Note their policies on guarantees, refunds and exchanges.

Never send cash. Pay be check or money order.

Be sure to fill out everything you should be company form.

Keepa record of your order.

Keep a record of your order, along with name and address of company, date ordered, etc.
Return unsatisfactory merchandise immediately. Let com-

many know the reason.

Where To Complain

Just in case you have a complaint you haven't been able to work out with the company, here's what you should do:






