told at the battlefield sites," said Dr. McBride. "From the soldier's perspective, most of their time was taken up in daily activities at places like Camp Nelson. And this camp

can tell that story."

"When people visit Camp Nelson today, they'll see a landscape that looks very much like it did in 1863," said McBride. "There's only

one remaining structure from the period which is the White House or Oliver Perry House."

Camp Nelson National Monument, a unit of the National Park Service, is located at 6614 Danville Loop 2 Lexington on Highway 27 and directly north of the Camp Nelson National Cem-

Rockcastle [istorical aven]

Bruce Springsteen recorded a song in 1985, My Hometown. The song went something like this "...take a good look around, this is your hometown, your hometown..."

I really don't even remember the words to this song, but when I hear about my hometown, I am reminded of Brodhead, Kentucky.

Brodhead, Kentucky is my hometown. It was my dad's hometown, his dad's hometown, his grandfather, even his grandfather's hometown.

Brodhead, Kentucky is a tiny little town located on the Dix River, about six or seven miles from Mt. Vernon, Kentucky (depending on which way you travel). Brodhead was incorporated in 1880 and the Brodhead post office opened in 1868. Interestingly, the name was originally spelled Broadhead. I have heard different stories about the reasoning behind the name Brodhead. It is understood that the original town was known as Stigalls Station. I was told a story years ago that there were two possible origins for the name Brodhead. One, the town was named for a politician, Brodhead, and another story says that the town was named for the contractor responsible for building the rail line that ran through the town. John Lair states that Brodhead was named in honor of a Mr. Brodhead "who had been instrumental in constructing the

There are many interesting tales of the history of Brodhead, Kentucky. There are tales of attacks by Native Americans, there are tales of bank robberies. There are tales

road" (p.155).


of the Bloody Bucket and the Fuzzy Duck local "watering holes" both having the reputation of being local speak easies and rowdy establishments. There were hotels, factories, restaurants, a movie house, a skating rink, and many other prominent establishments within this small town throughout the years. One of the most prominent factories was a tobacco factory founded by Dick Martin, from Virginia.

The Mountain Signal February 24, 1888 issue features a section on Brodhead reporting on people coming and going, visiting here and abroad. The Mt. Vernon Signal later featured a similar weekly headline. Brodhead, Kentucky was once a happening little town.

Stigall Station got its name from the Stigal Family. John Lair, in Rockcastle Recollections, states, "Earliest settlers... appears to have been the Stigall family and the earliest land grants...awarded to George Stigall or Stagall under date of 1805. Next is William Stigall for land on Dix River in 1812." (p 153). Again, just as with Stephen Langford there is some confusion about which Stigall/Stegall was actually first, but it is a little more clear with a clear link to the Stigall family. Land grants were awarded and there is evidence of Stigall settlers from census records. Lair does say there is substantial evidence that the Stigall family were

slave owners.

The next family of significant importance was Anderson. Again, according to Lair, from his research in family jour-

nals, The widow of a Stigall Man (the Stigall founders) married a Captain J. W. Anderson This Anderson is believed to have been originally from Canada and actually died of the ripe old age of 75 years and according to Lair is considered to have been one of Brodhead's "most prominent citizens and of the Rockcastle Country's first citizens.

Dix River is a major waterway and the origins of Brodhead itself stem from the location of the river itself. "The beginnings of the Brodhead settlement...serve as a location point along the continuation fo Skaggs Trace towards Logan's fort and eventual the falls of the Ohio River, and later Louisville." (Lair, p. 154.) Brodhead has always been a stop for travelers intent on Crab Orchard.

I have been told many tales of Brodhead and the history of the small town. Many of my own family moved to Ohio after World War II, but we all still consider Brodhead home. Some of the most well-known family names of Brodhead are "Cherry, Frith, Pike, Sowders, Fransicso, Cass, Anderson, and Martin" which are listed in Lair's book; other prominent families also include Albright, Cash, and Bussell in recent years.

