


Multiflora roses were once promoted to be the living fence as well as an ideal wildlife cover. Many farmers are finding that fields infested with this plant rapidly becomes a wildlife habitat as gateways grow closed by the living fence. leaves. In our area, this means applying treatments before japanese beetles have stripped the

plant.
Chemicals like Round Up or Cross Bow when applied to the leaves will translocate to the root system killing the whole plant. Approximately 10-14 days after application the results will be seen.

For large areas, farm sprayers

may be needed. However, on small groups or single plants out in the field, small hand sprayers are fine. Mising 2½ ounces of Round Up per gallon of water then applying complete coverage of the foliage along with 4-6 hours without rain is all that's needed.

Crossbow has the advantage of killing only broad leaf plants without killing the grass in treated areas. Mixture for Crossbow are 1½-2 ounces per gallon of water, however, continuous agitation is required. Farmers wishing to control this weed arp better equipped with new chemicals than in year's nast.



They were our meeting places to see and visit our friends and acquaintances, as well as hear gospel sermons.



Presently the students scoring the highest on the Kentucky Essential Skills Test which is given each year, to the first, second, third and fourth graders. However, grades remain above the national average most generally through the eighth grade but when it comes to high school othe results are a little different.
For. example, students at the high school in the ninth grade, scored only one time with the national average. That score was a 50 in spelling. The rest of the areas tested, reading, math, writing, and library research reference, all scored below the national average. The lowest score was a common the ninth grade, as the state of the score of the score

A3.

In the tenth grade the lowest score recorded was also in reading, that of a 44. The highest score of 35 came in writing.

The tenth graders also scored above the national average in math and spelling. The total score for 10th graders at the Rockcastle County High School was 46, four points below the national level.

In the 11th grade at the high school, students scored only once above the national average and one other time-with the national average. In writing students had scored \$2, while in spelling they had a scored \$1.00 pelling they had a scored by the senior \$1.00 pelling they had \$1.00 pe

But the ninth grade had the lowest composit score of a 46, 4 points below the national average.

On a brighter side, students in the first grade in Rockcastle County School system, sowed he as the second grade, they scored a 63 in math, 13 points above the national average.

The highest score for the grade schools was in the sixth grade, where students scored an amazing 69, 19 points above the national average in math.

As a whole, no class in the grade school scored less than the national average induced in the grade school scored less than the rational average, total composit scores for students in the third grade were 57, and students in the fourth grade were 55.

Students score lower on scholastic test

Students in the first through the eighth grades in Rockastle County School score higher than the students in the ninth through the 12 grades.

At last weeks Rockcastle County Board of Education Meeting, Superintendent Bige Towery reported to the board that scores in the first through the eighth grade were higher than in the ninth through the 12th.

Although the state ranking had not been released, Towery reported to the board that he ex-pects the school system to rank lower than they did a year ago, from the test scores that he as received.

Students in the first through Students in the Irist through the eighth grade scored an average of 54.3 in reading and the national average is 50. In math the highest score was recorded and that was 60.13. In writing students scored an average of 55.25. However in the ninth thru

However in the ninth thru 12 grades, scores were not as high. For example, students in math, at the high school, scored only 48.50, in writing it was a little better with a score of 51.75. The lowest score at the high school was recorded in reading, that was 45.00. Towery told board members and parents Tuesday night that it was a national trend for scores to go down as children got older. He told the board that it was going to 15. [Soute 16]

Petitions passed to reduce rates for sewer service

Petitions asking the Mt. Vernon City Council to lower the
recently enacted sewer rate increase are being circulated in the
city, according to several persons
who have been asked to sign.

At latest, about 42 persons
have signed the petitions, one
petitioner reported.
"I don't want my name used,"
the petitioner said. "I doubt it
will do any good, but "I'll do it
anyway. These rates are hard on
folks who have a fixed income
like a lot of elderly people."
Some residents have reported
residential sewer bills as much as
\$50 and over.

\$50 and over.
The sewer rate is \$8.98 for the

first 2000 gallons of water used, and an additional \$2.49 for each and an additional \$2.49 for each additional 1000 gallons. The water rate is \$4.50 for 2000 gallons as it has been for many

gallons as it has been for many years.

The combined sewer/water base rate is \$13.48 as compated to the past \$6.75 base rate.

Incidentally, the base water/sewer rate at Brodhead is \$13.65 for 2000 gallons or 75 percent of the water bill and has been that amount for a considerable time. At Crab Orchard, the base rate is \$10.87 for the first 1000 gallons of water used and 1000 gallons of water used and \$1:87 for each additional 1000 gallons over the base rate.

gallons over the base rate. For those who have asked: The first indications that a change in the sewer service would have to be made was in 1976.

