Deadly chemicals are gone CSEPP to be dismantled

The CSEPP organization will soon cease to exist, according to federal officials and Rockcastle County Judge/Executive, and past CSEPP Director, Howell Holbrook, Jr.

Some citizens may not be aware that just 20 miles north of Rockcastle County was one of the most dangerous and deadly national defense sites in the nation, according to many civic organizations, after Sarin Gas was moved to the Bluegrass Army Depot in Richmond in 1962. It took until 1985 for the United States Congress to pass new laws directing the Army to dispose of its aging chemical weapons stockpile.

One of the ten counties affected by the new laws was Rockcastle County, since those chemical weapons were stored in massive quantities at the Depot in Richmond. It was determined that in the event of an accidental chemical leak, over one hundred thousand lives could be at risk.

"The program was established to be phased out all along,"
Howell Holbrook, Jr.

Sarin Gas, just one of the chemicals stored at the depot, can cause violent death within moments if a fraction of an ounce touches a human being, according to the Center for Disease Control. Reports indicated the depot stored 520 tons of the nerve agent. Enough to kill every human on Earth several times.



He will be retiring for good before too long but would like to stay busy until then.


I have been wanting to

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

(Eph.6:1-2) Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 



Yards to Paradise

The daylily has been steadily growing as a fad for the garden, with over 80,000 varieties registered with the American Hemerocallis (daylily) Society. Rather amazing, that's more options in this plant than you have in beans and tomatoes, or apples and daffodils combined!

My fondness for this plant is a good deal more subdued, but it's such an easy to grow and hardy perennial, available in just about every color except crimson or pure blue, how can I not recommend a few for the landscape or garden.

The only native daylily to the USA is the tall orange one, hemerocallis fulva. Most hail from Asia. Hybridizers have had a field day with this plant over the past sixty years or so, creating new attractive color combinations, and bigger bolder blooms. Yet, the best bet to bloom all summer is still the Stella d'Oro with its compact plants and orangish blooms.

Some go dormant, some remain evergreen, and many are somewhere between, depending on temperatures and length of the winter. The evergreen ones can be killed in cold climates. Some begin blooming early, some begin late summer, and many fall in between. Most bloom for a couple weeks, but those that bloom both

early and late or even all summer are called 'reblooming' daylilies. Some are a foot tall and some get four feet plus in height. Blossoms vary from petite to eight inches wide, some are double, and some resemble spiders.

This plant loves sun, but also does well in part shade. It likes fertile and slightly damp soil, but tolerates drought or floods and bounces back. The clumps slowly expand, like most perennials do, and most commonly new plants are obtained by taking a portion of the entire plant and starting it in a container or somewhere else in the yard or garden. Taking up an entire plant and dividing it into multiple little clumps of two or more fans or sets of leaves, along with sufficient roots, is an ideal way to invigorate an older plant while also producing numerous new starts for your own garden or to give away to friends, or perhaps even to sell.

Careful selection of varieties can mean you have some blooms from May until frost. Though a good number bloom spring and fall, the majority of cultivars just bloom for a spell of a month or less. Each blossom only is open for one day, or one night and one day for the nocturnal ones. The scapes bear several buds, and new blooms open for a couple weeks or more in

most varieties.

Daylilies are pretty good at erosion control after the first season, and also at keeping annual weeds down. Rabbits usually don't eat them, but deer will. And I'll eat them too, if I'm hungry! The unopened blossoms make good in a salad or stir-fry. Blooms are used in Oriental cooking. And the little nodules of stored energy on the roots are like small peanuts or tiny potatoes, and definitely are edible...even very tasty if harvested at the right time. Pickled daylily buds anyone, or battered and fried blooms?

You can plant them most anytime, but try to avoid midwinter or dividing a plant while it is in bloom. It is a good idea to cut the tops back to help growing plants adjust to the new spot during hot or dry weather. Plants growing in containers can be planted anytime.

Sometimes you may be able to beg gifts from neighbors, or buy from a roadside market or from a farm or gardener. Online/mailorder merchants will offer many varieties, usually shipping bare root plants spring, late summer and fall. Expect to pay quite a sum for the newest and prettiest varieties; older ones can often be bought in quantity for \$3 or so per plant. If you are patient, one expensive plant can be divided in about three years to provide you extras.

Consider some daylilies the next time you are doing some flower planting. The ease of growing them and the many color and size combinations make growing these perennials a no-brainer. And remember that if you can bear to eat pretty blooms, their blossom buds are a delicacy.

