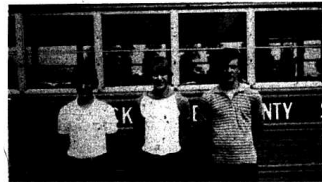

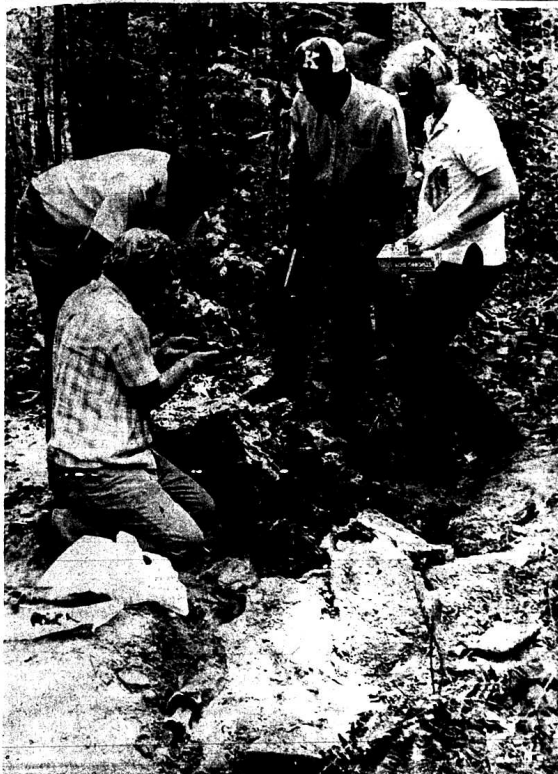

## Two Pulaski County men will run for Circuit Judge's seat

Even though Kentuckians will go to the polls this November and elect statewide officials and, more in particular, a new governor, voters in Rockcastle County will probably be affected more by the one local race on the ballot.

A circuit judge for Rockcastle and Pulaski counties will be elected in November and only two candidates are on the ballot, both of whom are Somerset attorneys. At the present time, both men are judges in the state's court system.

Rockcastle and Pulaski County District Judge Daniel Venters and Rockcastle and Pulaski County Circuit Judge John T. Mandt are the candidates for the office.

Mandt, 50, was appointed by Governor John Y. Brown to fill the remainder of the term left by the resignation of former Judge Phillip K. Wicker last year. Wicker left the job to join the law practice of Somerset attorney Lester Burns.

Venters has been District Judge for 4 1/2 years. While both men are highly qualified for this job, the Signal would like to take this opportunity to give our readers some background information on the candidates.

Judge Dan Venters, 33, was born in Charleston, West Virginia, the son of Joseph and Mary Venters. When Venters was very young, he moved with his family to Ashland where he started grade school. Venters and his family later moved to Grove City, Ohio, where he graduated from high school. Venters then attended Ohio State

University where he studied economics and later was accepted at the University of Kentucky Law School.

While Venters was at Ohio State, he met his wife, Michele. She was from Louisa, Kentucky and the two married while at Ohio State.

After graduating from U.K.'s law school, Venters moved his family to Somerset where he joined U.S. Congressman Harold Rogers' law practice. Venters immediately took over the duties of assistant Commonwealth Attorney because Rogers was Commonwealth Attorney at that time.

In the fall of 1979, Venters was appointed to fill the vacancy of District Judge and, in 1980, he ran unopposed for the same position. In 1981, Venters also ran, unopposed, in that same year, District Judge, Walter McGuire.

Venters lives on a small farm in the Science Hill area of Pulaski County. He and his wife have three children, Joey 10, Andrew 6, and Emily 4. The two older children attend Science Hill Elementary School.

While Venters was serving as assistant Commonwealth Attorney, he took more cases to court than any other Commonwealth Attorney, and, as District Judge, he has heard over 12,000 cases.

Venters is a member of the Lions Club and started a Cub Scout pack in Science Hill in 1978. He is a member of the Church of Nazarene at Science Hill which he attends with his family. He has a wife, Michele, and two children, Joey and Emily.

Somerset with Harold Rogers' wife, Shirley. They deal in used paperbacks.

