





#### STATEWIDE MOTOR VEHICLE SYSTEM LAUNCHES IN JANUARY 2024

MT. VERNON, KY (DECEMBER 7, 2023): A transition to modernize and improve the statewide computer system which processes all motor vehicle transactions in County Clerk's offices will begin after the close of business on Friday, December 29, 2023. AVIS, the system currently used, is a DOS based system created in the late 70s. "As you can imagine, the old system is dying. We are looking forward to this new technology and a customer-based system that KAVIS will provide." Danetta Ford Allen, County Clerk. Customers who need to renew vehicle tags in December or customers who have not renewed your tags from any previous month for 2023, please make time to complete your transactions prior to 4PM on December 29, 2023. Unfortunately, customers who renew in January 2024, cannot do so in December because the 2024 tax rates and assessments will not be input until after the close of business on December 29, 2023.

Customers can renew by phone with a debit/credit card at 606-256-2831, or in-person until December 29, 2023. Any mail <u>received</u> in the office by December 29, 2023, and in proper order to complete the transaction, will be completed in the 2023 year. The <u>www.drive.ky.gov</u> web renewals process for 2023 will be operational through December 27, 2023 and will be restored the week of January 8, 2024. At the close of business on December 29, 2023, AVIS data will be transferred to the new KAVIS system.

This transition is expected to take 7 - 9 full days. KAVIS will go live after the data successfully transfers, with more counties onboarding each day until the entire state is utilizing the new system. Rockcastle County Clerk's motor vehicle department will make every attempt to open as soon as possible. We will begin onboarding December 8, 2023 alongside the first wave of counties to test the system. We will gradually work toward a full open the week of December 8<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup>, 2023.

"Our goal every day is to serve our county to the best of our ability. While we realize the closure of our motor vehicle department will impact our citizens, we are hopeful that the new system will help us be more efficient in the future. With any new system there will be hiccups, but we are working hard to be trained and ready to serve you." Danetta Ford Allen, Rockcastle County Clerk.











## **Broadline announces expansion of broadband** access for all Rockcastle County residents

Broadlinc, a local broadband service provider, has announced a transformative expansion to increase internet accessibility in Rockcastle County and across Southern and Eastern Kentucky.

"With this expansion, we are taking a monumental step towards bridging the digital divide in rural Kentucky. This is a further testament to our commitment to empowering and enriching our communities."

Broadlinc prioritizes a collaborative approach, actively engaging with the communities it serves to tailor the broadband rollout to their unique needs. The project kickoff is scheduled for early 2024, with the first sites going live in Pulaski County.

trum access to serve previously hard-to-reach areas.



### Kentucky receives grant to help reduce collisions with wildlife

Kentucky is one of 17 states to receive a new federal grant aimed at making roadways safer for people and wildlife. The \$1.2 million award will fund a wildlife-vehicle collision reduction plan and a pilot study in central Kentucky to identify links between crashes and environmental factors.

The Wildlife Crossings Program competitive grant was issued to the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) by the U.S. Department of Transportations Federal Highway Administration and is the product of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law that pumped new funding to states for infrastructure projects that improve safety and quality of life.

This funding will help us identify ways we can make our roadways safer for our families, said Gov. Andy Beshear. The ultimate goal is to protect travelers and to protect Kentucky wildlife.

KYTC submitted the grant, in partnership with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, to develop Kentuckys first Wildlife-Vehicle Collision (WVC) Reduction Plan to identify crash factors and potential solutions to reduce collisions. As part of the plan, a pilot corridor study will be completed to evaluate U.S. 60 and Interstate 64 segments between Louisville and Frankfort. KYTC will collect wildlife and roadway data to identify key areas where road expansions and high traffic volumes intersect with wildlife habitats and migration routes. The U.S. 60/ I-64 corridor was selected as a focus area due to a high number of annual deer crashes.

Were excited to build upon our existing efforts to improve highway safety and prevent crashes with wildlife, said KYTC Secretary Jim Gray. With these funds, well be able to take a deep dive into data to make informed conclusions and develop a collaborative system to report and identify priority corridors.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife is pleased to partner with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet on their proposal to study wildlife vehicle collisions in Kentucky, said Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources Commissioner Rich Storm. Encounters with deer and other wildlife occur frequently along the I-64 corridor between Louisville and Frankfort making this an excellent focal point for this project. Wildlife vehicle collisions, particularly those involving deer, pose a significant risk to Kentucky motorists. We applaud the Transportation Cabinet for taking the initiative to reduce these wildlife vehicle collisions and improve habitat connectivity in Kentucky.

