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
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

McKee man flees after traffic stop with officer still in the back seat

A McKee man attempted to flee police recently, while a Mount Vernon police officer was in the back seat of

the vehicle. According to a uniform citation, Jared Allen, 24, of McKee, attempted to flee police after a traffic stop at mile marker 70.5 on I-75, Sunday, January 21. The citation says Allen fled for fear that he was about to go to jail for possession of heroin, but Mount Vernon Police officer Blake King was searching the back seat of the vehicle, entirely inside the vehicle, when Allen took off. Officer King attempted to regain control of the vehicle and, during the altercation, the vehicle continued south on I-75 striking the concrete barrier twice and

eventually stopping. Both King and Allen suffered minor injuries during the altercation and fleeing episode.

The citation says KSP Trooper Ben Allen, and Mount Vernon Police Officer Blake King, had been conducting drug interdiction procedures on I-75 when Allen spotted a vehicle slowing down. Upon investi-

Anyway, they were wild and wooly games at Southern and, from the crowd who had bought advance tickets, it appears that most everyone in the county knew the game had been moved except me.

Anyway, in the I can't believe we're even discussing this column, the recent \$115B immigration bill gets more outrageous to me every time some more information leaks out about what's in it

The bill, to fix the immigration problem this country has had since January 20, 2021 (the day Biden was installed), would not even be necessary if Trump's immigration polices, that were cancelled almost immediately upon Biden assuming office, were just put back in place. In other words, just put it back like it was!!

But, no, the bipartisan negotiators--Chuck Schumer, Republican Senator James Lankford of Oklahoma and our own Mitch McConnell mainly--instead came up with a \$115B bill (all borrowed/printed money) which includes \$60B more for Ukraine (which is larger than the entire b\$53B budget the U.S. Marine Corps requested for fiscal year 2024), \$14B for Israel and, Wow, \$20B for the border which was reportedly the main reason for the bill. But, that's by no means all.

The bill, which provisions are in effect for three years, says the government CAN "shut down" the border to asylum seekers if crossings surpass a daily average of 4,000 a day for at least seven days -- roughly the daily crossings seen in recent months, the shutdown becomes MAN-DATORY at 5,000 a day. So, in other words, 5,000 illegals will be let across our border which figures out to an additional 1,825,000 million illegal immigrants each year. This is in addition to the 1,000,000 or so legal immigration allowed by this country each year.

Some pundits question why write new immigration laws if the federal government refuses to enforce existing laws?

And, here are some of the answers to the above question. The bill expands work authorizations for illegals while failing to include critical asylum reforms; it allows illegals to be 'released from physical custody' which effectively endorses the Biden 'catch and release' policy; the so-called shutdown authority in the bill is anything but, riddled with loopholes that grant far too much discretionary authority to Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas who has proven he will exploit every measure possible, in defiance of the law, to keep the border open; it fails to adequately stop the pResident's abuse of parole authority and provides for taxpayer funds to fly and house illegals in hotels through the FEMA Shelter and Services Program.

There is also a provision for sending millions in foreign aid to other countries and use other avenues in an attempt, reportedly, to address root causes of the invasion and to get these countries to take their illegals back. In other words, I guess part of the money will be sent to Venezuela, who has been emptying their prisons and sending them on their way to America, because, reportedly, they cannot

afford to feed them.

There is also an extra \$39M in "funds appropriated to the pResident's operating expenses" listed in the middle of the bill, available until September 30, 2025 to respond to the situations in Israel and Ukraine and countries impacted by the situations in Israel and Ukraine.

Other appropriations include: \$2B to support US Central Ops Command in the Red Sea; \$2.3B for "refugee resettlement in the US;" \$4.8B to support "partners" in pacific to deter

Legislative Update

I want to begin this week's update with an issue impacting residents in every county. In January, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) initiated the conversion to an updated Kentucky Automated Vehicle Information System (KAVIS), aiming to modernize the database from 1978. However, county clerk offices statewide are still grappling with ongoing delays and challenges since KAVIS came online, impacting motor vehicle transactions. According to the Kentucky County Clerk's Association (KCCA), the conversion has yet to unfold as smoothly as anticipated, causing extended wait times for customers.

Following a statewide shutdown, all motor vehicle branches and locations have reopened after days of closure. Tabatha Clemons, president of the KCCA, expressed disappointment in the slower-than-expected progress, attributing it to issues from transferring millions of vehicle files into the new system. Transactions that once took minutes now require 20 to 25 minutes due to system shortcomings, affecting clerks' ability to meet their usual efficiency

The Senate Transportation Committee, which I serve as co-chair, called on KYTC and KCCA to provide an update to the week five committee meeting. Chair Jimmy Higdon was sick most of the week, so I stepped in to chair the meeting.

