

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




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


Saylor Letters

significant increase in profits when their return on equity was increased from 13 percent to 13.9 percent. This excessive and in-Increased from is percent to is.s percent. This excessive and in-flationary rate increase is a severe burden upon the custo-mers of KU, particularly senior citizens and those on fixed in-comes."

titizens and those on fixed in-comes." According to Beshear, the attorney, general's expert wit-ness testified that KU's coal-inventory was \$20 million in excess of the optimum level. The Energy Regulatory Com-mission agreed that KU's coal-inventory was excessive, but failed to reduce the S0 million. Consequently, said Beshear, the Kentucky ratepayers are forced to pay for KU's bad manage-ment decisions. "If allowed to stand, the commission's order will set a bad precedent which could al-low every utility in Kentucky to need or the consumer's ability to pay." Beshear said.