Judge Mandt was born in Williamson, West Virginia, to Ambrose H. and Digna T. Mandt in 1933. His family was living in Martin County, Kentucky at the time. Mandt was raised in Floyd County until when he was 13 years old, his family moved to a coal camp near Martin. Mandt graduated from the Kentucky Military Institute, the University of Kentucky and the University of Kentucky Law School.

Judge Mandt moved to Somerset in 1960 and has been a resident of Pulaski County for the past 23 years. He served in the United States Navy for four years and left the Navy with a rank of Lieutenant J.G.

Mandt is past president of the Pulaski County Jaycees, past chairman of the Community Development Committee for Kentucky Jaycees and a former national director of the United States Jaycees.

He is also a former president of the Chamber of Commerce in Somerset and former president of the Pulaski County Industrial Foundation, as well as former president of the Young Men's Christian Association.

Mandt graduated seventh in his law class of about 125. HE has been Somerset City Attorney for the past seven years as well as City Attorney for Science Hill and Ferguson.

Besides being City Attorney, he has been legal advisor and secretary for the past twelve years for 300 farmers in a Grade A Milk Producers' Association. (Cont'd to P.13)

## Unidentified body found in wooded section of Rockcastle

An unidentified body was found last Wednesday afternoon in a wooded section of Rockcastle County near the Laurel County line at Buffalo.

Two hunters found the remains of a body around 8 p.m. while they were squirrel hunting, according to Rockcastle County deputy corner Roy Martin.

The body, which was almost completely covered by concrete, had been dumped into a tire track on a farm that belongs to Roscoe Norton of Laurel County, said Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor.

Dr. David Wolfe, the

state's forensic anthropologist, who was called in to remove the body, said Thursday while at the scene, that the body, which was that of a man, had apparently been on the farm since around the first of June this year.

Wolfe said that fragments of the chest and head were found strewn over the wooded area and that animals had unearthened portions of the body some time ago. Wolfe said that the strong odor coming from the body caused the hunters to find it.

Although state police are still not releasing much information about the body, investigating officer Doyle Stogill said the

man had apparently been murdered. Stogill said that at least two bullets were found on the body at the scene.

Authorities said Thursday that they have some idea as to the identity of the victim.

A man that was apparently involved in a car-theft ring in Laurel County earlier this year, was reported missing around Monday and has not been seen since authorities said. The man missing is from Northern Kentucky.

Dr. Wolfe said Thursday that he should know the identity of the man sometime this week. He said that the false teeth found at the scene would help considerably.

## Rockets win second straight, stomp on Whitley County 36-6, host Lincoln Friday

Rockets white-washed the Whitley County Colonels Friday night in their second game of the season, but the Colonels managed to put six points on the board with 4:42 remaining in the fourth quarter on a run around left end from the Rockets 26 yard line and Rockcastle County had to settle for a 36-6 win over their district opponent.

Senior running back Scott Robinson struck pay dirt on the opening kick-off as he took the kick on the Rockets' 15 yard line and his teammates executed a beautiful wedge play for him to traverse 85 yards for the score with barely a finger laid on it. It was Robinson's fourth touchdown of the young season and, before the game was over, he would add four more to his statistics.

After an aborted extra point run attempt by quarterback Chris Cornelius, Whitley County took the Rockets' kick-off and returned it to their own 45-yard line. From there, they moved the ball on the ground, to the 33 for their first down of the game. But, good pass defense by Devin Ford and David Glovac on the next two plays made it 3rd and 10 and Whitley fumbled but recovered it on the third down play. The Colonels had to punt the ball away and the Rockets should have taken over on their own 22 but, a flag on the play—the first of many for the Rockets during the game—for too many men on the field, gave Whitley County 15 yards and a try for a first down on 4th and 4. The Colonels didn't make the first down and the Rockets took over on their own 25.

Three plays later, Robinson got some excellent blocking by Burley Burkhardt, James Poynter and Troy Williams and ran 67

yards for his second touchdown of the night. This time, a pass from Cornelius to Greg Long in the end zone all alone, hit the mark and the Rockets led 14-0.