Highlighting unexpected processing errors and delays caused by the new system, Clemons emphasized the need for customers to allocate additional time for motor vehicle transactions. To ensure a smoother experience at county clerk offices, customers must have their driver's license ready, provide proof of insurance (printed, emailed, or faxed), and bring all vehicle registrations or renewal cards.

I know it's caused some big headaches for customers. One significant concern is customers' inability to renew registrations and forcing some to drive on expired tags. This is leading to Kentucky State Police troopers issuing tickets. They are doing their job as best they can. My colleagues expressed this concern on behalf of constituents in their district. KYTC said they issued a memo to KSP to show grace for drivers given the KAVIS rollout issues. Officials with the cabinet and Kentucky County Clerk's Association said problems may compound in March as more renewals are needed.

I urge customers to be patient with local offices and staff as they do their best with the tools they have to serve them. To help speed up the process, if you hear to the clerk's office to renew your registration, please bring the following:

•Driver's license or state issued identification card.

•Renewal notice and the previous year's registration
•Kentucky proof of in surance or refer to you county clerk if an insurance

email address or fax num ber is available.


I encourage your pa tience with our local offices staff and officials.

In the Kentucky Senate our role is unique, particu larly during the 60-day bud get session. The Constitu tion of Kentucky clearly outlines any revenue-rais ing and appropriation mea sures that originate with the state House of Representa tives. This con stitutionally-mandated budgeting approach ensure the Senate remains focused on a disciplined and well informed assessment. You can expect a thoughtful and sound approach from my colleagues and me as we craft our version of the commonwealth's two-yea state budget, road plan, and other related appropriation and revenue bills.

I'm happy to report the AERO Act, which I detailed in last week's legislative up date, cleared the Senate Economic Development Tourism and Labor Com mittee in week five. I strives to address workforce needs and create pipeline: for aviation and aerospace job opportunities. I'n partnering with my fellov legislative Aviation/Aero space Caucus co-chair Kei Fleming, who has intro duced mirror legislation in the state House of Repre sentatives. This week, the Senate passed various bills covering elections, bourbon industry regulations and more. The following bills were approved and now move to the House for consideration:

SB 46 - Windshield Tinting: Brings relief to Kentucky drivers by allowing tinting on front windshields, benefiting those who spend long hours in vehicles. The measure, following federal safety standards, aims to potentially reduce cancer rates caused by UV rays and enhance driver comfort.

SB 75 - Capitol Access: Reopens a portion of Capital Avenue in Frankfort, providing access to residents and tourists. The bill allows emergency responders and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet to manage traffic on state Capitol grounds, addressing security concerns and reducing the risk of pedestrian injury.

SB 80 - Election Integrity: Strengthens election integrity by refining Kentucky's voter ID laws. The bill removes student or employee IDs and credit or debit cards as a primary identification option, aligning with previous legislation focused on reasonable voter access. Student IDs will still be a secondary ID option students can use, sign an affidavit of their identity, and cast a vote.

SB 125 - Off-Highway Vehicle Programs: Creates economic opportunities for eastern Kentucky by extending the ability for local governments to start off-highway vehicle pilot programs. The bill expands the definition of local government, opening the program to the entire state.

I signed on to a proposed


resolution this week stating the Kentucky Senate's support of Governor Greg Abbott's efforts to secure the southern border and protect his residents and even ours from the unchecked entry of deadly drugs. There is much misinformation and omitted information surrounding the circumstances of Governor Abbott's efforts. A district court in Texas issued a ruling ordering the Biden administration to discontinue removing Texas government barriers along the border, even on private lands, and the U.S. Supreme Court issued a stay on the court's order. 



(Continued from front) force is much stronger, the park is expected to provide strong economic development for the entire region.

Beshear agreed. "This project is proof positive that people can work together to get big things done," he said. Thanks to the hard work of local leaders in all three communities, we have created opportunity right here. This is all your ideas. Through hard work and dedication this park will provide opportunity that was not possible before. Industry is calling now that didn't even have our number before Jeff VanHook and these three judge/executives and all the economic development authorities started working together."

Several speakers spoke at the event, including Kentucky State Representative Josh Bray of Mt. Vernon. "For far too long Rockcastle County has been overlooked. But with our focus on infrastructure and the gas line on its way and now this industrial park, exciting things are coming to Rockcastle county," he said. "We can't elaborate yet but we can tell you that the future looks very bright for Rockcastle county."

