

State Sends Money For Police Dispatch

For Police Dispatch

Rockeastle County is receiving 182,098 from the state this week to set up a central dispatch system for police. County Judge Executive Hubert

The system will simplify calling the police, Judge Thacker said, because both the Sheriff and the city police will be at one telephone number, open 24 hours a tone telephone number, open 24 hours at the London post, but they will also be summoned from the new dispatch system, when necessary.

The award came through Gov. Julian Carroll's office after the pgifect from the Kentucky Crime Commission at its September meeting in Owensboro.

Of the total award, 1828,884 will come from federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration funds, and \$1,604 will come from the Mentucky Crime Commission at the September of the County Shriff's office.



Part of Rockcastle River To Be **Protected As Recreational Area**

The Kentucky Department of Natural Resources is now studying a stretch of the Rockcastle River and coming up with a plan to manage it for recreational purposes. Only a few miles of the river in Rockcastle County will come under this land management plan, but landowners in that area will be restricted in certain ways. They will have to ask the state government for permission to timber, or mine, or build roads or buildings within 2000 feet of the river.