New signs lead travelers to local attractions

It may be a sign of the times. The "good times." Tourists from across the country may not know that Mount Vernon is the home of the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame or the Kentucky State Food Truck Championship. But they will most likely know about it now.

If you are driving into Kentucky from Tennessee, or on I-75 around Berea, headed to Mount Vernon or on to US-461, you may notice huge billboards directing traffic and tourists to Mount Vernon, thanks to a recent investment by the Mount Vernon-Rockcastle Tourist Commission.

The Tourist Commission recently acquired space on I-75 near Berea, and on US-461 and has placed regulation sized billboards advertising some of the special attractions that Mount Vernon has to offer. "One of our billboards is northbound as soon as you cross into Kentucky and the other is the first billboard outside of Berea," said Jessica Blankenship, Director of the Hall of Fame and Tourist Commission. "The one near Berea will change out after the Food Truck Championship to focus on the next event or attraction."

The huge signs will let travelers know of some of the attractions Rockcastle County has to offer, according to Blankenship. "The hardest part was locating the right spot," she said. "We had to find the perfect spot that wasn't already taken and provided the best visibility to every tourist headed this way."

Blankenship said signs and advertising has proven to pay off. "We

have seen the results with the brown I-75 attraction signs," she said. "After asking folks how they heard about us, 90% of them said signage. So this will be a great investment and should pay for itself many times over." In fact, according to state surveys, I-75 is one of the busiest highways in America as far as sheer number of vehicles. Estimates from the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet indicate as many as 50,000 vehicles per day travel through our county.

Blankenship said the commission has also placed two billboards in the county to catch lake travelers visiting the Cumberlands and all traffic coming from the west. "We also acquired two billboards across from the high school to get the attention of Lake Cumberland traffic," she said.

All experts agree that advertising is more of a revenue generator than an expense, according to "Yelp For Business" reports.

"Having the official statewide museum on music and the official statewide food truck championship we need to promote them and make them more known to attract more visitors," she said. "Those visitors also eat at our restaurants, buy our gasoline, stay in our lodging and buy our goods." This spending not only provides revenue for the Hall of Fame, but provides more tax revenue to the city and the county as well as the tourist commission, officials say.

Funding for the effort was provided through grant funds and budgeted funds through the Food

Truck event," said Blankenship.

Fiscal Court holds special meeting

The CVADD had only received \$5,000 of that fee and requested an additional \$20,000 leaving \$5,000 to collect later.

Davidson said he sees this move as yet another step forward for the City of Livingston in an effort to resolve past issues.

"Hopefully we are moving forward, correcting past failures and building on past successes."

America's pastime in small-town Kentucky:

Remembering the Tobacco League

In the interlude between World War II and the Korean War, American joy and exuberance arrived in the form of organized community baseball in Wildie, College Hill, Ford, Waco, Kirksville, Ravenna, and Bearwallow — all mere wide places on Central Kentucky's backroads.

The Tobacco League, as this predominantly rural baseball circuit was called, was as earthy and organic as the name suggests. From 1949 to 1951, tiny communities fielded teams to compete with Berea, Richmond, and Lexington clubs for regular-season and playoff titles. Games were played on Sunday afternoons from May to September — roughly the same time it took light-leaf tobacco farmers to transplant, grow, and harvest their crops.

Play ended abruptly after the 1951 season when the Tobacco League could no longer compete with the Korean War's demand for the same draft-eligible men. According to a news article before the 1951 season, "Only six teams, instead of the usual eight, will play this year. The drafting of young boys is the cause." America's pastime soon gave way to America's heightened obsession with communism.

My father, Billy Hiatt, played shortstop for the Wildie Rockies, and although Tobacco League lore and memorabilia were central to my youth, I've come to appreciate his photographic archive as his most enduring contribution to the game. His images captured a unique moment when the country paused to catch its breath after more than two decades of Depression-era and wartime privation.

Visual culture scholars understand photos not as neutral purveyors of reality but as reflections of the values, beliefs and experiences of the photographer. By no means a professional (he probably used a consumer-level Kodak Brownie Reflex), my father's documentarian eye imbued his photos with a distinct sense of time and place. Even in the moment, his im-

pulse was to curate the events and memories of a community in which he was related to half the population and saw the other half almost daily in his father's general store and post office.

While it's easy to see these images as moments suspended in a simpler past, in reality, the photos anticipate the upheaval and loss then confronting rural communities. Like postwar America more broadly, rural Kentucky was in flux. Besides Korean War service, Kentuckians were leaving to attend college, marry and start families, and seek factory jobs in Ohio and Indiana during one of the largest economic expansions in history. Outmigration altered the social and cultural fabric forever.

The First Pitch

Following a disorganized trial season in 1948, the Tobacco League was officially formed in January 1949 with a constitution seeking "the furtherance of the game of baseball in Madison County," home to the majority of teams. Fayette, Clark, Estill, Garrard, and Rockcastle counties also fielded clubs at various times. League founder Fred Engle Jr. served as president. Seasons were 28 games, ending with a four-team, best-of-3 play-off for the Kessler Jewelry Trophy. Teams were permitted up to 18 players, a manager, and two coaches, and could make roster changes until July 4. Clubs forfeited if not on the field 45 minutes after the scheduled start, but they could play with eight men if necessary.

Alliteration was the nickname fashion of the day (Bearwallow Bears, Berea Barons, County Clippers, Ravenna Ravens, Richmond Redbirds), but quaintness was also popular (Wildie Rockies, Waco Cardinals, Central Scarlets, Kirksville Blue Jays, Richmond Lads, College Hill Hilltoppers). The Hackley Sabres of Garrard County joined the final year.

Although money was tight, players and fans had time for leisure and a longing to forget about war, fleeting though it was. Wildie, located on

the L&N railroad line off U.S. 25 in Rockcastle County, played in a cow pasture on the other side of the tracks. Crowds swelled into the hundreds. Beloved Wildie character Red Guthrie collected the admission of 25 cents for adults and 15 cents for kids and dropped the change into a cigar box.

The Mt. Vernon High School pep band traveled the 10 miles or so from the county seat to play for one Wildie season-opener, most likely arranged because my father and his brother, Jack, happened to be dating — and would soon marry — girls in the band.

Play Ball

Tobacco League baseball was the game distilled into its purest essence. Balls that rolled into the creek were put back into play dripping wet. My father told the story of teammate Rudolph Burdette, a future Rockcastle veterinarian, hitting a ball that kicked into foul territory past third base and rolled under a car. While the fielders circled the car looking for the ball, Burdette circled the bases and scored.

As the contemporaries of Ted Williams, Yogi Berra, and Mickey Mantle, the players mimicked the baseball card poses of the major-league greats — in a line with bats symmetrically on the shoulder, a paused follow-through of a swing, alternately serious or smiling depending on what degree of swagger they wished to convey.

My father, who was 20 when play began, cherished everything about the Tobacco League. Besides his photos, I inherited trophies from Wildie's regular-season (1950, 1951) and playoff (1950) titles, uniforms, bats, gloves, scorebooks, schedules, newspaper clippings, letters, and other ephemera. He helped organize league reunions in 1969, 1989, and 1999. I recently found a satirical story he wrote about the day his best friend and Rockies catcher, Kelly Fish, strikes out in the bottom of the ninth, unleashing anger, grief, and community-wide suicide by

creek and train.

More than a decade after his death, I appreciate the deep sense of the collective that permeates his images. Even the way he shared and circulated the photos aligned with his perception of them as artifacts to be used and consumed in the service of community. Shooting slide film enabled him to preserve 3 1/4-by-4 1/2 prints in a scrapbook but also include Rockies images in church slide pre-

sentations that he and my mother produced even decades later.

Although his photos are deeply rooted in the specific time and place that made them meaningful to him, the images carry far beyond that context and prompt new reflections on change and stasis, significance and silence, and memory and meaning in our own lives.

Willie Hiatt, who was born and raised in Mt.

Members of the Rockcastle County Historical Society have been seeking members and donations in order to open a museum and office space in downtown Mount Vernon for several years.



"I hope the city and the county are able to place the Historical Society in their budget soon," said Brown. "I will never stop trying. I believe in what we are doing and it is a valuable service to the people."

First responder agencies in need of applicants

Emergency services volunteers and employee numbers, across the state, appear to be in serious decline and Rockcastle County is no exception. Even the Kentucky State Police are reporting shortages.

In fact, many have reported dialing 911 locally and reaching a dispatcher, but no police showed up at the scene. Though local police and first responder agencies are creating new recruiting efforts and providing better benefits and programs, reports indicate new recruits are simply not applying as often as experienced personnel are leaving.