Last year in Kentucky, there were approximately 3,000 reported deer collisions statewide.

In addition to issuing annual Antler Alerts every fall to warn drivers of the likelihood of encountering deer on the move, KYTCs other measures to enhance road safety and reduce the likelihood of deer collisions include more than 1,000 deer crossing signs along select state-maintained routes. The state has also adopted a reduced mowing schedule that not only helps nurture critical roadside pollinator plots across Kentucky, but the less frequent mowing can also minimize the abundance of freshly cut grass along the interstate, which is a common attractant for deer.

We care about those riding on four wheels or trotting on four legs as part of our mission to maintain a safe and environmentally sound transportation system, said KYTC State Highway Engineer James Ballinger. Completing this study will give us a great baseline to build from and to help guide future decision making.

The study and plan are expected to begin in the summer of 2024.

### Senator Storm recognized for completing Henry Toll Fellowship Program

#### The following items may be recycled:

Newspapers w/inserts, magazines, catalogs, office paper, junk mail, shredded paper (needs to be bagged), books, phone books (paper products cannot be plastic lined or coated), cardboard (both corrugated and slick), plastics #1 Pet or Pete, plastics #2 HDPE, (no sheet plastics or plastic bags of any kind; no buckets or totes, no matter what number is on it), metal cans, aerosol cans, aluminum cans, aluminum foil, aluminum pie plates, glass bottles and glass jars (lids must be removed and discarded), old cell phones, car batteries, empty printer and toner cartridges, old computers (no monitors of any kind) and computer accessories, telephones, radios, digital clocks, (no televisions of any kind), rechargeable batteries (if the battery says rechargeable on it, then it is recyclable), and large bulky metal items. Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Road Department.

## **Rogers votes for National Plan** to End Parkinson's Act

U.S. Rep. Harold "Hal" Rogers (KY-05) voted for the National Plan to End Parkinson's Act, H.R. 2365, to help prevent, diagnose, treat and cure the disease that plagues millions of Americans.

According to the National Institutes of Health, Parkinson's disease is the second-most c o m m o n neurodegenerative disorder in the United States, following Alzheimer's disease. Approximately 500,000 Americans are diagnosed with Parkinson's disease, but considering the lack of awareness and diagnoses, some experts estimate that as many as one million Americans may have the disorder. "More awareness, research and therapy is needed for Parkinson's Disease across the country, and especially in rural areas like Eastern Kentucky. The greatest success comes from planning your work and working your plan, and this bill puts a plan in motion to help diagnose and treat the disease that impacts more than half a million people every year," said Congressman Rogers. "In Eastern Kentucky, the nonprofit group Parkinson's In Motion, is actively working to raise awareness, build family support, and connect patients to a variety of resources such as exercise and cognitive therapies. I applaud their local efforts and I hope this bill will pave the path forward nation-wide." The bill directs the Secretary of Health and

Human Services (HHS) to coordinate federal efforts and carry out a national project, including a review, assessment, plan, and strategy to prevent, diagnose, treat, and cure Parkinson's Disease and related neurodegenerative Parkinsonisms.


This bill would also require HHS to establish an advisory council, comprised of federal and non-federal expert stakeholders, to evaluate current efforts, issue recommendations and implementation steps, and evaluate the national plan and strategy related to Parkinson's Disease. Parkinson's In Mo-

tion, a nonprofit organization in Laurel County, was launched by former Kentucky Administrative Law Judge Janie Rice Williams who was recently diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease. She applauded Congressman Rogers' support of the National Plan to End Parkinson's Act and is hopeful for the impact it could have in Eastern Kentucky.

"This national plan is desperately needed as more people across the country are faced with Parkinson's, the fastest growing neurological condition on the planet. This disease not only impacts the patient, but the whole family. While we find a cure, our mission helps those who otherwise face this degenerative condition alone. We provide resources to strengthen body, mind and community," said Williams. "I'm thankful for the support we have received in Eastern Kensources are needed to help connect individuals to information and therapy options, especially in rural areas. That's why I'm working hard in Eastern Kentucky to let families know that they don't have to face this journey alone. I appreciate Congressman Rogers for voting for this important bill to help people here at home and across the country."

The bipartisan bill passed the House on Thursday and now moves on to the Senate for consideration.

  - Anger or hostil<sup>11</sup> that seems out of character or out of context,


