Fight leads to stabbing of local man

Rockcastle 911 dispatch contacted the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office on June 17, indicating a caller claimed to have been stabbed.

Upon arrival at a home on Davis Street in Mount Vernon, Mount Vernon Police Officer Dylan Hensley observed a male sitting on the porch with an injury. Hensley and other deputies entered the home to perform a safety sweep and, when officers returned to the porch, EMS workers were working with Johnny Williams on the porch to bandage a wound.

Officers located three females inside the residence who told police that Williams, of Davis Street, had been "talking down to the females and cussing and calling

names." The citation says the females agreed that Donald Charlton, 30, of Mount Vernon, then became irate and hit Williams several times, and then pulled a knife and stabbed him. Charlton then left the scene on foot.

Kentucky State Police Trooper Ben Allen later located Charlton on Poplar Street where he was detained and transported to the Mount Vernon Police Department where he was read his Miranda Rights. The citation says Charlton admitted to the altercation and to hitting Williams but denied stabbing him.

Mount Vernon Assistant Police Chief Brian Carter spoke with the victim at Rockcastle Regional Hospital where he stated that Charlton pulled the knife and "stuck it to his throat."

On Friday, August 16, (See "Fair" on A5) had a worry that will be gone in early 2025, according to local experts. Along with losing the worry, counties across the region are also losing millions of dollars in funding and countless jobs in the emergency response field.

CSEPPs (Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Programs) across the region are expected to close by early 2025 since the last Sarin Nerve Agent M55 rocket at the Army Depot in Richmond was destroyed in July of 2023.

The rockets were moved and stored at the Bluegrass Army Depot in Richmond in the 1940s but, by 2019, experts began eliminating all 500 tons of the deadly chemical. Since the chemical is one of the most deadly

This has been an interesting week. First there was the Presidential Debate last Thursday night, between former President Donald Trump and incumbent pResident Joe Biden.

Anyway, the law was put into effect last month and now every classroom will have those awful ten rules posted that so many "modern people" apparently think give such terrible advice.


As for me, I think everyone who fights against any display of the Ten Commandments should not be allowed to use money. After all, our national currency states clearly, "in God we



May God bless the United States of America, now and always. Happy Independence Day!






Rocky Boswell







"Character Education"

By Jerry Hopkins

There are qualities we need to develop as we get an education. As students in school we are not just to learn information and skills through study, conversational exchange, scholarly observation and experience. Our education should also include the development of character, as well as abilities in thinking, communicating, social and civil relations. Whatever we gain in education we should grow in understanding, in discernment and in character. Education is learning about who we are as individuals and as a people. In teaching history I have sought to communicate more than just the historical facts of our past, but also encourage students to think about evaluating the character and contributions of our people and leaders.

We all need to recognize that we have limitations, weaknesses, sins, strengths, failures and successes. This must always be a consideration in school and beyond—to understand our human limitations, our personal failures, even our moral failures as human beings. Even great men in biblical times, men such as King David, the Apostle Paul, struggled with failure and difficulties. Even great men today struggle with problems and failures in their lives—even the great evangelist and Christian Billy Graham is a human being. Dr. Graham himself would be the first to tell you of his short-comings. It was for this reason that he kept others close around him so that they could hold him accountable. Leaders, even the best, must always remember this tendency of human nature and the lurking of sin at the door to disrupt and destroy. Churches, Christian institutions and organizations have many times failed and fallen because their leader or leaders have not understood the danger of pride and human fallacies. Jacques Ellul, the re-

nowned French scholar and social theorist, confesses in his autobiographical explanation of his life, titled. What I Believe, "The whole educational system is based on belief. Students believe what their teachers or their books say; they learn on a basis of belief. We also believe spontaneously the witness of our senses, even when they are disturbed. We believe similarly in certain words, such as the good, or freedom, or justice, which we do not define plainly or consistently but to which we cling firmly no matter what their content. A society could not function if it did not rest

on beliefs hidden in the deep recesses of each of its members and producing coherent sentiments and actions. A society without collective beliefs (which are, of course, individual in the eyes of each member) would soon fall into lawlessness and enter a process of dissolution. Beliefs are definitely the raison d'être of society."