Beshear and Rocky Adkins, senior advisor to the governor, agreed that VanHook and Bray have fought above and beyond the call of duty to make the park happen.

"When we first applied for this grant, we were turned down," said VanHook. "Our vision was too big for the grants available. But with Senator Brandon Storm and Bray's help, we never gave up because we knew it would work."

Beshear talked about recent success in the state and took the opportunity to address the current budget process. The governor also said that this project may have a lifelong effect on the local community and all three counties. He also said the new park is one step in many more that are planned. "I can tell you that there are already other grants and funds being applied for right now for this community," he said. "This grant was not given, it was earned. It had to be applied for (meaning it took a lot of work and effort to become eligible). But the local leaders worked together and made it happen."

The \$800,100 was a state grant which paid half of the purchase price of the 165 acres park. Each county involved split the remaining \$800,100 cost.

VanHook was named executive director of the park board which will seek industry to locate on the site. But he, and Judge/Executive Hal Holbrook, Jr., said they will take extra care to choose the best companies for the site to most benefit the local community.

Beshear stayed after the event to talk with local dignitaries and citizens about potential growth in the region.

The governor addressed the full house in the new 4,620 square foot facility saying he is pleased that the state has increased funding for the facility each year to combat hun-

ger. "No one should feel

the pain of hunger in Kentucky," he said. "This facility serves over 800 families and over 200 seniors every month and we will serve even more in the future," he

Guy Adams, President and CEO of CAP, said the facility now includes a drive-thru so that handicapped residents will not have to get out of their car. The facility also has refrigeration available so that foods may be kept cold, as well as twice as many parking spaces as the existing building. "The Bible tells us to feed the hungry 150 times," said Adams. "And, thanks to our donors, that's what we are

doing." School Superintendent Dr. Carrie Ballinger told the crowd she was proud of the relationship the school district has with the CAP facility. "In some cases, when a student leaves school we don't know if they are getting a good meal at home," she said. "The Backpack Program serves 568 backpacks per month to help see that these students have a meal at home."

Officials said 1-in-4 Rockcastle County residents experience hunger every day and the mission of the pantry is to combat that issue.

Several speakers, including Tina Bryson, assistant director of communications, spoke at the event and welcomed Beshear.

"We need to do everything we can to fight hunger in this region," said Beshear. "We are committed to increasing the budget every fiscal year to combat hunger."

Beshear and the crowd then toured the new facility.




Rebounding wise. Craig pulled down nine; Rogers got seven; Wilson six; Durham five and Hunt three.

Besides Rogers five assists, Craig, Wilson and Durham got two each and Hunt one. Craig and Durham were each credited with a steal and Hunt got the only block.






Jace Rogers makes a pass inside during the Rockets' loss to Madison Southern Friday night.






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
Macy Spivey drives the baseline during the Lady Rockets' loss to Southern Friday night.





Will celebrate her 100th birthday this month Laura Wallace returns to Mullins Station to live out her last years on family property

By: Nancy Mullins Laura Wallace's recommendation for staying fit, and living to be 100 years old, is to dance, something this upbeat lady used to do at the German clubs in Cincinnati a few years ago. She still fervently believes in staying active. when the local hospital offered an exercise program called Silver Sneakers, she was a regular. These days, she eagerly awaits nice weather so she can work outside sweeping the driveway and puttering around picking up branches and such. She doesn't hesitate to add that a little wine helps, too. She personally

favors white Zinfandel. • Laura was born February 18, 1924, about half a mile from the Mullins Station Quarry in a beautiful part of the county that, back then, was a thickly-populated area with not only the quarry (which employed around 50-75 men) but also boasted stores, homes, a train depot, churches and schools.

It's hard to imagine what the area looked like in 1924. The rugged beauty is still there, a few trains come by, the abandoned quarry is there and now, after an absence of about 70 years, Laura Wallace is back there.

In 2001, she, her son Jerry and his wife Molly, her granddaughter Beth Brickley and her family, returned to the property Laura has held onto for years. Both families carved out beautiful homes, just a little up the hill behind her family home site. The old house sat empty for years before someone burned it.

