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

New accessible playground is coming to local elementary school

At the request of Rockcastle County School board members, guest speakers provided a Gifted and Talented presentation to the board and guests, during a special called meeting last week. The presentation included a demonstration of a new Gifted and Talented website to better communicate between parents and teachers as well as the students and explanations concerning how gifted and talented students are chosen.

Presenters said parents or teachers can recommend a student for the program but that child must then pass program tests to be eligible. The presentation also presented a slide show of accomplishments over the past year and is an effort to provide more transparency in the program, officials said.

The board also approved the monthly financial report and job descriptions for the new Career Impact Coordinator, as well as the 2024-25 salary schedule.

Parents could face judge if child has too many absences

House Bill 661 passed the legislature this April changing some of the requirements of the Director of Student Personnel in Kentucky schools.

HB661 amends KRS 159.140 leaving a director of student personnel with explicit duties to contact the county attorney concerning kindergarten through fifth grade students who have 15 or more unexcused absences from school.

"I have no choice in the matter anymore," said Rockcastle County School Director of Student Personnel Marcus Reppert at last week's special called school board meeting. "What the county attorney does with the case is out of our hands at that point."

According to state websites, and a Kentucky Department of Education release, 15 or more unexcused absences could now send a parent or guardian in front of a judge which could result in hefty fines or even jail time. A diversion system is in the wordage of the bill but confusion among lawmakers suggests amendments may change the wording of the bill, according to some media outlets.

Kentucky Schools receive \$4,200 for each stu-

dent from the State of Kentucky in SEEK funding and such truancies can cost a school systems serious funding, according to the Louisville Public Media (LPM)

Media outlets also say,

through the statutes, a parent can face criminal charges and fines up to \$250, along with a class B misdemeanor charge.

Local man charged with first degree rape Jonathan Graves, 30,

of Mount Vernon, was arrested last Tuesday, July 16th by the Laurel County Sheriff's Department at his residence on Sand Springs Road.

According to a uniform citation, Graves, has been charged with the first degree rape of a 15year-old juvenile in Rockcastle County.

The citation says that on July 14 the accused unlawfully committed the act of rape in Rockcastle County on the juvenile.

County Attorney Jeremy Rowe said Graves was arraigned on Monday, July 22.

A preliminary hearing has been scheduled for Wednesday, July 31.

Rowe said the arrest was made by an FBI task force officer with the Laurel County Sheriff's Office. The Rockcastle County Sheriff's Office and the Kentucky State Police assisted in the

Cheatle claimed she used it because of a "lack of functionality on government issued devices."



The Cape and Mattie Jones' Farm Dear Journal,

I was born and grew up in Laurel County. Our family lived out in the country about five or six miles from London, the county seat.. London was a nice quiet little town with little Mom and Pop family businesses lining Main Street. It had a population of about two or three thousand and that almost doubled on Saturdays when everybody went into town to get groceries and other necessities. Out in the country, the Swiss Colony, where

my family lived, was rural with gentle rolling hills and little farms dotting the countryside for miles and miles with a few woodland areas here and there. All that changed one day when they decided to put a four lane highway through, joining London and Somerset ***

Our place at one time was a small farm, the Keller farm and before then the Isili (pronounced easily) farm. The Kellers and Isilis were Swiss settlers who first came to





The old farmhouse was on a little sloping hill facing east that looked out over a pretty green yard sloping down to a grove of sycamore trees and a large pond. It was an old two story frame house covered in tar paper that was gray. It had a front porch that covered the entire front of the house. I would say it was built back in the 1880s or 90s .Miss Mattie had several pots of varying flowers on the porch. On the inside, it was the typical old fashioned farmhouse that you might expect. Living on the Jones farm besides Cape and Mattie, who were elderly, was Della, a relation and two teenage boys, brothers, Terry and Teddy, who ran around with my

brother, Don. About once or twice a week My grandpa, Roscoe Norton and his son, Leslie Roscoe or better known as "Junior" would go to the Jones farm to get fresh butter, eggs and milk. While we were there we always visited for a little while

and maybe ate a treat that Miss Della or Miss Mattie had made such as a cake, pie or cookies. I always had milk and the adults had coffee. Before visiting, I always had to play in the pond in the

shade of those big sycamore trees. Grandpa showed me how to skip a rock across the pond. It was a good thing for three, four or five year old girls to know.





