Rockcastle voters agree with voters across the state

Rockcastle County voters typically agreed with the rest of the state, and the nation, as Republicans regained control of the highest office in the land, electing Donald Trump President and J.D. Vance Vice President. Republicans also regained control of the United States Senate with, thus far, a 53-46 margin. The fight for the house is still ongoing with the count 203 for Democrats and 214 for Republicans as of Monday with 218 needed for control and Republican Josh Bray, incumbent, was re-elected District 71 Representative.

Rockcastle voters also agreed with the rest of Kentucky on the two Constitutional Amendments voting in favor of Amendment One and against Amendment Two.

Amendment One asked voter if they favored prohibiting persons who are not citizens from voting in Kentucky. Amendment Two would have allowed the general assembly to financially support students outside the public school system.

Locally, Mount Vernon voters chose David Bales and Chandler Hunter as new city council members while re-electing four incumbents, only ousting Michael VanWinkle and longtime council member Shelly Raines Lewis. In January, Mount Vernon City Council members will be, Julie Asher, top vote getter with 548 votes, Lonetta Daugherty received 437, Wayne Bullock 384. David Bales 364. Gertha Mink 360 and Chandler Hunter with 329.

The Brodhead and Livingston City Commissioners remained the same since each of those candidates had no opposition. Commissioners in Brodhead are Bryanna Mullins as the top vote getter with 286, Harold Taylor got 280, Brian Bullock 255 and Teddy Rose 231. Commissioners in Livingston are Jerry Gross as the top vote getter with 63, Greg Carpenter received 61, Troy Goforth 61 and Jeff Carpenter 57. Livingston Mayor Sandi Singleton easily retained her position over her opposition Lawrence Thaver in a 52 to 28 vote.

City found in violation of Open Meetings Act

It appears that, unless something changes, Medical Cannabis facilities may locate inside the City limits of Mount Vernon if they so choose.

A meeting by the Mount Vernon City Council on August 12, 2024, has been determined, by the opinion of the Kentucky Attorney General, to be in violation of the Open Meetings Act which requires public entities to inform news media in writing at least 24 hours in advance of any meeting, according to Kentucky State Representative Josh Bray.

During that meeting, the council voted unanimously to place the issue of medical cannabis facilities on the ballot in the 2024 general election. The subject did appear on the ballot and passed in a 505 to 355 vote. The Attorney General's

opinion was handed down the day after the election, on November

Many local officials had expressed their opinion that if the city council meeting was found to be in violation of the KRS statutes, the cannabis issue vote may become null and void. However, it appears that is not the case.

After researching the

issue in detail, Rockcastle County Clerk Danetta Ford Allen said she believes the vote does count and medical cannabis facilities may locate in the city limits now that the vote has passed. "It is my understanding that the Attorney General's office has no authority to say the vote doesn't count," said Allen.

Judge fights for city

A serious situation last week, that could have left over 200 Livingston water customers without service indefinitely, was mostly averted.

Local officials leapt into action after Woods Creek Water District turned off the water supply to the City of Livingston at about 3:30 Tuesday afternoon. Television news crews began showing up in Livingston on Wednesday morning.

"I talked to Woods Creek officials and they said they hadn't received

any payment since August and they had simply had enough," said Rockcastle Judge/Executive Howell Holbrook, Jr. However, Livingston Mayor Sandi Singleton and City Clerk Samantha Smoker said they had never missed a payment since they took office in 2023 and had mailed \$6,000 to Woods Creek in October. "Our water bill is up to date. All this past due money is from previous administrations. We took over in January of 2023 and inherited all this water debt," said Singleton. "We are trying to get

it taken care of and we were told everyone was satisfied with our arrangements. Suddenly, they turned us off."

Former mayor explains Livingston water problems

The problem with the water system in Livingston stems from years ago, according to former Livingston officials.

"Past mayors, before me, dug out of their own pocket several thou-

sands of dollars to fix problems with the water system here, and to pay Woods Creek. But after that, no one could really afford to pay out of their own pocket to keep Livingston's water system up and running," said past Livingston Mayor Jason

Medley.

 Medley explained that there are only about 200 customers on the water system in Livingston. "Two hundred people is just not enough to operate in the black," he said. "There is no room for even the smallest problem." (See "Explain" on A5)

eral officials with KIA (Kentucky Infrastructure Authority,) and past mayor and water superintendent Jason Medley as well as current mayor Singleton "When I first became involved with the city (as commissioner) Livingston was behind about \$40,000 in water payments and though we were paying them each month, the bill continued to rise," said Singleton.