Laura remembers her growing up years and going to school at Fairview. Nancy Helton and Virginia Mink (Jones) are two teachers she remembers well. Miss Helton boarded with her

family and once gave her a handkerchief (whch she still has). Her full name then was Laura Belle Baker and somehow that prompted unwanted taunts by some of her classmates who would chant, "Laura Belle Baker shirttail shaker." She hated that. She vividly remembers Grace and Estil Bullock and their daughter Pauline. They ran a store at the Station and Grace "was so nice" she says and would often have her come in and eat with them. She remembers the great food Grace served and how pretty their house and table settings were.

Most of the school children brought biscuits and iam or meat but she remembers, with a smile, that one family of 13 children would bring a bucket of beans and they all ate lunch out of it. She says, "We walked evervwhere back then, to visit friends, to school, to church, to the store." The trains brought the mail to the store/ depot and people all across the mountains could hear the whistle and knew what time of day it was without a watch. Often, Laura's cousins would send her a box of fruit which came on the mail train. When she picked it up, her friends would be so excited and they would often follow her home eager to see her open it and hoping, no doubt, she would share.

The names of Laura's family on both sides are familiar to many still living in the area. An only child, Laura was born to Tom and Effie Mullins Baker. Effie was the daughter of George and Belle French Mullins. When Laura was in her teens, she and her mother moved North to Cincinnati before WWII. She said she went to work at an early age. She, and her mother, were both lucky to find work in a

bakery. It was while working there that she met her husband, Clyde Vernon Wallace. They were married in 1942 when she was 18. Clyde worked as a tailor. Later he was a switchman for the New York Central Railroad and, at the time he passed away at 54, he was working for the Ford Motor Company. Whe she left the bakery, Laura went to work at Arnold Printing and retired from there in 1989.

Laura loves to go camping and traveling is in her blood. She has done a lot of it - vacationing in Florida in summers and traveling, with friends, to many places, including Germany. However, probably her most memorable trip was to Kenya, Africa with her son Jerry, who toured with other zookeepers in search of animals to bring back to U.S. zoos. Jerry's very interesting career has included various positions,

including curator at zoos in major cities, including Birmingham and Cincinnati.

Molly smiles and says, "She loves to go. You just have to mention going and she's ready! She will go anywhere, anytime." Her granddaughter Beth smiles and nods. She accompanied her grandmother on several trips to Florida and often takes her shopping on the weekends. Laura admits she loves to go shopping and, on a recent shopping trip with Beth, she got sticker shock. She laughs when she tells about it. "I like to wear Coach brand shoes but I couldn't believe the ones I looked at were \$145!" She refused to buy them. "I'll just wear the ones I have."


When asked if she has regrets, Laura nods and says she wishes she had gone on to school. Her favorite food is "anything sweet" Molly says and the only foods she

doesn't like are liver and oatmeal. She takes only two prescriptions.

Laura took care of her mother until she passed away in 1999. She found herself living alone in the city and thinking about family acreage back in Kentucky. It was about this time that Jerry was looking for a place to retire. They came to an agreement to join forces and make the move together. Laura feels at home on the old familiar territory but hates that the old home is no longer there. However, she has a lovely big watercolor of the house in the great room of the house she shares with her son and his wife.

Rockcastle County was visited Monday by Kentucky Governor Andy Beshear.

Unlike a visit in 2021 by Senator Mitch McConnell, there was no long train of black SUVs or overwhelming police presence. No roads were blocked and no caution tape sealed off the area.

However, television cameras and media from across the state, and some national networksm filled the front rows and lined the walls at each event Beshear attended.

Beshear arrived at his first stop at the Christian

Appalacian Project in one state vehicle and only those few in the vehicle with him provided security.

To the surprise of many, Beshear walked among the crowds, shaking hands and chatting with local residents and dignitaries, throughout the events he attended.

Beshear then traveled to the Area Technology Center at the local high school where once again, only three men appeared to provide security.

The Governor stood with ROTC members for photos and was then joined by several Frankfort officials,

including Kentucky State Representative Josh Bray (R) of Mt. Vernon, an advisor Rocky Adkins and others. Local dignitaries joining the event included Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Howell Holbrook, Jr., Rockcastle County School Superintendent Dr. Carrie Ballinger, Mount Vernon Mayor Tim Roberts, Brodhead Mayor Jerry Adams, Mt. Vernon City Administrator Jim Bowman, school board chairman Angela Stallsworth-Mink, Mayor's assistant Nicole Roberts, RCIDA Executive Director Jeff VanHook and RCIDA Chairman Corey Craig, Livingston Commissioner Sandi Singleton and many other citizens and officials from throughout the county.

Beshear spoke at the two events about the subject at hand but also used the opportunity to discuss the current state budget and list recent accomplishments in Rockcastle County and throughout the region and state.