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department has reported a critical shortage in deputies and Sheriff Shannon Franklin said recently that there are times his department has no full time deputies on duty. "One part-time deputy

simply cannot be at four different places at the same time," said Franklin recently.

Reports also indicate fire departments are in need of volunteers. Recruiting campaigns are underway at all fire departments in the county. According to Franklin, even the ambulance service find themselves shorthanded sometimes forcing firefighters to drive an ambulance during emergency calls.

The Mount Vernon Police Department has been fighting shortages as well, especially since the department lends a helping hand to other agencies who are even more short-handed. However, they are in the process of hiring new personnel and have more applications to consider.

Most of these agencies have depended upon help from other local agencies and help from the Kentucky State Police, whose

jurisdiction extends into any county or city.

But now, even the Kentucky State Police (KSP) are reporting shortages. Though numbers are apparently better in 2023 than in 2022, with recent raises and benefits a press release says, the organization is apparently still understaffed.

In fact, FOX 56 reported that KSP is in a substantial shortage, needing at least 270 more troopers. Recruiting campaigns are underway across the state for sheriff's departments, fire department, EMS workers, ambulance service employees, city police departments and KSP posts across the state.

A recent press release from the KSP is seeking KSP telecommunicators in order to "ensure emergencies and calls for service continue to be answered," the release says.

According to the release, salaries start at more than \$41,000 annually,

plus a \$3,100 training stipend. In 2022, telecommunications answered over 622,000 calls resulting in nearly 400,000 requests for assistance, the release says.

The release also says Governor Andy Beshear awarded \$8 million in grant funding to assist state and local law enforcement agencies and signed legislation increasing salaries by \$15,000 while establishing vacation, sick leave, and holiday pay.

Those interested in applying as a telecommunicator must have high school diploma. For more information about a career as a telecommunicator, contact the Kentucky Personnel Cabinet website.

Anyone interested in employment at the sheriff's department or local fire departments, EMS or ambulance service are also encouraged to contact your local department.

Kentucky American Water is proposing to reset the QIP surcharge to zero and incorporate the investment costs into base rates. The average monthly bills shown in this notice include the QIP surcharge in the current average bills and a \$0 amount for the QIP surcharge in the proposed average bills.

Kentucky American Water is also proposing modifications to its QIP and is requesting: a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity ("CPCN") to deploy Advanced Metering Infrastructure ("AMI"); addition of an AMI opt-out fee in the amount of \$28.00; an alternative level of reasonable unaccounted-for water loss under 807 KAR 5:066, Section 6(3); approval of a Universal Affordability Program; and certain regulatory and accounting treatments for Production Costs, Pension and Other Post-Employment Benefits, and Tax Expenses (excluding Sales Tax). Modifications to the QIP surcharge tariff would be applied to Residential, Commercial, Industrial, Other Public Authority, Sale for Resale, Public and Private Fire Service classifications for qualified infrastructure investments. The QIP surcharge would be calculated annually based on forecasted qualified infrastructure costs and applied to each customer's monthly bill. The QIP surcharge would then be updated annually until the next rate case, at which time the investment costs would be incorporated into base rates and the surcharge reset to zero. The AMI opt-out fee tariff would apply to all customers electing to opt-out of the AMI program, and the \$28.00 fee would be applied to each opt-out customer's monthly bill for the ongoing opt-out costs, including meter reading costs. The Universal Affordability Program would reduce the 5/8" meter monthly service charge by \$12.00 and the consumption charges rate by \$4.69494 per 1,000 gallons (\$0.469494 per 100 gallons) for qualified Residential customers with household incomes at zero to 50-percent of the federal poverty level and would reduce the 5/8" meter monthly service charge by \$4.00 and the consumption charges rate by \$1.56498 per 1,000 gallons (\$0.156498 per 100 gallons) for qualified Residential customers with household incomes at 50-percent to 100-percent of the federal poverty level. Kentucky American Water is proposing to revise the definition of "current estimated cost" of main extensions in new subdivisions by utilizing current material costs and bids received instead of the preceding year's costs. Finally, Kentucky American Water is proposing to: move Judy Water Association as a standalone customer in its tariff into the general Sale for Resale customer class; add language to the cross-connection portion of its tariff to make it clear that customers are responsible for the expenses for cross-connection testing, including processing fees; and revise language related to private fire service so that payment for such service is payable monthly in advance rather than quarterly in advance.