City Clerk Samantha Smoker said the overdue bill had been up to \$89,000 with penalties and interest and other

These lyrics are for the TV show, The Beverly Hillbillies. The sitcom aired on CBS from 1962 to 1971 featured the story of a backwoods family who moved to Beverly Hills, California after striking oil on their land in Missouri.

What, you may wonder, could the connection be between the old TV show and Rockcastle County? OIL!

Seventy-five years ago The Mount Vernon Signal reported large-scale oil drilling in progress in the county. The article in the October 27, 1949 issue was brief but interesting:

" The prospect of Rockcastle County having oil wells of the producing kind is creating interest here since operations started recently on the farm of Mr. Lige Hopkins near Maretburg. Mr. James L Dorst, of Stanford, formerly of Chicago, is doing the drilling with the most modern equipment and is backed by huge oil Inter-

ests who are giving the "go" sign. Twenty thousand acres have been leased in this territory and before the operations are finished it will be definitely known whether this county has oil or gas and to what extent because samples are being removed every few feet and analyzed by a geologist and they will also be sent to the University of Kentucky for further analysis. Mr. Dorst said that after they "were through with the several wells to be drilled no other prospector would find it worthwhile to test the formations in this territory. The well at Mr. Hopkins' farm is now at a depth of 600 feet and the Mississippian, Devonian, and Silurian formations have been tested. The drill is now in a mud silica which in many areas is oil-producing. The well will probably reach 1600 to 2200 feet before it is given up as a dry hole. In that case, it will be sealed and another one started."

There are several abandoned or orphaned oil wells in Rockcastle County. It is believed that there are more than 15,000 abandoned wells in Kentucky. Some date back to the Civil War, others as recently drilled as the 1960s. In fact, Kentucky has some of the highest numbers of documented orphan wells with more than 14,000 wells.

I have always associated oil with the Middle East or at least Texas, but not Kentucky, and much less Rockcastle County. According to the website, eia.gov, "Kentucky accounts for less than 1% of US proved crude oil reserves and production..." but about half of the counties in the state do have producing oil wells, most are located in eastern and western Ken-

tucky. Unfortunately, there are no reports of any Rockcastle Countians striking it rich from oil production. There are no stories of any of our uncles striking it rich and heading off to Beverly Hills, but there was a time when the prospect was a consideration.



3. They want the preacher to be dynamic and charismatic and stir the souls of men with emotionally charged sermons punctuated with humor.





(Continued from front) 58.8% (2,087,317) of Kentucky voters cast their ballot while 61.6% (7,789) of Rockcastle Countians voted. Only 34% (4,319) of registered Rockcastle voters went to the polls in 2023.

Rockcastle County, Trump received 6,635 votes while Harris received 986.

Hal Rogers was unopposed for his seat as Kentucky's Representative in the 5th district and Senator Brandon Storm was also unopposed for his state 21st district office. Both candidates received well over 6,000 votes in Rockcastle County.

Kentucky State Representative Josh Bray easily dominated his democrat opponent in both Rockcastle and Pulaski Counties as well as district wide. In Rockcastle County Bray received 6,549 to Rachelle Riddle's 983 while in Pulaski County Bray received 2,365 to Riddle's 316 and in Laurel County Bray received 1.688, to Riddle's 236. Districtwide, Bray received 15,168 to Riddle's 4,350.

Eliza Jane York retained her position of Circuit Court Clerk with nearly 7,000 votes and David Dalton kept his seat as Commonwealth Attorney with 6,546 votes in Rockcastle County and over 41,000 in the 28th district. Both were unopposed.

Three Rockcastle School Board members were also on the ballot but all three were unop-Lisa Cornett and Matto Income add on sinabilist Chaliff were each reelected to their seat on the board.

Mount Vernon voters elected to allow medical cannabis facilities in the city limits in a 505 to 355 vote.

According to County Clerk, Danetta Ford-Allen, there were 384 mail-in votes cast and 94 Rockcastle Countians voted early with an excuse. During the three-day early voting with the no excuse needed voting, 2,498 Rockcastle Countians cast their ballot at the courthouse. On election day, there were a total of 4,813 votes cast at the five voting locations. A total of 7,789 of the 12,642 registered voters in Rockcastle County cast their ballot in the 2024 general election.

(Continued from front) an attorney and file suit. "I believe it would require a citizen to file suit to challenge the issue on the ballot," she said.