John 3:16 says, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have



fers Principles of Agriculture and Agribiology courses.

by Jerry Hopkins



Terri was one of the writers influenced and inspired by the East Texas Christian Writers Conference cosponsored by East Texas Baptist University and the Marshall Regional Arts Council encompassing Marion, Harrison and Panola Counties. Terri has become a widely published writer in the area of Nacogdoches, Center and other Deep East Texas communities. This sparked my interest in pursuing Caleb's story

article on Caleb gives this insight, "His interest grew through the gift of a Ghost Plant from a neighbor. That sparked his interest, and he began researching how to propagate not only this plant, but many other succulents. By 2021 and early 2022, he began to purchase more succulents and began to propa-

gate them. Caleb says, "I remember sitting in my grandmother's living room when I came up with the idea to sell them. When my dad noticed that my interest had lasted for over a year and started hearing me call plants by their botanical names, he realized that I was really serious about horticulture and started encouraging me."

This prompted Caleb's parents to assist him in beginning his own business by purchasing him his first greenhouse which was a 7' x 8' popup greenhouse which was soon filled with over 400 growing plants. Caleb was on his way with his business venture. In 2023 Caleb realized he needed a larger greenhouse to accommodate his growing business. With the help of many, including The Lily Farm in Center, he reached his goal of enough money to buy a

new 16' x 24' polytunnel

greenhouse that he uses today.

During this time Caleb, with the help of his technology-savy father, became very active on social media, posting almost daily about his plants which helped him grow his customer base. His social media posts came to the attention of the Texas Nursery & Landscape Association (TNLA) that led to this young entrepreneur being invited to be a guest at their Hort Forum in Grapevine in January of 2024. He was able to attend educational seminars, tour wholesale and retail nurseries and meet other nursery, greenhouse owners. He has continued his studies of horticulture through the Texas Nursery Professional Curriculum by TNLA. He is well on his way to becoming a Texas

sional. Another factor that interested me was Caleb's spiritual interests. He is a Christian and acknowledges that his faith plays a great part in his decision and love to "grow things." This fact is clearly seen in naming his business, "Gen1 Greenhouse."

Certified Nursery Profes-

"Gen1 stand for generation one, meaning this business was not something I inherited, but one I started, as the first

generation in my family to do so, but more importantly, Gen1 stands for Genesis Chapter 1, as in the scripture that records God's creation of earth, nature, and all things. This business is a way for me to enjoy God's creation, share the love of it. and give back to it. The closeness with God that you feel as you watch the sun rise, and hear the birds singing, is like nothing else."

There is to be more. Caleb also says, "Luckily for me I am never alone, because God is on my side. By the grace of God, and support of my friends and family, I strive to one day own a nursery that is open, not just season long, but yearround! With a bakery/ café run by my mom and sister, and more greenhouses than you can count. I plan to one day ship nation-wide, invent a new hybrid plant, or through selective breeding create a new cultivar. Of course, my biggest plan for Gen1 Greenhouse, is to honor God in very decision I make."



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

Yards to Paradise

Only a couple generations ago mealtime was often preceded by a few steps behind the house or a short trek to the garden, from whence the cook would find salads, garnishes, herbs, harvest major vegetables in season. and quit likely obtain fresh eggs from a nearby coop. Unless you live in a city housing unit having no yard, patio, porch or flat rooftop-you can probably still obtain part of the ingredients for a meal from garden or landscape plants.

One of the first things to consider is a little foraging if you've not planned in advance to grow a few vegetables, fruit trees or bushes at your place. Do you have dandelions? Duh! All of us do. This is one of the most nutritious of vegetables, once you get past the thought of killing it upon sight. Just recently. The Epoch Times ran an article summarizing results of 54 studies conducted earlier in the current decade, and the most common reported health benefits of dandelions were their antioxidants, and liver-protecting and anti-cancer properties. Dandelion is also diuretic and antiviral. Not to mention just loaded in vitamins and minerals free for the taking. (7/10/24, B3) Likely there may be

chicory, purslane, violets,

dock, and other edible

"weeds" you can seek out

for a salad, garnish or pot

herbs in your yard or in

your neighboring vicinity Check your flower bed, if you grow any flowers. Daylilies and hostas are common and most parts are edible.

Pansies, violets, nasturtiums, oxalis, alliums, and even the petals from marigolds and zinnias can dress up a dish.