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
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

[July 17, 2023: All Other Crops

In order to maintain program eligibility and benefits, you must file timely acreage reports. Failure to file an acreage report by the crop acreage reporting deadline may cause ineligibility for future program benefits. FSA will not accept acreage reports provided more than a year after the acreage reporting deadline.

Producers are encouraged to file their acreage reports as soon as planting is completed.

Kentuckians reminded to slow down this summer

As travel increases this summer, Kentuckians are reminded to slow down and pay attention to posted speed limits to keep all road users safe.

Speed limits are the law and enforceable if not obeyed. Driving over the limit greatly reduces a drivers ability to respond to unexpected situations, such as stopped or slowed traffic, an object in the road, or encountering vulnerable road users such as highway workers, pedestrians, bicyclists and motorcyclists.

Speeding is a choice that can have deadly consequences and is 100% preventable, said Gov. Andy Beshear. Lets look out for each other on the road by putting the phone down and following the speed limit.

Approximately 25% of crashes in Kentucky involve a speeding or aggressive driver, so the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) Office of Highway Safety (KOHs) is partnering with law enforcement agencies across the state on the Not So Fast, Kentucky speed awareness campaign through July 31.

Funds for the campaign are provided by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and

distributed by KOHS to law enforcement agencies that applied and were approved for full-year grants.

We frequently hear from officers and troopers that they would rather write a ticket than make a death notification; said KYTC Secretary Jim Gray. Obeying the speed limit not only can save your life, it can also save you from costly fines and expenses, so remember Not So Fast, Kentucky.

The KOHS provides the following tips for dealing with speeding and/or aggressive drivers:

- Wear your seat belt! It is your best defense against injury and death.

- Do not challenge the driver by speeding up or attempting to hold your lane.

- Give them plenty of space, as they may lose control of their vehicle more easily.

- Avoid eye contact and ignore gestures.

- If you can safely report an aggressive driver to law enforcement, provide a vehicle description, license number, location and, if possible, direction of travel.

- If an aggressive driver is following you, drive to a safe place such as the nearest police or fire station, gas station or other

areas where there are people. Use your horn to get someones attention. Do not get out of your car and

Summer light

Officials say they are harmless to humans and present no damage to crops. However, they do provide hours of entertainment for children with a jar and they can be found throughout the state this month.

ROASTED BEET SALAD

2 cans (15 ounces each) sliced beets, rinsed, drained, dried
1/2 cup olive oil
1/4 cup red wine vinegar
Salt, pepper, and garlic powder to taste
1 and 1/2 cups crumbled feta cheese
1/2 cup sliced black olives
1/4 cup chopped green onion

Line a jelly roll pan or large rimmed cookie sheet with foil. Spray foil with non-stick cooking spray.

Place dried beets in singlelayer. Place under hot broiler, turning every 2 to 3 minutes until edges start to brown. Watch carefully to avoid burning. Broil for 8 to 10 minutes total. Remove from oven and ketto cool at room temperature. Mix oil, vinegar, salt, pepper, and garlic powder until blended. Pour over beets and add remaining ingredients. Stir gently so you don't break up the beets. Serve.

REFRIGERATOR PICKLED BEETS

2 pounds fresh beets
3/4 cups red wine vinegar
1/2 cup sugar OR honey
1/2 cup water, filtered
1/2 large red onion

Trim the top stem to roughly 1 inch and thoroughly wash beets. Place washed beets in a large pot of water and boil for roughly 20 minutes, or until tender. (Just like boil-

ing potatoes, the larger beets will take longer to cook.) Strain cooked beets in a colander and cool your beets by running cold water over them. When your beets are cool enough to safely handle, while running cold water, use your hands to slip the skin off the beets. Trim the remaining stems and root flush with the beet bulb.

Cut or slice cooked beets as desired. Combine vinegar, sugar or honey, and water in a small saucepan. Heat to dissolve sugar. Remove from heat and set aside. Layer cut up beets and sliced onion in glass jar(s) or container(s) with a tight fitting lid. Pour vinegar mixture over top. Add additional water if needed to fully submerge the beets in the liquid. Cover with a tight fitting lid and place in the refrigerator for 5 to 7 days before enjoying. Refrigerator pickled beets will keep for about 2 months.

ONION BEET SALAD

2 cans (15 ounces each) julienne beets
1/2 large red onion, thinly sliced
juice of 1 lemon
2 tablespoons olive oil

Drain beets well. Add thinly sliced onions. Add lemon juice and olive oil. Mix well. It is best if made the day before so flavors will blend. Refrigerate until ready to serve.



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