There is a Facebook page named the Brodhead, Kentucky History Museum Inc., unfortunately, that seems to have been put on hold for the time being. Another useful site for the history

of Brodhead is the Kentucky Car Show website: www.kentuckycarshows.com/

This site has multiple images of Rockcastle
County, Kentucky with several of Brodhead.

The Brodhead Fair, the Little World's Fair is probably one fo the most important memories that many have of this little town. My hometown: Brodhead, Kentucky. A quiet little town with a rich history. I can't even begin to count how many memories I have of times spent in the little town of Brodhead.

Bruce Springsteen wraps up his song with the words:

"Now Main Street's whitewashed windows And vacant stores

Seems like there ain't nobody

Wants to come down here no more"







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Yards to Paradise

Landscaping With Grass
There are over 11,000
species of grass worldwide.
There are a few that make up
lawn grasses, and we'll just
touch on some of those for
our area. There are also prairie and desert and tropical
grasses. This subject could
be a fascinating and lengthy
study. However, mostly
we'll concern ourselves with
what are termed "ornamental grasses" and particularly
those that grow or are com-

Considering the huge scope of this topic, we'll leave sedges (sometimes called sedge grasses) to another column later. Let's look at perhaps two dozen grasses we may desire to find a use for in our land-

mon with most of my audi-

ence in planting zones six

yes, there are lawn grasses, such as fine fescue, tall fescue, bluegrass, red fescue, perennial rye grass and others for lawns. In zones 7 and southward there are perhaps better choices such as zoysia, centipede or St.Augustine grasses. That's all I'll mention about lawns or their grasses.

In no particular order, but saving some smaller species for later in the discussion, here are some of the grasses to consider for decorating your landscape—and some are substitutions for shrubs and even trees in a yard.

Maiden grass has been a staple for years. Miscanthus species such as zebra grass, gracillimus, or cultivars such as 'Morning Light' can be found at most nice garden

centers. Feather reed grass is another commonly used landscape grass. The cultivar "Karl Forrester" was a 'plant of the year' twenty-something years ago.

Fountain grass (Pennisetum) is a grass often used in the landscape. Rushes are sometimes used.

Switch grass is a native winner, becoming more popular with emphasis on using natives. Muhly grass is becoming more common in zone 6, but has traditionally been a grass common in the Piedmont of the eastern U.S. Blue fescue (festuca) is another native. So is blue oat grass. These play well in the landscape with colors opposite on a color wheel.

Mexican feather grass is a lovely grass for zone 6 and southward except in swampy areas. It almost looks like waves as the wind blows through it's fine blades. Japanese blood grass is another option for those desiring something a little less common as it's hardy to survive most winters. Japanese forest grass is a shade loving yellow or chartreuse grass that is hardy to at least

20 below zero.

Some of the more diminutive options for ornamental grasses include blue eyed grass, mondo grass (including black mondo) and little bluestem. Some of the dwarf sedges and other perennials can look like grass, but we'll leave them to another day.

Pampas grass is popular, though it often takes a hit and partially dies out in Kentucky and Tennessee winters. Purple fountain grass often shows up in late summer and fall in the big box stores. But, be cautioned it is an annual and won't survive winter except in zones 8-11 (9 and 10 mostly). Other grasses that folks fawn over but should avoid include New Zealand flax and Elephant grass as well as Egyptian papyrus.

Bamboos are grasses, but let's save that for another

As you can see, grass in the landscape is a really huge subject if we try to exhaust it. I hope by this quick and simple story to pique your interest to discover more about the portions of the subject that interest you or might be employed in your landscape to make it a grass-scape that sets you apart from the neighbors.

from the neighbors. Nearly everyone has a lawn and many folks have added a few clumps of an attractive grass here or there to their yard. Xeric and naturalistic options and alternatives for traditional grass lawns that must be mowed regularly are trending. But even if that doesn't interest you, you may still find adding a few large clumps of grass to hide something or some cute short clumps for use along paths and the like are something you'll want to try. So why not think about adding a little decorative grass to your landscape unless you already have the perfect looking yard already.