When Governor Andy Beshear announced the Cannabus issue, cities and counties were given four options. Entities could allow such facilities, forbid such facilities, place the issue on the ballot or take no action. Local cities that took no action would be effectively adopting the county's decision to forbid such facilities, according to officials.

The City of Mount Vernon voted to place the issue on the ballot. According to Allen, the city has the option of acknowledging the violation and withdrawing their vote to place the issue on the ballot, or a citizen may hire an attornev and file suit. "I don't really see either happening," Allen said. "I really don't know what to expect will happen at this point."

Though the issue of medical cannabis facilities locating in Mount Vernon was placed on the ballot during what the Attorney General has determined to be an illegal meeting, local officials say the vote will count unless more action and expense is taken by individuals or entities.

Still, many believe it is unlikely such a facility will locate in Mount Vernon since state wide, 48 dispensaries are expected and officials say over 5,000 applications have already been received for those licenses available.

According to Medley, when the first big water occurred Livingston, around 2006, the city had barely made enough profit to pay that monthly water bill off. "But then we had that big line break," Medley said. " Now all of a sudden the city had to take the money the city charged customers for the water they used, and pay off contractor after contractor to repair the leak, plus pay for the water the customers used, plus pay for the thousands of gallons that poured into the river because of the leak. There was no way to pay it all."

So, the city fell behind on its payments to Woods Creek. "Then it happened again and again. We had leaks every month that had to be fixed or else no one anywhere got any water at all."

Medley said each month penalties and fees were added to the past due amount and then when customers paid their bill, another water line break would occur or a valve. costing thousands, would stop working. "When a city makes a couple hundred dollars of profit for water per month, there is no way to catch that up," he said.

Over the years, Medley said the breaks continued and the bill grew until Woods Creek was no longer willing or able to forgive the debt.

Medley says he agrees with the KIA (Kentucky Infrastructure Authority) when they suggest "the city does not need to be in the water business."

According to Medley, the problem cannot be fixed until "A big amount of money is spent upgrading the system. And I mean a big, big amount," he said. "With the current system, lines will continue to break and the city will not have money to repair

Medley says he hopes the situation gets better but something must change first. "We were never out of water last week. Our tank was full. But this will continue to happen and it isn't really the fault of any one person. We are trying to keep water for everyone in our town and it is a day to day struggle," he said. "People talk about 'those down Livingston' but we are all one county and Sandi (Singleton, current mayor) Dwane (King, former mayor) and myself and the mayor before me have worked just as hard as anyone else to do the right thing."

Medley says he is proud of his city. "We love our town and we all want what is best for everyone in Livingston," he said. "Still, the truth is the truth." Livingston doesn't have the customers to run a water system and doesn't have the funds to fix the problem.

fees. Currently, KIA officials say the overdue amount to Woods Creek is \$114,000, including some work done on a Livingston water line.

"My only concern is that there are a lot of people who paid their water bill every month and did nothing wrong and suddenly their water is off," said Holbrook. "I don't know where the money went or what happened. I am just focused on getting the water back on for these people who have been paying their bill."

Singleton and Smoker say they had applied for KIA grants to pay the overdue amount and Singleton said the City of Livingston had informed Woods Creek of that plan.

Kentucky American Water (KAW), who purchases water from the City of Livingston and then resells that water to some customers in the Sand Hill area, purchased bottled water and distributed it to residents who were affected.

However, in an unexpected twist, Singleton and Medley say the water flow to Livingston never stopped. "Apparently thinking we had no water, they (KAW) turned off their pumps taking water to Sand Hill," Singleton said. "It would have damaged their equipment if the pumps were on and there was no water, and they were told we had no water. What they didn't know was, there was water."

Singleton Livingston customers were "never without water because the water tank still had water for several days of normal usage." Plus, according to Singleton (for reasons she couldn't explain), water continued to flow to Livingston. "As a matter of fact, we had to turn the water off at the tank by Friday, because of overrun, six hours before Woods Creek turned the water back on."

Still, since Woods Creek Water District had officially turned the water off, officials scrambled to have water turned back on for the community.

According to Kentucky State Representative Josh Bray, he had sponsored HB-553 which placed \$150 million with the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA) for struggling districts who had such emergencies just last year.

In another twist of timing, the November meeting of KIA to discuss distribution of such funds was set for last Thursday.