There was no more scoring in the first quarter with Tim McKinney getting to the quarterback at one point in the backfield for a six-yard loss and Robinson intercepted for the Rockets on the 50-yard line. In the second quarter, the Rockets led the Colonels on a fourth down play and took over on their own 25. But, they were immediately hit again with a penalty which made it first and 15 on their 20 yard line.

On the first play from scrimmage, Cornelius found senior back Bozie Kirby outstanding his defenders and connected with him for a long pass which Kirby then took to the Colonel's 15 yard line. Robinson carried the ball three straight times and struck pay-dirt the

second time from about the 10 yard line with 8:11 left.

The next break in classes is set for October 7 when the school system will observe CKEA and students get to stay home.

On October 21, teachers will have to attend an in-service day but the students won't go to school that day.

Thanksgiving is the

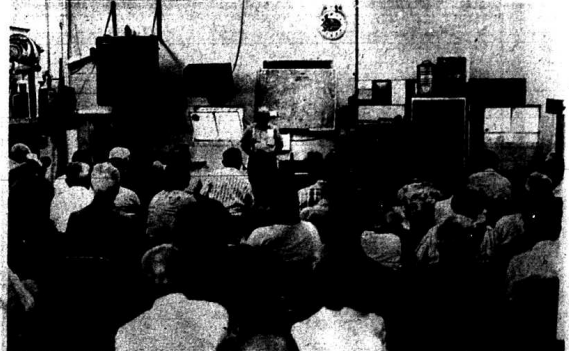
next holiday for everyone in the school system on November 24th and 25th.

The best break of all comes in December and January-Christmas break. This year, school will be closed from December 22nd to January 2nd, a total of eight school days.

In January, teachers will have to go for two in-service days on January 19th and 20th while students stay home.

However, the next break for students is not until April 12th and 13th, when the schools will close for KEA.

School is set to close on May 15th next year with the students not attending on May 14th.

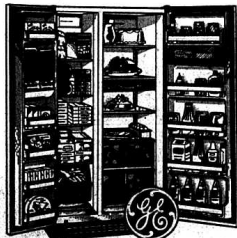

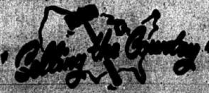

# Heat hard on hunters

Kentucky's squirrel season didn't get off to a very good start this year, thanks primarily to the extremely hot, dry conditions which prevailed, across the commonwealth during the August 20-21 opening weekend.

Fish and wildlife regional supervisors from the state's nine wildlife districts reported that conservation officers in 103 of Kentucky's 120 counties checked 1,484 hunters who had bagged 1,163 squirrels. Only 19 hunters had reached their daily limit of six when they were checked.

Last year, officers in 114 counties reported 2,518 hunters with 3,566 squirrels and 124 limits. Most of the regional supervisors felt that the poor showing this year was directly attributable to the weather. "Most hunters were out of the woods by 8:00 a.m.," one said, "and almost no one hunted during the normally productive late afternoon hours" when temperatures climbed past the 100-degree mark over much of the state.

"The woods were so dry," another commented, "that it was impossible to sneak up on a squirrel. Many hunters reported hearing plenty of squirrels but said they couldn't get close enough for a shot."

All agreed that a good rain and some cooler temperatures would help the situation a great deal. Early season squirrel hunting is never really easy because the squirrels are scattered and the heavy foliage makes it hard to spot them. This year's heat and drought apparently caused a lot of hunters to pass up the opening weekend—and caused many others to wish they had.

Hunters shouldn't give up on squirrel hunting for the season, though. After the leaves start falling and squirrels begin concentrating around stands of nut-bearing trees, hunting becomes much more productive and—let us hope—more comfortable.

The next season to open in Kentucky is for doves. What conditions will be like on the September 1 opening day is anybody's guess, but many observers feel that the havoc this year's drought has caused to agricultural lands will make it difficult to find good concentrations of doves, even though there seem to be plenty of birds around.

If this heat does continue, dove hunters will probably appreciate the half-hour extension in shooting hours this year. Hunting used to cease at one-half hour before sunset but this year hunters may

continue to shoot doves until sunset.

