WRECKED AIRSHIP

LAST FROM STORM DESTROYS GERMAN AIRSHIP IN WAR MANEUVERS.

Stricken Craft Remains Afloat Only an Hour—Baron Von Maltzahn Among Those Aboard.

Written for Newspaper Union News Service Berlin.—The German marine airship L.1 was destroyed in a hurricane five miles north of Heligoland, in the North sea. Torpedo boats were immediately dispatched to the scene and fifteen of the crew and passengers are reported missing and it is almost certain that the airship was destroyed.

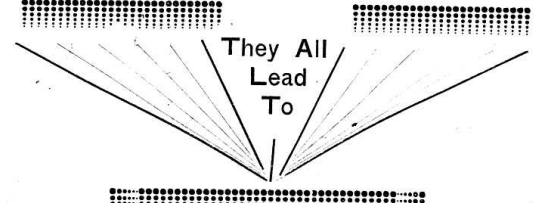

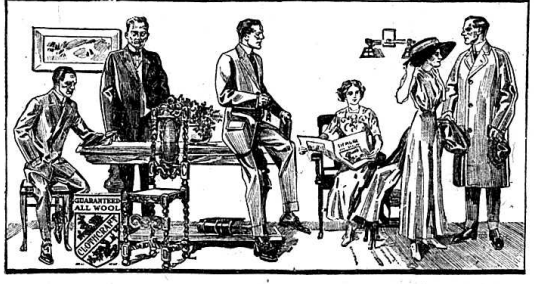

SEWELL AND BOONE WAY
Nat B. Sewell, of London, the Democratic nominee for the Legislature from the district composed of Laurel and Rockcastle Counties and which has for seeming ages been represented by a Republican was in Lexington this week, smiling, happy and confident that he will be the winner over Charles Luker, the Republican nominee and Theodore Morey, the Progressive nominee, in November. In the Presidential election last fall the district gave Wilson 1,953 Tatt 1,167 and Roosevelt 1,576. Sewell is a graduate of Yale, has been a teacher in the public schools in the mountains, has traveled all over the mountains during three or four vacations, and has put in three years on road in the Central, Southern and Western States as the representative of one of the independent book firms, and he is regarded as more than ordinarily capable and as a good politician with vote getting proclivities. He is deeply interested in the proposed "Boone Way," and he is telling the people of Laurel and Rockcastle that if he is sent to the Legislature as their representative he will do all in his power to secure state and Federal aid for the project. The idea is to build a modern road of 80 miles from Crab Orchard to Cumberland Gap, following the Boone Way, over the Wilderness road, or which Daniel Boone and his fellow pioneers first made their entrance into Kentucky. This would provide a good road all the way from Cincinnati to Knoxville, and would open up to vehicles one of the wealthiest sections of the state in mineral and timber possessions. The next Legislature will be asked for an appropriation of \$200,000 for the road, and strong forces are at work at Washington to secure from Congress an additional \$600,000.—Cincinnati Enquirer.
