If a person has a cardiac arrest, hes has about six minutes to live unless help gets to him. Sometimes an ambulance run in Rockcastle County can take as long as ten minutes

Some people at Rockcastle County Hospital were concerned about it. two facts, and to do something about it. they are teaching others how to save heart attack victims, according to Michael Barr, a physical therapist and one of the directors of the course.

Mr. Barr said the course has been offered four times, and 45 people have been certified by the American Heart Association. "Our goal is to certify between 500 and 1.000 people in the county." he said.