Part of this important

educational experience is the development of character. Out of his understanding of social engagement and education development Ellul confesses, "I am human like everyone else, and I have failed some of the tests of love and not met all the challenges. I simply know what is true even though I have sometimes lived out what is false." In such a confession there isn't an exaltation of weakness; a pride in failure or moral collapse. This is merely an honest, humble confession acknowledging human frailties, flaws, sins and weaknesses. There is the reality of fact—we all fail in some way, at some time and must struggle to recover or regain what we lose in such behavior. Life's reality is that we sometimes fail, sometimes succeed, sometimes make mistakes, sometimes do what is not right, sometimes do what

The Apostle Paul, as great a man as he was, struggled with weaknesses. satanic buffetings, infirmities, failures. In one instance he asked God "three times" that an evil problem would be taken away, but it wasn't. The Lord instead said to Paul, and He says to us, "My grace is sufficient for you, for My strength is made perfect in weakness." In this the great Apostle then confesses, "Therefore most gladly I will rather boast in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in needs, in persecutions, in distresses, for Christ's sake. For when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Corinthians 12:8-10).

We often wrongly associate education with youth as though there comes a time when we no longer learn. That is a terrible state that leads to utter failure, particularly in regards to moral and social life and community. Education is a lifelong experience. This is why I've been stressing in these columns the importance of reading, thinking, writing, communicating. There are certain elements in our youth that we need to be sure to gain the best

(Continued from front) substances known to exist, CSEEP was formed in 1985 as a way to educate the public and help prepare all citizens for a possible leak of the agent into the atmosphere during the destruction process.

For the next 39 years, CSEPP experts developed safer methods and procedures for citizens in the event of a leak. Millions of dollars in state and federal funds were used to purchase equipment and materials as workers spent each day making sure the public knew what to do in the event of a chemical leak.

Andrew Locally, Pensol, Director of the Rockcastle County CSEPP, has joined the rest of the workers across the region in preparing to shut down the program now that the agent has been destroyed. For the previous 18 years, County Rockcastle Judge/Executive Howell Holbrook, Jr. was the director but he left the position when elected to of-

officials say all the rockets are gone but it will take until early 2025 to eliminate all residual waste and ensure no contamination from the rockets. "It is great that the threat is gone," Pensol said. "But of course that means a lot less funding for each county and the CSEPP is expected to be gone by early in 2025."

Pensol has been named to the Rockcastle Emergency Management Director position, as co-director along with David Colson, since his emergency training over the years has prepared him for such a position, says Holbrook.

Pensol said those involved with the CSEPP knew that closing down was the plan from the beginning, and so planning for the future was in his mind all along. "Knowing that this day would come, all the equipment CSEPP has purchased over the years, now belongs to the county and can now be used with the Emergency Management Programs, Pensol said. "We used a lot of our equipment and expertise during the train derailment and we can use it all for any other type of disaster as well. The Emergency Management operations have been tied to the CSEPP operations all along and this should be a smoother transition because of that."

Each year, CSEPP directs a county-wide exercise helping emergency services to be prepared to act in the event of any type of emergency. "This has been a very useful program that has helped many agencies become more prepared for the unexpected. But if all goes as planned, the last exercise, was our last one," said Pensol.

And the last one was a great one, according to officials. "We just completed the CSEPP and Hazmat situation exercise on I-75 and our teams did exceptionally well," said Rockcastle County Sheriff Shannon Franklin. "According to local and federal evaluators, Rockcastle is well prepared for emergencies." Pensol agreed. "All the fire departments and police organizations received a very good report. There were no finding, which means there was nothing left undone," he said.

"It was an excellent exercise in preparedness and cooperation among local agencies," said Sheriff Franklin. "Our county is blessed to have leaders with training, experience and commitment to respond to many types of emergency situation."

So after 85 years of preparing, no substantial leak happened and no nerve agent caused damage. Officials say part of the reason why, may be the preparedness of everyone involved, including those working to eliminate the agent.

"Rockcastle will have a well organized emergency management program," Pensol said and Holbrook agreed. "I knew all along that the program would end and we kept that in mind through all the training and all of our purchases." Holbrook said. "Pensol has ideal experience to become the Emergency Management Director and our county will have a much better Emergency Management program because CSEPP existed. I know it was a bad thing to have a few miles away, but that nerve agent created a much better prepared and better equipped Rockcastle County."

The attorneys agreed the first rule of business should be used for all elected officials who may not be aware of certain guidelines or requirements. "Do the best you can, till you know better. And then do better."

The presentation listed duties and activities for a mayor as well as duties and activities for a council member. Throughout the meeting council member Shelly Lewis asked several questions with council member Gertha Mink and City Clerk Crystal Rush also participating. Council member Julie Asher was not present though the remaining council members and assistant police chief were present.

