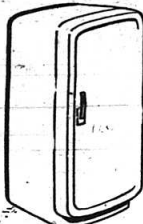

Phone Hearing Set Tomorrow At Frankfort

Tomorrow is "T Day" for Rockcastle County. . . "T" for telephone. . . "T" for telephone. . . At 1 p.m. CST, Friday, the Public Service Commission at Frankfort will begin hearings on an application by the Rockcastle Telephone Co. for a permit to operate in the county. Lawyers, owners and other interested persons are expected to gather at the office of the Commission to hear arguments by attorneys of the Northeastern Telephone Corp., of Chicago, why the company's affiliate, the Rockcastle Telephone Co., should be granted a permit to operate side by side with the Mt. Vernon Telephone Co. The Commission will also be prepared to hear other persons who might want to argue against allowing the new company to come to Rockcastle. About 35 persons, maybe more, are expected to attend the hearing from Rockcastle. The general public is invited to the hearings and may express an opinion on the telephone system if they wish. Should the PSC grant the new company a franchise, the company is expected to move into the county within a matter of hours to establish service in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston. Other service, branching into several sections of the county, will be initiated as soon as the company consolidates its position and service. Dial service is expected to be started within 18 months after the franchise is granted. It takes about 18 months to design a dial system for a given area. Being able to operate in Rockcastle will give Northeastern a direct line between its toll center now under construction at London, and the Eubank and Sumner Hill telephone companies which it owns in Pulaski County. The company also owns several other companies in other areas of Kentucky.

"I intend to perform my duties as an officer regardless of location." So said Police Chief Wilson, this week in a letter entitled, "A Message To The Citizens Of Mt. Vernon From The Chief Of Police." The letter was the first official reaction to a petition being circulated in Mt. Vernon which calls on the Mt. Vernon City Council to take action to halt what the petitioners believe are too many arrests of tourists by city police. Commenting on Chief Wilson's letter, the Mayor said he would stand behind the police 100 percent. "The petition is expected to show up if they get it to the city council in July, at which time the question of how much law enforcement is needed in the city within a matter of hours to establish service in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston. Other service, branching into several sections of the county, will be initiated as soon as the company consolidates its position and service. Dial service is expected to be started within 18 months after the franchise is granted. It takes about 18 months to design a dial system for a given area. Being able to operate in Rockcastle will give Northeastern a direct line between its toll center now under construction at London, and the Eubank and Sumner Hill telephone companies which it owns in Pulaski County. Adult Polio Clinic Scheduled At Local Hospital Monday

A polio clinic for adults will be held each Monday for the next eight weeks at the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital. The clinic is sponsored by the hospital and the local health department. The clinic will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. (C.D.T.). All persons from infancy to 40 years old may take the Salk vaccine. Each shot costs \$2. The \$2 takes care of the vaccine, sterilization, of equipment and labor. There is a series of three shots. The first inoculation and the second are two months apart. The third vaccination is given seven months later. The local health department now gives Salk vaccine to anyone over 19 years old, but does not go over that age. The hospital, however, must charge for shots given to those under 20 as well as those from 20 to 40 years old.

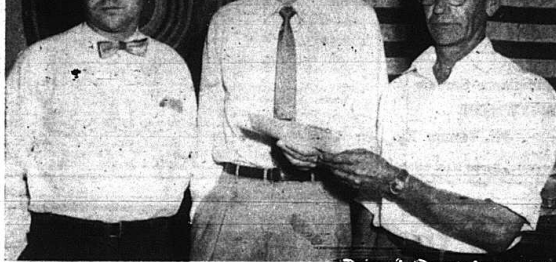

Wheat Profits Are Boosted by Adding Plant Food in Spring

MIDWEST farmers can make money through the use of fertilizer on their small grain crops this spring, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

The extra bushels per acre ready well supplied with phosphate and potash, a top-dressing of nitrogen fertilizer can be profitable.

Wheat yields increased an average 5.3 bushels per acre for each 25 pounds of actual nitrogen top-dressed per acre in early spring, reports R. K. Stivers, Purdue University agronomist, in citing nine-year Indiana tests.

Farmer experience in some Midwestern states has shown that it often pays to use from 200 to 300 pounds of a complete fertilizer containing nitrogen, phosphate and potash, such as 10-10-10, the committee points out, especially where new seedlings are being established.

Spring seeded oats responds well to fertilizer, particularly when nitrogen is added to phosphate and potash fertilizer, according to Stivers. Oats yields in Indiana increased up to 12 bushels per acre where new seedlings of nitrogen was added to 0-12-12 fertilizer applied at the rate of 500 pounds per acre.