If you have room, grow a garden. Not only is it likely to reduce the ticket total during grocery shopping trips, but having a meal just outside ready to harvest is handy if there's some reason for a store closure, curfew, or unexpected interruption of normal day to day habits. Gas shortages, power outages? Things do happen.

Perhaps you have nut trees, or bushes with berries, or things going to seed—investigate if there are safe and edible things already in your landscape you'd not thought about. Kousa dogwoods have fruits and they may taste boring, but I bet a good cook can make them better. That's just one easily forgotten forage fruit.

New or additional landscaping for your home is the perfect time to include some things that can provide a quick snack, a complete meal, or some food security.

How many yards have grass, but no weeds or bugs or worms or something for a songbird to (Might well have Astroturf and plastic trees.)

A landscape does not need to look like an orchard or a country garden plot to provide meals for the table from time to time. If you can grow a Bradford pear, you can grow a fruiting pear. If you can do flowering crab apples or peaches or almonds, you likely could have the fruiting kind growing in their spot. A blueberry, honeyberry, gooseberry or Oregon grape could replace a nandina or boxwood in a landscape plan. Some of the viburnum look almost like hydrangeas but have edible fruits

Strawberries are easy. A planter or raised bed or a 5 x 10 or 7 x 15 portion of a flowerbed should be sufficient for tresh eating in season by todays average family. Pulling a few weeds and applying some fertilizer late summer should insure a bountiful strawberry patch.

Tomatoes, at least the small cherry sort, can be grown just about anywhere. On a rocky slope or in a flower pot, they're not that picky.

Back to blueberries, how much does a half pound clamshell of them cost at the supermarket? A couple mature blueberry bushes are capable of 10 or 20 or more pounds of fruit per bush. Even if you must pay \$15 for a one gallon or bare rooted plant, you'll soon harvest your money back. Plus fresh picked tastes better than the picked and transported for long distances choices available at the produce counter.

Nut trees, even some oak trees, offer food for the taking. Dogwoodsthe native ones are not considered valuable for food, but the cornelian cherry and the Japanese and Chinese ones offer useful quantities of fruit.

Pawpaws, serviceberries, persimmons, mulberries are useful dual

purpose trees one can landscape with. Even juniper berries are edible in a pinch.

Grape vines rather than wisteria for that arbor. Blackberries and goji berries can easily be supported by an existing lattice or board or wire fence. Also "maypops", that is passion flower vines.

Pink runner beans, purple bush beans, purple leaved hot peppers, can be just as edible as the more traditional ones. Kale, cabbage, daylilies, pansies, horseradish, rhubarb, asparagus—it boggles the mind that so many never think of add-

ing plants such as these to their yards with the idea of stepping outside and collecting something for the dinner table.

Your landscape can look lovely and be a quick place to grab something to eat at the same time If some landscaping is desired or needed at your address, why not use some edible plants in the project. There are hundreds more besides those that are mentioned in this article.

In closing, I'd recommend taking a look at "the incredible edible landscape" YouTube video by Kelly Jackson of the University of Kentucky for those that desire to dive deeper into this topic. 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

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

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
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Frankfort Update

By Josh Bray Budget Highlights: Investing in Rural Kentucky

Our commonwealth has experienced tremendous growth over the past seven years, despite the impact of the pandemic and nearly crippling inflation. However, we still have far to go in ensuring that all communities have an opportunity to improve the quality of life for their residents. Of course, the needs differ from community to community, as urban, suburban, and rural Kentuckians have different priorities and different goals. For example, rural areas face challenges like limited access to healthcare, education, and employment opportunities. Infrastructure, including roads and internet connectivity, is often underdeveloped.

Economic instability, population decline, and an aging population further strain limited resources. Additionally, rural communities often struggle with retaining young talent and attracting investment for sustainable growth. With these challenges in mind, lawmakers have been working to identify ways to support the efforts already going on in rural Kentucky, as well as incentivize future efforts.

One of the most effective ways to do so is to use the budget as a tool for building up our rural communities. This does not mean subsidizing failed programs, but rather finding what works and figuring out how we can build on it.

Here are a few examples of the funding initiatives that will benefit rural communities included in this year's budget, HB 6.

Includes an additional \$1.23 million for additional staff positions within the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority.