Holbrook immediately traveled to Frankfort to attend that meeting, pleading with KIA to provide a grant that would pay Woods Creek enough to turn the water on again. Holbrook spoke at the meeting on behalf of the City of Livingston asking for help while negotiating with Woods Creek on the phone. Holbrook had declared a State of Emerallowing gency Livingston officials to apply for emergency grant funds to pay Woods Creek. Several speakers with

KIA expressed concern originally speaking out against providing the funds. "Before I can vote for this, I need to know where the \$114,000 owed to Woods Creek went," said one board member. "I see a pattern here and bailing them out won't fix the problem. They would just need it again in six months." Another memasked about Livingston's financial condition. "Obviously Livingston does not need to be in the water business. This is not a healthy asset and I encourage us to look into where this money went," he said. Officials say the Public Service Commission is currently investigating the issue.

A KIA statement after Thursday's meeting said, "It was revealed that the debt (owed to Woods Creek) dates back to before 2021 when an individual or individuals collected over 200 residents' water fees and allegedly used the funds toward other expenditures. This resulted in a \$114,000 debt to Woods Creek Water District. There is an investigation through the Public Service Commission."

However, after more discussion, negotiations with Holbrook and the water supplier, the company agreed to accept \$57,000 immediately to turn the water on again and in six weeks the remaining \$57,000 would be due or the water would be turned off again.

After more negotiations with KIA and Woods Creek, Holbrook said KIA agreed to provide the \$57,000 grant to pay Woods Creek. However, before the next \$57,000 is released, the city must meet with the Division of Water and work out a detailed plan to prove this situation will not arise again. If such a plan is established, KIA may pay off the past due bill in full, according to Holbrook.

By Thursday midday, during the KIA meeting, Woods Creek officials said they had just received the \$6,000 check that Singleton and Smoker said they mailed over a month ago.

By late Thursday, Woods Creek had agreed to turn the water on again and Livingston officials had agreed to meet with the Division of Water to work out a long term plan to avoid such problems in


the future.

Holbrook said there is currently a Public Service Commission investigation into where the funds were used that were supposed to pay Woods Creek's water bills over the years. However, officials say the investigation may be on hold since the Livingston City computer system was confiscated nearly a year ago by the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department as part of another investigation concerning the

use of other grant funds.

Senator Brandon Storm, Bray Holbrook worked closely with Singleton, Smoker, KIA and Woods Creek to find a solution. "We can't express how much we appreciate those who helped us get this taken care of," said Singleton. "We were never without water and we have the time stamped photos of the water tank to prove it. But we need to get this past due bill taken care of. I'm not blaming anyone we just want this problem taken care of so that we can move forward as a city."

Holbrook returned from Frankfort after the full afternoon of meetings to inform the public of the outcome. Officials say the water service was turned on again Thursday afternoon. "All I am focused on right now is making sure that 200 people have water. They can worry about why and who later. But today (Thursday), people in Livingston have

With the win, Rockcastle advances on to the second round and will have to make a 3-hour trek into Pike County to take on the Belfry Pirates as well as having locked up a back-to-


back 10-win seasons for the first time since the 2005-06 seasons when legendary head coach Tom Larkey was at the helm of the Rockets.




Blake Mullins makes a tackle during the Rockets' win over Estill County.

blocked great and the running backs did a tremendous job running. We were able to line up in different sets and do a lot of things."

It was that combined effort by everyone who played on the offensive side of the ball that allowed Rockcastle to chew up 507 yards of total offense on just 44 plays with 422 coming on the ground in 34 plays.

Powell had arguably the best game of his career with 234 yards on just 10 carries and score three touchdowns. The senior fullback would join Jackson is the 1,000-yard rushing club with his efforts against Estill County as well as adding one reception that would go for three yards and a touchdown.

Jackson, who gained

entry into the 1,000-yard rushing club last week, matched Powell with three rushing touchdowns and would finish with 11 carries for 119 yards. He would add on three receptions for 37 yards.

"Both Carter and Isaiah have rushed for over 1,000 yards this season and that's quite an accomplishment for a team to have two kids do that," mentioned Larkey. "Its hard to focus on one kid when the other is liable to break it. Its just a luxury to have two tough and fast kids. Our offensive line has gotten a lot better once they started taking and figuring out each other. Its not as easy as some think. It takes time to get it all worked out."


The scoring would start at the 7:43 mark of the first quarter when Jackson plowed his way into the endzone from three-yards out.

After a strong defensive stand allowed the Rockets to get the ball back a few moments later, Powell staved off one tackle at the line and three more at midfield before breaking away for a 69-yard scoring run to give the Rockets a 14-0 lead with 3:37 left in the opening stanza.

Estill would try to keep things on track for a comeback and gave a valiant effort, but anytime the Engineers would do anything in the second quarter, the Rockets would answer right back.

Estill got on the scoreboard on the first play of the second quarter, but was answered



back just 0:22 seconds later when Jackson took the toss from quarterback Caden Lovell around the left side and raced along the sideline before breaking a couple tackled a scooting his way in for an easy 62-yard score.

Just 0:21 was all it took for Estill to answer back after the Engineers got outstanding field position from a poor play from the Rockcastle kickoff team. The Engineers would get a 4-yard scoring run to make it 21-13 with 11:12 left in the second quarter.

Powell respond with another long touchdown run from his fullback position less than a minute later as he took the handoff on the trap play and busted through a gaping hole opened by the offensive line and raced untouched into the endzone from 72-yards out.

After four touchdowns in less than two minutes of action in the second quarter, it seemed like an enternity before either team scored again, but it was only a little over six minutes of gameplay before Powell would score in a 43-yard run with 3:56 to go before halftime.

Estill County's Jax Niece would score his third touchdown of the night with 1:53 to go in the second quarter, but per usual, his touchdown was immediately answered back with a Rockcastle touchdown this time by Jackson from 14-yards out with just 0:29 before heading into the locker room.

"It was very important to score right back to keep a three-score margin," Larkey said in regards to his team effort to respond so quickly as they were on offense after giving up a touchdown. "You don't want to ever let up and give a team hope that they can come back and win. I think our score right before half took away all momentum and hope they had. It had to be demoralizing to have a team score and then give up a long run right back."

The score before half was in fact demoralizing to the Engineers as they came out of the halftime meeting a bit flat and not able to produce any kind of effort on offense.

Rockcastle would hold Estill County scoreless in the second half while adding a touchdown of its own in each quarter including the previously mentioned 3-yard touchdown pass from Lovell to Jackson in the third quarter and a 15-yard rush in the fourth quarter by Brayden Thacker for the final margin.

In addition to Jackson's and Powell's statistical efforts mentioned earlier, Thacker would add four carries for 14 yards and one touchdown to go along with Lovell's two carries for 20 yards, Hunter Pingleton's four carries for 19 yards and Dylan Burke's three carries for nine yards.

As far as passing statistics, Loyell was 7-for-8 for 72 yards and one touchdown and freshman backup quarterback Camden Larkey was 1-for-2 for 13 yards.

"It's going to be a tough task to beat Belfry at home, but our kids will go there and play as hard as they can and with as much pride as they have and hopefully be able to get some breaks and luck and win the game," Larkey added about the Pirates. "Our kids know Belfry is good and they know it's going to be tough, but they won't

back down. That's what makes me so proud of these kids is they don't back down from anyone and play like a real program with tradition."

Belfry advanced to the second round will an easy 49-14 win over Knox Central. Although the KHSAA's RPI factor will determine matchups in the third round, whoever wins in this matchup will have a high enough RPI to guarantee themselves a home matchup in the third round.

The Rockcastle Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution and the Lafayette Chapter Sons of the American Revolution marked the grave and had a dedication ceremony in honor of Revolutionary War patriot, Private Francis A. Ramsey on Sunday, November 3, 2024. KSDAR, KYSSAR, KSCAR chapters, descendants and members of the community were in attendance to honor and pay tribute to Francis' memory and his service to this country.

Ramsey was born 17 December 1764 in Essex Co. VA and was living thereat the time of the revolution. He fought in the battles of Guilford Courthouse, Camden. Eutaw Springs and was at the siege of Ninety-Six. Afterwards, he was attached to Colonel Lee's Light Infantry. Lee's Legion was a military unit of Dragoons in the Continental Army. Dragoon units were made up of cavalry men and foot soldiers and gained the reputation for efficiency and bravery on the battlefield and ruthlessness equal to that of Tarleton's Raiders. He served in the infantry until the end of the war and was honorably discharged in Georgetown, SC on 6 June 1783.

He married Martha Allen on 28 May 1788 in Powhattan, VA and soon thereafter, moved to Kentucky to settle in Rockcastle County. Theyhad at least ten children. He died 26 December 1842 in Rockcastle County and is thought to be buried at the Hiatt Cemetery.

The dedication service was presided over by Rockcastle Chapter NSDAR Regent Karen Adams and LaFayette Chapter KYSSAR President Patrick Wesolosky. The service began with the welcome from Regent Adams followed by the posting of colors and standards by KYSSAR Color Guard. The invocation was given by Rockcastle Chapter Vice Regent Kathy Bobo.