Nitrogen in fertilizer can be drilled with oats at seeding time, or top-dressed after the crop emerges, Stivers says.

New Highway Projects Readied By State Group

A new list of proposed Kentucky road-improvement projects will be presented soon to the Governor's Advisory Committee on Highways for consideration.

The new projects will be in addition to the \$85,000,000 federal-aid program approved April 29 by the committee for work during the 14-month period ending July 1, 1958.

This was announced by officials of the State Highway Department at the committee's third meeting May 29.

Engineers of the Automotive Safety Foundation and the department are studying the proposed projects.

The list of new projects should be ready for submission to the advisory committee by the middle of June or, at the latest, July 1, said Dwight H. Bray, chief state highway engineer.

The A. S. F. is a non-profit national engineering organization serving as consultant to the department in mapping the expanded highway program.

Bray suggested that the committee hold itself in readiness for a meeting to pass on the proposed new program as soon as the list is complete.

The \$85,000,000 program's financing is independent of the state's \$100,000,000 road bond issue voted by a 6 in 1 margin at last November's election. Money for the \$85,000,000 plan kicking off a proposed 13-year, unprecedented highway building program in Kentucky is already in hand or in sight.

Some proceeds from the proposed road bond issue would be used to help finance the second list of projects if the bond issue's legality is finally upheld by the Court of Appeals.

ANOTHER INCREASE.

Those of us who are in the two-packs-a-day crowd, will greet the rise in the cost of cigarettes with something less and elation. The price increase in cigarettes came about, we're told, because of a manufacturer's increase. The increase is about eight cents on the carton, but it was enough to cause the price of cigarettes locally to jump from 25 cents a package to 30 cents a package--that is, if you buy your cigarettes from a machine and smoke filters. Regular cigarettes in the machines remain the same, with king size filters absorbing the entire increase.

As we have said, those of us who are chain smokers, or use two packages a day, will greet the increase with something less than elation. Though a nickel or dime a day will not in itself cause us to reduce the number of cigarettes we smoke, or cause us to give up the habit, it is another few cents added to the many other cents which are all symbols of the steady rise in the cost of living.

total of 12 after two or more days of hunting.

Seasons for bobwhite and cottontail quail, grouse or native pheasant, rabbit, opossum, raccoon, mink, skunk, muskrat and red fox will open in Nov. 20 and continue through Jan.

The bag limit for bobwhite or cottontail quail, will be ten singly or in aggregate and the possession limit will be 20 after two or more days of hunting. The grouse bag limit is two or a possession limit of four after two or more days of hunting, while the rabbit take may be eight a day or a possession limit of 16. There is no bag limit on opossum, raccoon, mink, skunk, muskrat and red fox.

Opossum and raccoon may be taken with dog only from Oct. 20 through Nov. 19. This means that a coon may be taken on the ground by a dog but may not be shaken from a tree nor may the hunter climb a tree to force out the game.

In addition, coon hunters are given a training season for their dogs beginning Sept. 1 and continuing through Oct. 19. Neither opossum nor coon may be taken during this period in any manner.

Don't Use Taxophene On Tobacco Crop

As the season for spraying and dusting tobacco plants to control insects approaches, farmer are warned against using the insecticide material Taxophene.

Though an excellent killer of hornworms and grasshoppers, the material leaves an off-taste and aroma in the tobacco which makes it highly objectionable for use in cigarettes, Russell Hunt, Kentucky Agricultural Extension tobacco specialist, says.

While recommendations for several years have NOT included Taxophene, manufacturers report leaf from certain areas still have the offensive odor caused by the material. Even when used on small plants in the early summer, the objectionable odor and taste will persist through harvesting, storing and manufacturing, he noted. Thus, it should not be used.

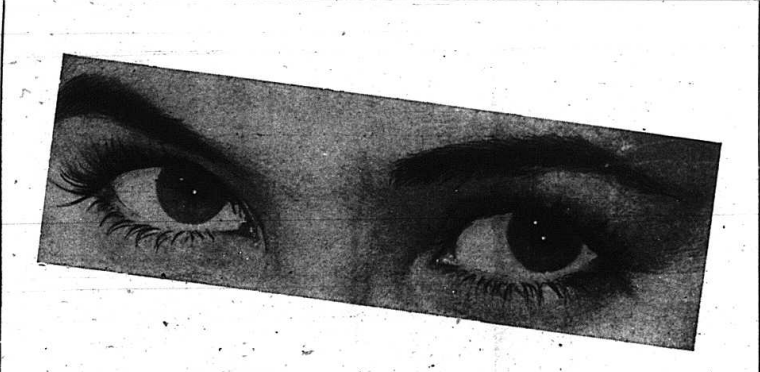