The two attorneys alternated speaking on each of many subjects, including the separation of executive and legislative powers, open meeting requirements, special/ called meeting requirements, personnel duties, executive orders, conflicts of interest, using city equipment or materials, abstaining from a vote, accepting gifts, appointments, department heads, salary schedules and more.

and more.

The attorneys explained the duties of the mayor and the council in each category with a longer discussion and attention given to open meetings, guests at meetings and appointment regulations.

The attorneys said there is a clear separation of powers and the mayoral duties focus on executive powers, including personnel hirings, terminations, recommending salaries and dealing with daily activities, as well as daily operations of the city. The mayor recommends ordinances and enforces laws and ordinances upon citizens and is also responsible for communications and preparing and administering the budget, as well as other operations of the city, according to the presentation. Council members may not perform executive branch duties and are considered council members only while sitting in their seat in an official capacity. Otherwise council members are ordinary citizens, Griffith said.

The council performs the legislative duties, including establishing ordinances, approving the appointment of officers, adopting resolutions and has the power to override a mayoral veto with more than one majority. The council also appoints members in the case of a resignation.

Griffith said that allowing guests to speak, or providing time for public comment at a public

meeting, is not required in a mayor/council form of government. Although the practice is allowed if a council agrees to include guests as a portion of the agenda, but there is no state requirement to allow guests to speak, unless they are on the agenda. "Even when a guest does speak, I highly recommend that no one engage in dialog with the guest speaker," said Griffith. "If you choose to allow public comments, let them say their peace and then move on."

However, the attorneys also said citizens can ask to be included on the agenda and the decision to include the guest is at the mayor's discretion. Mink recommended the city provide information to the public about how to have a guest's name added to the agenda or how to sign up to speak at a public meeting. "If we don't allow people to speak unless they sign up, we have to let them know they need to sign up and how to do it," she said.

Some time was spent on the subject of the Open Meetings Act which requires elected officials to provide 24hour notice to the public and the media of any regular or special called meeting. Questions centered around budget workshops and other meetings of less than a full council to work out details that can be addressed at a public meeting. However, Griffith said she recommends that the safest way to avoid potential issues would be to "treat all meetings as public if two or more council members are present." The attorneys suggested it is better to err on the side of notifying the media to avoid potential issues.

The attorneys also explained the two acceptable reasons for a closed session (executive session) and informed the council that they should inform the public of the topic of the discussion before entering a closed session. The two reasons include personnel issues and acquisitions.

Countless other details describing the separation of powers and the duties and responsibilities of the mayor and a council member continued as Griffith and Simon answered questions throughout the presentation

Officials thanked the KLC attorneys and agreed the presentation was informative and helpful for all involved. After the meeting, Mayor Roberts said, "The city's membership with the Kentucky League of Cities is extremely beneficial in many ways. Having the opportunity for their team of attorneys to present city governance information to the council will make all city officials more productive in our efforts to improve the quality of life for our citizens."





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Yards to Paradise

By Max PhelpsLandscaping to Survive

Droughts Some geographic regions of the United States are perpetually dry desert or low rainfall areas. The native plants that dominate can take that. The part of the country that this column goes to typically gets about 45 to 50 inches of annual rainfall. Xeriscaping or desert landscaping, often struggles in soils that become saturated and waterlogged for long stretches of time. Let us examine dealing with dry spells, but not forget many dry land plants will be challenged by too much moisture in the soil. How then do we deal with dry seasons and keep our landscapes alive and well in challenging occasional hot and dry times?

From the Ohio Valley, Tennessee Valley, to the Piedmont of the Carolinas, having irrigation, as in "automatic rain", is quite rare except for the nicest communities or the country clubs. Obviously, watering your landscape as you sleep is going to take care of landscapes during dry periods. (Unless there are municipal water shortages and restrictions on use of irrigation.) Hand watering of annual flowers and recently installed trees and shrubs will be required, at a minimum, in the absence of irrigation.

Trees, plants, grasses,

(and humans and animals) naturally become stressed or wilt in abnormal heat or with lack of a timely drink.. Healthy, established plantings usually come through the hot, dry times just fine. Besides praying for rain, how else can the homeowner get his/her landscape plants to survive lack of timely rainfall?