The governor told those present that Bray, VanHook and Holbrook have played vital roles in bringing the new regional industrial park to the county and that their work will have generational effects on the community. Beshear and Adkins agreed that VanHook "is a bulldog" when it comes to convincing state officials to support Rockcastle County...


The governor drew applause each time he mentioned his plans to see that every home in the state has access to high speed internet and his goals to provide an 11% raise for every employee of every school system in the state.

Access to Beshear was available for all who were present.


Holbrook said he was pleased with the visit.



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
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- If you see someone in direct or indirect contact with a downed line, DO NOT touch him/her. You could become energized as well. Call 911 for assistance.
- Don't step in water near downed lines.
- NEVER attempt to move a downed power line or anything else in contact with it using an object such as a broom or stick.
- NEVER drive over a downed power line.
- If your vehicle comes in contact with a downed power line while you're in the vehicle, stay inside the car. Call 911 or honk your horn to get help, but tell those rendering aid to stay away from the vehicle.
- If you must exit the vehicle for life-threatening reasons jump out and away from it, making sure to land with your feet together and touching. Then, shuffle away with your feet touching until you reach a safe distance. NEVER attempt to get back into a vehicle that is in contact with a power line.

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



The local city park in Mount Vernon had elaborate restrooms installed many years ago, as part of a park project. However, due to extensive vandalism and transient people attempting to stay in the facilities at nights, the areas

became unsafe for residents as well as unclean for guests. "We were having to deal with finding people setting up house in the restrooms almost every morning," said City Administrator Jim Bowman. "There were needles on the floor and facilities broken and the area was simply in disarray. It was not safe for the public or our workers." The facilities had to be closed and

However, when Bowman took over as City Administrator, he and facilities director Frank Baker and his crew, with support of Mayor Tim Roberts, began looking closely at city-owned facilities and properties and began to do something about the areas and property that had not been taken care of in the past, Bowman said.

"We had a building back behind City Hall that no one had been inside for quite some time," he said. Bowman decided that if the city owns property, equipment or facilities that were not in use, it was time to clean them up and put them to use. "If the city has something

that was supposed to benefit the city, let's deal with the issues and use it. If something breaks, we don't need to push it aside and buy a new one. If a building is sitting there, let's not forget about it. Let's clean it up and use it. I believe one of our most important duties is to avoid waste and use taxpayer funds properly with due diligence," he

So, workers pushed their way into a building recently that had not been used for some time, only to find lawn mowers, generators, equipment, tools and other items that the city could use. "Rather than let it die or rot away, we fixed all this stuff and now we have a nice mower and a nice generator and several

items the city actually needed." Not to mention that now there is a building that can be utilized for countless purposes.

Also one of the items discovered recently was a metal building kit that was purchased in the 1990s and was still in the box. "We don't have the instructions but I bet we can find a way to put it together," Bowman said. "Now we will have a place to store our road salt to keep it dry and we will have better access to it."

As for the restroom facilities at the park, Bowman said the city had been forced to pay for portable restrooms (about \$100 per month) that were placed on the site. "The portable restrooms weren't as nice as our facilities and vandals were turning them over regularly," he said. "That wasn't very efficient."

Bowman had a local business fabricate steel bars to place over the windows and create an entry way on the existing facilities that can be locked at night. Police agencies have scheduled almost constant patrols of the parks now and there are other security measures in place as well but officials ask that they not be revealed.

We aren't like the big cities. If something doesn't start on the first pull, they put it up and go buy a new one," Bowman said. "We take our job seriously and we are not going to waste taxpayer money.'

If you see extra

mowers busy this spring, and notice nice restroom facilities at the local parks and the city appears better able to function, it may be partly because of the due diligence of Mayor Tim Roberts's, Supervisor Frank Baker's and City Administrator Jim Bowman's efforts to avoid waste.

planned highway widening projects, while Ballinger announced the \$4.4 million federal grant, demonstrating the unusual growth in development in Rockcastle County recently.

Officials say there were 160 grant applications from 43 states that qualified for the application process asking for \$860 million in grants. However, only 19 entries were selected with 11 of those being rural-based school districts. Rockcastle County was one of the 11.

According to the release, solutions include innovative partnerships, post secondary navigators, career coaches, new approaches to family engagement, personal development for educators and new state-wide governance structures.

"I am proud to announce that our district has been awarded this grant," said Ballinger. "With these funds we can make changes and additions to the way we approach such partnerships and can make lasting changes for the better for each and every one of our students."

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
