



Great Saltpetre Cave full of interest, history and legend

by Nancy Mullins

One of the most inter-esting and historically sig-inficiant sites in Rockcastle is the Salt Petre Cave lo-cated on Ky. 1004 (the Brush Creek Road), nine miles from the county's 1.75 South exit.

South exit. According to legend, the Cave was discovered by yohn Baker, a Tennesse man who came through this area with his wife and three children hunting for new territory to settle in. The story goes that the family was hungry and the family was hungry and desperately in search of food. They tracked a bear into the Cave following a light snowfall. Storytellers say the family wandered around in the Cave for several hours and finally found their way back out, whereupon the fatther soon killed a rabbit. The family was so hungary they ate it raw. Baker reportedly settled 3

Baker reportedly settled in the area and later died and was buried not far from the Cave.

from the Cave. A large screage of va-cantrand in that area in-claimed the Cave was first claimed by George Monigo-merry The faste encouraged such claims since land taxes were one of the few mad or ratisting operating revenues. Monigomery later killed

a man and sold the several thousand acres he held in 1813 to Calloway Mullins for a gun and \$50. and "left the country."

"left the country." Richard Mullins, a des-cendant of Calloway owns a portion of that original tract which includes one of the two large caves, en-trances. Mullins still has Montgomery's original land tract claim which he says is in perfect condition. Calloway leased the Cave to the government during the Civil War in re-turn for a position as form

turn for a position as fore-man of the mining opera-tion, the assurance of work for his five sons and a royalty.

royalty. Richard's grandfather, Charles C. "Biggy" Mulling, the youngest of the 5, was only 12 years old at the time but worked a man's shift (from daylight 'til dark) driving an ox-cart. He was paid 25 cents a day. He, like the others, had to work 10 days so they could be paid by so they could be paid by so djece.

piece. Among the relics and interesting items left for viewing in the Cave from early work there are leach-ing vats, an iron kettle, a two wheel ox cart and numerous tools.

According: to Mullins, saltpetre (used in making gun powder) was extracted from the Cave during the War of 1812, the Mexican

War as well as the Civil War. The Cave played an im-portant part in various as-pects of life of area resi-dents. Following the Battle



Remains of the large log pen vats used in the first step in the process of extraction of salt petre are still present in the cave today. They were lind with hand-rived boards and made as waterproof as possible. The floor of the vats slanted toward the front and drained into troughs hollowed out of large logs. After the vats were filled with dirt if was saturated with water which trickled out and into the troughs as a form of ye. it was then bolled with woodsake lye in large iron kettles. A residue of salt pebre, left caked in the bottom, was removed and ground to a powder. To this was added charcoal and sulphur to make gunpowder.

buried in the Cave. Appar-ently the Rebel Army which marched close, never found the cave and thus it was used as a hide-out for livestock and farm animals when the Armies came through through.



Pickle Making Do's and Don't's

Do's and Dou's. Pickle making isn't all that hard if you juit fol-low an up-to-date tried-and do's and don'ts. A free UK circular on making pickles and relishes is yours for the asking at the Rockcastle County Ex-tension office, located in Mt. Vermon. Here is a list of do's and don'ts for suc-cessful pickles. Do use fresh, firm, per-ter vegetables. Use slightly underripe fruits. Start pic-ter vegetables. Use slightly underripe fruits. Start pic-ten your you been picked-the same day, for sure. Use pure, coarse salt if

MAKING SAUERKRAUT

Q. My homemade sauer-kraut turns an unappetizing color after a few months. Is it due to the heat treat-ment in a bolling-water-bath canner? A. No. The heat treat-ment (which is necessary to prevent spollage) does not cause sauerkraut to turn dark.




