ORDER

We the republican circuit court district committee of the 28th Circuit Court District of Kentucky, pursuant to its authority vested in us as such committee, and now being assembled in a committee meeting duly called for the purpose of devising ways and means of nominating candidates for judge and commonwealth's attorney of the 28th Circuit Court District of Kentucky to be voted for at the regular November Election, 1909, a quorum being present and acting, do hereby

Resolve: Order and direct that a primary election be, and the same is now hereby called to be, held in and throughout said district on Saturday the 3rd day of April, 1909 for the purpose of nominating a republican candidate for judge and commonwealth's attorney of the 28th Circuit Court District of Kentucky, to be voted for at the regular November election 1909, and we order and direct that a poll be opened in each of the regular voting precincts on said date and kept open between the hours of 10 o'clock A. M. and 4 o'clock P. M. in the Counties of Pulaski, Wayne, Rockcastle and Clinton, and the counties being all the counties in said Circuit Court District, for the purpose of making the nominations above said; and we further order and direct the republican committee of each of the above named counties to cause the said primary election to be held in their respective counties as set out in this order.

Resolved: That the following rules be and they are now and hereby adopted for the government of this committee and the several county committees of the district, and the republicans in this district, in holding said primary election:

1st; That the cost of holding said primary election be and is now fixed in the sum of \$1500.00;

2nd; That the cost of holding said primary election shall be borne by the candidates for nomination at said election, and shall be divided as follows: The candidates for judge shall pay one-half of said amount in equal proportions, and the candidates for commonwealth's attorney shall pay one-half of said amount in equal proportions, and said amount shall be paid to the Chairman, E. Cloe, of the District Committee, not later than 12 o'clock noon, on the 19th day of March 1909.

3rd; That the republican committee of each county in said district shall meet in the court house in their respective counties at one o'clock P. M. on the 24th day of March 1909, and there be appointed suitable and qualified persons to act as officers of election of said primary election for each voting precinct in their respective counties, and that each candidate shall have the right to furnish the respective county committees with a list of names of suitable and qualified republicans to act as election

officers, and if the candidate submit such lists the election officers shall be named from them, dividing them as nearly equal between the respective candidates as can be done.

4th. The election returns shall be deposited with the republican committee of each county at such place as said committee shall designate. The republican committee from each county shall meet in the court house of their respective counties on the 6th day of April, 1909, and after being first duly sworn as required by law, shall canvass and count the returns of said primary election, and properly certify them to the district committee of the said 28th Circuit Court District Republican Committee of Kentucky, and which shall meet in the town of Somerset Pulaski County, Kentucky, on the 9 day of April, 1909, and shall canvass and count the returns from each county comprising said circuit district, and shall issue certificates of nomination to the candidates receiving the highest number of votes in the counties of said district, and shall properly certify their names and nominations to the Secretary of State of Kentucky, requesting a certificate that their names be printed on the official ballot to be used at the regular November election 1909, if the republican county under the device of the Republican party to win a Log Cabin for the offices named in said certificate.

5th. In case only one candidate for circuit judge and one candidate for commonwealth's attorney meet the requirements of this call, not later than 12 o'clock noon, on the 19th day of March 1909, this primary election shall not be held; but instead, a district committee of said circuit court district shall meet in the town of Somerset Pulaski County, Kentucky, on the 22nd day of March, 1909, and shall declare such candidates to be the nominees of the republican party, to be voted for at the regular election 1909, of the offices of judge and commonwealth's attorney of the district aforesaid, and shall certify their names to the Secretary of State as set out above.

6th. In case only one candidate for judge or only one candidate for commonwealth's attorney shall meet the requirements of this call, not later than 12 o'clock noon, on the 19th day of March, 1909, this primary election shall not be held, as to such candidate and such office, but instead the district committee of said circuit court district shall meet in the town of Somerset Pulaski County, Kentucky, on the 22nd day of March, 1909, and shall declare such candidates to be the nominee of the republican party, to be voted for at the regular November election 1909, for the offices of judge and commonwealth's attorney, and shall certify his name to the Secretary of State, as set out above, and in this case a such should occur as to either of the said offices the primary election shall be held only as to the other offices, and the cost thereof shall be borne equally between the candidates for said other office.

7th. Each candidate meeting the requirements of this call shall have his name printed upon the ballots to be used at said primary election.

8th. Only known republicans who are or will be legal voters in November 1909 at the regular election in their respective voting precincts at the date of this primary election shall be permitted to vote in said primary election, and none others.

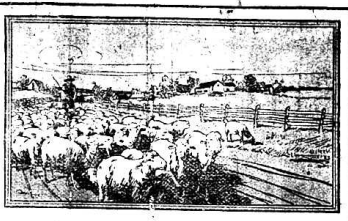

THE JUDICIAL TANGLE STRAIGHTENED OUT

At a meeting in Somerset last week of leading Republicans from each county in the 28th Judicial District, it was sought to straighten out the middle in the race for Circuit Judge. By a mutual understanding Circuit Judge M. L. Jarvis and Commonwealth's Attorney B. J. Bethurm had become opposing candidates for the nomination for the Judge-ship. Each of them in his inchoate thought if finally Judge Kennedy advised the prohibition, although he had no opposition in his race for Commonwealth's Attorney, in the interest of harmony he was willing to sacrifice his ambitions if by that means order and good feeling might be restored. Acting upon the suggestion of Judge Kennedy, a compromise was effected, the result being that Hon. B. J. Bethurm was agreed upon for the Circuit Judgeship and Judge M. L. Jarvis for the Attorneyship. This suited everybody, Judge Jarvis much preferred the Attorneyship for the reason that during his six years service as such he could have an opportunity to handle up a good civil law practice; because the law was better and also because the performance of his duties as such would not take him away from home so much, as well as many other reasons. The compromise was agreed to by representatives from each county in the District and it is conceded that neither of the candidates will have opposition.

Judge Kennedy was hailed as the hero of the occasion, his act showing that he preferred his party's success rather than his own Representative if much county in the District pledged him their hearty support six years hence, but Judge Kennedy remarked that "it was too far off". But who can tell what time may bring forth? Judge Kennedy's noble act deserves him anything he may ask for—Wayne County Outlook.

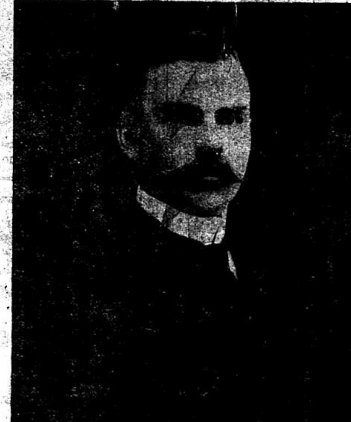
