ORDINANCE NO. 252: An ordinance of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, imposing a license tax upon all persons, firms or corporations, which allow public dancing on premises, which are open to the public and operated for profit. The City Council of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky does ordain as follows:
Section I. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, within the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky to allow public dancing on premises, which are open to the public and operated for profit, without first having obtained a license therefor from the Clerk of the City of Mt. Vernon, and pay the required fee thereon as hereinafter provided.
Section II. The annual license fee for allowing public dancing, as set out in Section I of this Ordinance, shall be five hundred dollars, (\$500), payable in advance.
Section III. All revenue received from the payment of license fees, required by this Ordinance, shall be paid into and become a part of the General Fund of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky.
Section IV. This Ordinance shall not apply to churches, schools, private homes and non-profit organizations.
Section V. Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this Ordinance, by failing to obtain the license and pay the fee as herein provided, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than fifty dollars, (\$50) nor more than two hundred dollars, (\$200) for each offense; and each day said person, firm or corporation so separate shall constitute a separate offense.
Section VI. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to exempt any person, firm or corporation so licenses, from

Firemen Get State Aid

A proposal by Rep. Ed Thomas (Dem., Dry Ridge) for the state to grant financial aid to the smaller cities and county Voluntary Fire Departments has received favorable comment from state officials and volunteer fire departments throughout the state.

Thomas, at the request and with the assistance of volunteer fire departments, has prepared and will introduce a bill in the 1958 session of the General Assembly which will set up a state Voluntary Fire Commission, consisting of eight members, one from each congressional district. All members to be appointed by the Governor, must be from an active volunteer fire department. The bill also provides for an appropriation of \$500,000 per year which will be allotted local volunteer units to be spent for approved items of equipment, housing and training of members. (No department would be allowed over \$2,000 a year for the above items.)

Don S. Sturgill, Commissioner of Public Safety, who will be charged with the administration of the bill has commented, "I think the bill has merit. We have long wanted to improve fire fighting methods in rural areas."

C. P. Thurmond, State insurance Commissioner said, "such a bill would have a tendency to reduce fire premium rates."

In stressing the need for the passage of the measure, Representative Thomas stated that no estimate could be placed on the annual savings in property and human life.

Stroke Victims Get Assistance

Doctors refer to the body's blood vessel system as the vascular system and diseases that chiefly affect the blood vessels are vascular diseases.

If these diseases affect the blood vessels of the brain they are called cerebral vascular diseases. One of the most alarming results of cerebral disease is a "stroke."

"An idea of the importance of cerebral vascular disease is gained from the fact that this type of cardiovascular disease accounts for more than one-tenth of all deaths from all causes in the United States each year.

In Kentucky, 12 percent of deaths from all causes are attributable to cerebral vascular disease, according to the Kentucky Heart Association, which raises money through the once-a-year Heart Fund campaign to finance research to find the causes of cerebral vascular diseases and other heart and circulatory diseases.

A stroke usually occurs very suddenly when an artery to the brain is blocked or is closed by a blood clot. A person who has had a stroke may have paralysis of an arm and leg and often, difficulty in speaking. Occasionally these symptoms clear up rather quickly. Frequently, though, some physical disability remains.

In some cases warnings in the form of brief attacks of numbness or weakness or visual difficulty precede the onset of a stroke, and treatment in time may prevent the stroke.

Much research is under way to learn more about hardening of the arteries, the largest single cause of cerebral vascular disease.

But even today, with existing knowledge, your physician can do much to prevent some cerebral vascular disease and some strokes. And even the majority of those patients who have been disabled for a long period of time as a result of strokes can be partially rehabilitated. Some may recover completely.

Research work on the heart and its functions is made possible through contributions to the Heart Fund drive.

Mrs. Hazel Owens and Mrs. Alma Jean Robbins, both of Mt. Vernon, are co-chairmen of the drive for Rockcastle. The campaign to raise some \$300,000 in Kentucky opens Feb. 1.

In Rockcastle the campaign is sponsored by the Woman's Club. Business gifts will be in charge of Ed Hunt.

Game Warden In Auto Wreck Near Lamero

Irvin Smith, game warden of Rockcastle County, was injured last Thursday, when his automobile was forced off the road by an unknown motorist.

The accident occurred on old U. S. 25 south of Livingston and near the Lamero bridge.

Mr. Smith received a bruised leg and internal injuries. Emerson Coltrin came along shortly after the wreck and took Mr. Smith to his home at Livingston. Mr. Smith's wife and son-in-law, Joseph French, accompanied him to the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital. He was later transferred to St. Joseph Hospital, Lexington.

Mr. Smith is reportedly, slightly improved.

Mt. Vernon Officials And Lexington Company Discuss Factory Site Possibilities

If the Cowden Mfg. Co., of Lexington should decide to locate an additional plant in Kentucky, Mt. Vernon will be allowed to bid on the plant.

So said W. L. Cowden, an official of the company, at a meeting Tuesday, at Lexington, with several interested persons from Mt. Vernon.

Mr. Cowden explained to the group there is a possibility that his company will expand its manufacturing facilities later in the year. He said nothing definite was planned at Lexington, but he would contact Mayor Carl Brown and the City Council when the time arrived.

The Cowden Mfg. Co., also has plants in Lexington, Morehead and Mt. Sterling. It manufactures blue jeans and dungarees.

Working with Mr. Cowden were: Floyd Owens, representing the City Council; Mayor Brown; Dr. Jack Henderson and Les Hopkins, Mt. Vernon; and Fred Craig, representing the Rockcastle Jaycees.

Letters were presented to Mr. Cowden from the Chamber of Commerce, Jaycees, Lion's Club, Rockcastle Development Association and the Farm Bureau.

The meeting was set-up by the Council and Mayor. They, in turn, asked the Jaycees and the Chamber of Commerce to join in the conference since it might be necessary to form a private corporation to build or lease a building. The city could not legally furnish a site.

Carl Williams was re-elected vice president; Preston Nunnally, secretary and W. L. Huff, treasurer.

Plans for the establishment of a soil testing laboratory in Mt. Vernon were made Friday, when George Corlier, extension specialist in soils, from the University of Kentucky met with the Rockcastle Laboratory Committee.

The group also visited Lincoln County and studied their system of handling soils samples.

The laboratory is to be set up in the basement of the County School Administration Building.

The Soils Laboratory Committee met and elected Bradley Saylor, Chairman, Harold Betty Cash, Secretary-Treasurer. Other members are Kenneth Stewart, Cleo Gibson, Les Durham, John Bullock and Clyde Linnville.

At this meeting it was decided that 35 cents would be charged for each soil sample. Of this fee, 25 cents would go to the technician for the testing process and the other 10 cents would be spent for chemical reagents and replenishing equipment.

To date, no technician has been named. However, Harold Miller, extension specialist, from the University of Kentucky, is scheduled to come to Rockcastle, Feb. 15 and train some person or persons.

One factor is believed to be favorable to the success of the program. The agricultural conservation practices program requires that farmers make soil tests in order to qualify for payment for some of their conservation practices.

Practices 1 and 7, which are seeding and improving grass seedling, require soil tests.