Here are a few of the trees that handle dry seasons well. Burr oaks and red oaks and chestnut oaks, native eastern red cedar (junipers), Kentucky Coffee tree, Arizona cypress, Colorado spruce, Virginia and Ponderosa pines, hackberry, smoke trees, service berry or sarvis (especially amelanchier lamarkii), and perhaps surprisingly the Jacquemonti birch. Avoid native dogwood (cornus Floridus) if your yard has a hot sunny exposure or dries faster than normal—this is just one example of a shallow rooted tree that often gets thinned out in a very dry season.

season.

And you may try to grow a Joshua tree, monkey puzzle tree or sagebrush—if you can give them sand or gravels to grow in—but remember trees from the deserts have troubles in the years there isn't a drought. If you're pushing your luck, an olive tree might be worth experimenting with.

Boxwoods, barberries,

gogi berries, nandinas, Japanese plum yew (cephalotaxus), bluebeard , strawberrybush

euonymous, arrowood viburnum, chokeberry, beautybush and vitex make drought and heat tolerant shrubbery that also handles rainy seasons and humidity quite well.

Some perennial plantings that survive in challenging conditions include thyme, rosemary, sage, oregano, lavender, sedums, sempervirens, ice plant, asters, euphorbia, coreopsis, lamb's ears, Russian sage, cacti, and yucca (these latter two are useful in the edible land-scape as well). Grasses might include hairgrass, blue-eyed grass, switchgrass and bluestem.

Worthy and wise practice to get your plants through dry periods include mulch (a good idea anyhow), putting shade cloth over particularly vulnerable plants if their value merits the expenditure on shade fabric, collecting rainwater (in barrels at the downspout, or into a swale or pit or raingarden as retained water is a much better option than it ending up in a creek or storm sewer every time there's a scattered thunderstorm). Paved streets, drives, etc., are a big source of flash flooding in a municipal setting—if you can figure how to keep your rainfall on your own property you will be helping to solve multiple problems. And there'll be more moisture in your soil for trees to tap

in those month long droughts and you'll come through a dry spell better than your neighbors.

I'm not aware of any watering restrictions on any of my customers as I write this, but should you face those type of emergencies, use whatever water you are allowed to on your most valuable larger trees—as you can replace dead flowers so much easier and cheaper than a large shade tree or landscape specimen.

landscape specimen.

Another good idea is to raise your lawnmower blades an inch or more from the usual height you cut your lawn grass (or skip mowing altogether even) until more normal

rains return.

This current dry and

hot stretch is not likely to set any records in terms of heat or length of drought. Probably not even a 'top 10' event. (Think 1921, 1931, 1936, 1954, 1980, 2012 and check weather gov if you really desire to have that scoop...a heat index of 110 is not the same as the 113 real record in Lexington, Kentucky all-time!)

In conclusion, try to postpone major landscaping until there's some rains, make smart choices in buying plants, realize those having deep taproots are going to come through in much better shape if you do nothing than plants having shallow root systems, try to retain runoff water, plant in groups things that need regular water so you're

not having to water everywhere in dry times, and select plants common to your area that seem to do fine in all seasons. Prevention is worth a pound of cure they say. So, use hot dry times to build a road, pave a drive or build a retaining wall or a patio. And postpone new plantings until conditions improve some. I'll end by suggesting if there's a boggy area typically too soggy to do anythingnow may be the right time to do a project in that area and not get machines or equipment stuck up in the mud. Dry, hot, stressful times do not have to end in a calamity for one's landscaping.

PEACH CHEESECAKE CRESCENT BARS

These are incredibly easy and taste like you worked all day on them.

2 cans crescent rolls 2 packages (8 ounces) cream cheese, room temperature

cup granulated sugar

1 tablespoon pumpkin pie spice or cinnamon

1 teaspoon vanilla 4 or 5 ripe peaches, pealed and cut into cubes

4 tablespoons butter, melted TOPPING:

1/2 cup sugar

1 tablespoon cinnamon Preheat oven to 325°. Lightly grease or spray a 9 x 13 glass baking dish. NOTE: If you use a nonglass dish bake at 350° and reduce cooking time to 25 to 30 minutes. Unroll one can of crescent rolls in the bottom of prepared dish, spreading to fit and pinching seams together. In a large mixing bowl, beat cream cheese, sugar, eggs, cinnamon, and vanilla on medium speed until smooth. Fold in peaches and spread evenly over dough in pan. Unroll the second can of

crescent roll dough over

A. Fellowship. We have fellowship with God, with God's Son, with God's children, "one with another". This implies unity, cooperation, asso-




What Does God Expect From Us Today?