Provides an additional \$30.8 million in FY 25 and \$25.3 million in FY 26 for expansion of the Clean Water State Revolving Fund

Increases funding by \$84.7 million in FY 25 and \$41.1 million in FY 26 for expansion of the **Drinking Water State** Revolving Fund

Includes an additional \$217.2 million in FY 25 and \$868.9 million in FY 26 for broadband deployment as part of the federal Broadband Equity Access and Deployment Program (BEAD)

Provides \$2 million over the biennium for a one-time addition to the Kentucky Mountain Regional Recreation Authority (for a total of \$1.75 million in FY 25 and \$1.25 million in FY

 Increases funding for the Rural Mental Health, Suicide Prevention, and Farm Safety Program by \$500,000 in each fiscal year and moves the program to the Department of Agriculture• Appropriates funding of \$150,000 in FY 25 to create a comprehensive agricultural plan

 Increases funding by \$153,900 in FY 24, \$443,900 in FY 25, and \$443,900 in FY 26 for additional personnel for emergency preparedness within the Department of Agricultur

•Increases support by

\$1.5 million over the biennium to hire additional personnel for regulatory field services within the Department of Agriculture

In addition to HB 6, HB 1 includes \$260 million for water and wastewater infrastructure projects in the first year, with another \$84.7 million in the second year; \$35 million in each fiscal year for airport capital improvements across the state; \$100 million in each fiscal year for the GRANT program; \$50 million in each year to support approved mega-development projects; \$10 million in each year to the Kentuckiana Works program to support workforce training; and \$35 million in each fiscal year towards economic development efforts through the Kentucky Product Development Initiative.

We also approved legislation aimed at supporting local communities, including:

Water or Wastewater Assistance for Troubled or Economically Restrained Systems (WWATERS): HB 563 is aimed at helping struggling rural water and wastewater systems that do not qualify for normal funding. The measure creates two revolving loan funds. The first will address maintenance and upgrade needs and can be awarded as a grant, loan, no-interest loan, or forgivable loan. The second is an emergency fund to restore service after disasters.

Expanding economic development opportunities in rural Kentucky: Attracting jobs and economic investment to

rural Kentucky has to be a priority to ensure success throughout the state. HB 13 updates the Kentucky Product **Development Initiative** (KPDI), a program designed to help local communities develop potential economic development sites, to make it more accessible to smaller counties. We also provided \$35 million in each year of HB 1, an investment bill

Matching funds through the Kentucky GRANT program: Lawmakers created the Kentucky Government Resources Accelerating **Needed Transformation** Program (GRANT) program to help communities match the funds required to obtain access to federal grants. Rural communities throughout the Commonwealth often struggle to obtain federal assistance because they lack the money necessary for a required match. We provided more than \$200 million in the previous budget to use as seed money, and continue to emphasize what an opportunity the program is. After some evaluation, it appears the program would be a better fit for the Economic Development Cabinet than it is for the Department of Local Government.

CHOCOLATE **PECAN COOKIES**

6 ounces semi-sweet chocolate chips 2 large egg whites, at room temperature 1/8 teaspoon cream of tar-

1/2 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cup packed light brown sugar

1/3 cup finely chopped pecans 1/4 cup sifted all-purpose flour

30 pecan halves for garnish 🛝

Preheat oven to 350°.

Spray two baking sheets with nonstick cooking spray. Melt chips in smallglass bowl in microwave. Cool slightly. In medium bowl, using an electric mixer beat egg whites together with cream of tartar and vanilla until soft peaks form. Gradually beat in brown sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, to make stiff peaks. Drizzle melted chocolate on top of egg whites and gently fold until thoroughly incorporated. In a small bowl, stir the chopped pecans and flour until well blended. Sprinkle over chocolate egg whites and gently fold until blended (batter will deflate slightly). Immediately drop byrounded teaspoon onto baking sheets. Place a pecan half in the center of

each.

Bake for 12 to 15 minutes or until firm around the edges, turning pans halfway through baking time to promote even baking. Remove the cookies from the pans and cool on wire racks.

NUT BARS 1 bag (1 pound) cream filled chocolate cookies 1/2 cup butter, melted 1 can (14 ounce) sweetened condensed milk 3 and 1/2 cups flaked coconut

1 cup sliced almonds 1 tub (8 ounce) Cool Whip®, do not thaw 8 ounces semisweet