That extension, coupled with the 11 a.m. starting time (as opposed to noon in past years) was made by the Fish and Wildlife Commission to benefit late-season hunters who don't have much daylight. But if this hot weather keeps up, early season hunters will probably appreciate the slightly cooler temperatures during that extra half-hour—there's nothing hotter than an open field with no shade, particularly if the doves aren't flying.

**Cattle Grub Control**

Cattle grub systemic insecticides should be ap-

plied to cattle any time from now until the end of October. Cattle grubs are fly larvae that develop in the bodies of cattle. The eggs are laid in the spring by the adult flies and the maggot-like larvae wander throughout the animal's body for eight to ten.

Eventually, usually in late winter, the larvae end up under the skin of the back where they do most of their growing. They create large bump-like warbles that are filled with pus.

These insects reduce the vigor of the infested animals, causing some reduction in weight gain and milk production. Cattle being finished for slaughter are routinely discounted if they are grubby because slaughter plants must trim affected meat. In addition, hides are damaged when the larvae cut breathing holes through them.

Cattle infested with grubs may not convert feed efficiently and may have reduced weight gain. Damage depends on the number of grubs and how long they remain in the animal.

### Transportation Cabinet Awards Repair Contracts

The State Transportation Cabinet has awarded a contract for repairs to a bridge on I-75 in Rockcastle County.

W.R. Onan Inc of Frankfort received a \$12,672 contract for the work.

The company will receive the expansion joint on the north end of the southbound bridge on I-75 over Rose Hill Road. The joint lets the bridge deck expand and contract.

The Transportation Cabinet also awarded a contract to repair bridges in Pulaski, Rockcastle and Russel counties.

Laird Co. of Lexington received a \$56,244 contract for the work.

An overlay, a water-proof surfacing, will be applied to the decks of the bridges to protect them from weather and winter salt. The overlay extends the life of the bridge.

The bridges to be repaired under this project are:

Rockcastle County Over Crooked Creek on Ky 1004, Brush Creek Road.

Pulaski County Over Buck Creek on Ky. 328, Liberty/Penobscott Road.

Russell County Over West Goose Creek on Ky 76, Owens Road, and over Hudson Creek on Ky 1729, the Ky 80-Sand Road.

Milk production increased 15 percent, and beef grain reductions of one-tenth to one-fourth pound per day have been reported. Cattle being finished for slaughter are routinely discounted at the market if

they are grub-infested because slaughter plants must trim affected meat. The value of hides is also lowered.

The life cycle of the cattle grubs makes early treatment necessary. Adult grubs lay eggs on the hairs of the animal in the spring. When grub larvae hatch, they bore through the skin and for the next eight to ten months, migrate through the animal's connective tissue. They move to the gutlet or the spinal column during November and December and finally settle under the skin of the back in late winter.

Infested cattle should be treated before the

grubs move to the gutlet or the spinal column. Killing a large number of grub larvae in the gutlet or spinal column areas may cause bloat or partial paralysis because of the animal's reaction to the dead insects.

Treatment consists of applying or feeding a systemic insecticide to beef herds and in dairy herds to dry cows and young stock not being milked. Lactating cows cannot be treated.

Pour-ons, spot-ons or spray insecticides penetrate the animal's hide and feed through products that penetrate the gut wall. The insecticide enters the blood stream and kills the larvae throughout the animal's body.

The pour-on method requires the user to estimate the animal's weight and measure the insecticide accordingly. He then pours it along the animal's back. Instructions and a dipper are included with the product.

The spot-on method is similar, except that a highly concentrated product is applied in only one spot on the animal.

Spray treatment requires a high pressure sprayer, with 250 to 400 pounds of pressure per square inch. The insecticide must be forced through the hair so it can be absorbed through the skin.

Feed-through insecticide is given in mineral block or mixture, although it may not be widely available because its active ingredient is no longer being made. Cattle should be fed the insecticide continuously for 14 days to insure grub control.