At that time, the Kentucky Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) told the then council that effluent (run off) from the 20-year-old sewer plant was conminating Town Branch which runs into Roundstone and on to the Rockeastle River and Lake Cumberland.

EPA mandated the city remedy

Cumberland.

EPA mandated the city remedy
the plant or face a heavy fine and
a cut-off of all grant money from
that day and in the future.
Engineers were hired and the
project bid to satisfy the EPA.
The low bid was \$1,924,407.

Then Mayor Roland Mullins obtained a grant for \$1,443,305 from the state and federal government. The city's share of the project way \$481,102, and that amount was destined to come from sewer customers. The public was notified if there

were questions about planning, the council would be glad to discuss it at any council meeting. No one came. The Signal publish-ed the meeting and the informa-

On Feb. 3, 1986, the city mail-On Feb. 3, 1986, the city mail-de a letter to all water and sewer customers pointing out the facts and figures relating to the pro-ject, saying, "hopefully recom-mendations from you will assist in deciding how to proceed with this project. Feel free to call city hall, any of the council members or the mayor," There was no response.

response.

The Signal printed the sewer rate ordinance three times for the public to see. There was no

public to see. There was no response.

The new rates went into effect with the August billing.

But wait! That may not be all.

The city now has a \$300,000 water project under way, uggrading the city water plant and constructing a new water trank. The city will receive a \$150,000 grant for the water project. The city's share will see. ject. The city's share will be \$150,000.

Presently, engineers have not indicated how much the water rate will have to be increased, if at all, to meet the city's \$150,000

debt.
Mayor Elizabeth Baker, who inherited the projects, said she hoped there will not have to be a water rate increase, but engineers tave not reported as yet. Factually, the rate for water will undoubtedly have to be sub

as to meet the debt obligations in-curred by the city's water project. The state will have the final say on water rates as long as the debt is outstanding. The "dye is cast," so to speak. As one resident put it: "I guess it's really all over now but the shouting."



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

A Brodhead area resident ask-ed the Brodhead City Council Monday night to help obtain a loan or grant to furnish water to about eight residents on Hickory

Grove Road.

Money Ed Cummins told the council the residents needed water badly and would like to try for a grant or loan from some government agency to help finance the project.

The length of the line is estimated at about 3,000 feet, but no recent cost estimate has been

made.

Mayor Billy Bussell told Cummins and Mrs. Cummins, who
accompanied him, that the city
would he glad to help in any way
possible, but doubted that the city
could afford to do the project.
He said he would seek the advice
of James Cass, city consultant,
on possibly loans and grants

The council instructed City Clerk LaJoy Graves to contact a representative of U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers to see if any funds might be available soon.

Last year, Mrs. Cummins came to the council to ask for water service to the area. At that time the council had a survey made that found the amount for the line to be about \$40,000, as best the councilmen could remember. They agreed another estimate would have to be made.

Telephone customers can now choose long distance

Most Continental Telephone customers in Laurel, Knox, Pulaski, Clay and Rockcastle counties will have equal access to three long distance companies by Dec. 12.

Customers eligible for the new service will be receiving mail ballots for choosing a primary long distance company. They can choose from U.S. Sprint, AT&T and MCI.

Both Contel and the long distance companies prefer that customers make their choices and mail in their ballots as soon as possible. This will ensure that customers get the company of their choice and avoid being randomly assigned to a company. With Equal Access, callers can dial "!" (or "O"), plus the area code and number, and call over the long distance carrier of their

choice. Today, dialing "1" (or "O") connects callers only with AT&T. Lengthy accodes must be dialed to gain a connection with any other long distance company where available.

Continental party-line, coin or charge-a-call phones will not be part of the equal access process.
Long distance calls for these exceptions will continue to be handled as they are now.
Contel is providing equal access so its customers may take advantage of competition in the long distance business. After a federal court ordered Bell Telphone companies to provide equal access, Contel arranged for several long distance comparable connections — and competitive pricing—for Contel customers.
"It is important for Contel customers to choose a long-distance comparable connections — and competitive pricing—avay." said Bill Dezarn, superintendent—telephone services for this area. Customers who don't send a ballot will be assigned to one of the participating long distance companies. "If 20 percent of those who do not make a choice will be assigned to Company B, and September 17 20 percent of those who do not make a choice will be assigned to Company B, and so no," Dezarn said.

Contel has no monthly charge for equal access and no charge to sign up for the first time, as long as it is done before Oct. 13, 1987. Equal access works on both rotary and touchtone phones, and no installer visit is required for hookup.