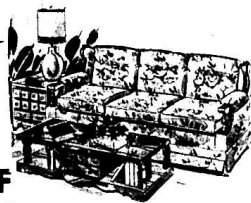

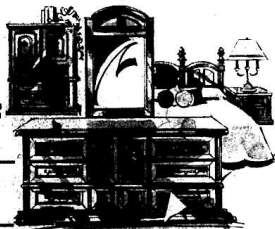

## Dairy producers must establish base marketings for refund

Diary producers who wish a refund of their second 50-cent per cwt. deduction for milk marketings should establish their base marketings at their county ASCS office, said Harold Ballinger, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

The dairy refund program will go into effect September 1 with implementation of the second 50 cent milk marketing deduction. To be eligible for a 1982-83 marketing year refund, producers must reduce their commercial milk marketings for September 1, 1983 through September 30, 1983 by 8.4 percent from the September average of the two marketing years that began October 1, 1980. To be eligible for a 1983-84 marketing year refund, producers must reduce their commercial milk marketings by 8.4 percent for the period October 1, 1983 to September 30, 1984. Average annual marketings between October 1, 1980 through September 30, 1982, will be the producer's base marketings, Rank said.

Acceptable documentation of milk marketings are payment receipts or statements from milk handlers that show both the amount of milk sold each month during the base period and the upcoming refund period. Receipts for the refund period should also show the amount of money deducted for USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) to help offset the cost of

the milk support program.

Producers who sell milk directly to consumers should provide the county office with sales records and cancelled checks as proof of marketings and the amounts paid to CCC.

Ballinger said that producers may establish their bases at ASCS offices any time during the marketing year. They may file applications for 1982-83 marketing year refunds from October 1, 1983 through December 31, 1983.

Applications for the fall 1983-84 marketing year may be filed between October 1, 1984 and December 31, 1984. The amount refunded will be the amount the producer paid to CCC in excess of the first, nonrefundable, 50-cent deduction.

If they wish, producers may request an advance of 50 percent of the refund-

able deduction paid during the first 6 months of the 1983-84 marketing year any time on or after April 1, 1984. Producers requesting this advance must furnish pertinent milk marketing records and certify that the required 8.4 percent reducing in marketings will be made for the entire marketing year.

Both the milk marketing deductions and dairy refund program are authorized by the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1982. These actions have been taken to reduce milk production and to reduce cost of the dairy price support program, Rank said. CCC expects to purchase more than 16 billion pounds of dairy products in the year ending September 30, and more than 15 billion pounds during the 1983-84 marketing year.

## Fall fire season begins October 1

The hot dry weather this summer has caused many problems to many people. It is now creating some problems for the forests in Kentucky in areas which are naturally dry sites, the extended drought can effect the trees in several ways. At the least, it causes a loss of growth for that period. In the next step, the trees are weakened so they are more likely to be hit by insects or disease. Finally, trees that were already weak or in a poor location may die just from lack of sufficient water.

Another serious potential problem is the increase in forest fire danger. Normally, the presence of shade and green vegetation combine to keep fire danger low during the summer months. However, it is now dry enough that a fire can creep through the green vegetation and burn very hot where the vegetation is sparse. For this season, Kentucky Division of Forestry officials remind everyone to use extra caution when doing outdoor burning and to follow the Fire Laws.

If the drought continues, this Fall Fire Season, which begins October 1 and ends December 25, could be as bad as the fall of 1980 which was the worst on record. Even if rain does occur, this fall will probably be worse than average because of the drought, so the Division of Forestry urges

everyone to use extreme caution with fire and remember that the 430 Burning Law is in effect starting October 1

## Conservation District test plots to be maintained two more years

The Rockcastle Conservation District will be maintaining the forage test plots at Quail for an additional two years. The test plot area was established in April of 1982 by the Conservation District with assistance from several local businesses and individuals.

The forage test plot has a capacity of two acres and is divided into four parts. Each part contains a different legume and grass combination. The main emphasis of the test plot area is to demonstrate how certain grasses and legumes (such as clovers) produce under good management. The test plots are clipped for hay at proper intervals and all lime and fertilizer is applied in accordance with soil tests.

This fall the test plot area will again have lime and fertilizer applied according to soil test recommendations. The test plot area is being leased from

the Charlie Hasty farm and is located just off Highway 70 at Quail, across from Bell's Grocery. The area is well marked and is identified with signs that show all plant-

ings. The test plots are opened to the public for viewing and any questions can be answered by calling the Rockcastle County Conservation District at 256-2541.
