



Rate increases for sewer at Brodhead

The best laid plans sometimes go astray, and they apparently have done just that at Brodhead where residents can expect a possible 10 to 25 percent increase in their sewer

Jim Cass, consultant for the City of Jim Cass, consultant for the City of Brodhead, told the Brodhead City-Council at its regular meeting Mon-day night that the city's planned \$300,000 sewer plan renovation project is going to cost the city more than originally thought and the bill will have to be paid by water and sewer users.

than originally inought and use unwill have to be paid by water andsewer users.

The city had hoped for a \$210,000
grant from the Appalachian Regional
Commission (ARC) and a \$90,000
loan from FmHA to finance the projeet, but the best the city can do is get
a \$0/50 deal, with the ARC furnishing \$150,000 and the city (FmHA)
\$150,000.

With those figures, the city sewer
bill could be increased as much as
100 percent of the water bill. Based
on the 100 percent rate of \$7.80 for
2,000 gallons of water, the total water/sewer bill would be \$15.60 for
2,000 gallons out water, the total water/sewer bill would be \$15.60 for
1,000 gallons used. It would be more

Cass told the council if the city

rejects the rate hike then the city will lose the \$150,000 grant and would still have to finance the project based on a \$300,000 loan, meaning an even

on a \$500,000 foan, meaning an even higher sower bill. Inspection of the sewer plant by the EPA in months past indicated raw sewage is running into the Dix River at times, especially after heavy rains. The council will meet with officials and determine the steps to take, but in other similar situations, the EPA regulations must be complied with.

Dealva Bussell

Dealva Bussell, water superinten-dent, told the council the Mt. Vernon Water Works is cutting down on the supply of water it supplies to the city and that he is unable to keep the city

and that he is unable to keep the city water tank filled.

He said on Monday the city was getting 204 gallons a minute, and that was not enough. The top among through the valve on Hall's Hill is

320 gallons a minute, but that amount is seldom necessary. The average is about 255 gallons a min-ute.

"They're squeezing us off," he said.
"I don't know why and have been unable to get an answer. And I understand the same is happening with the Western and Northern water dis-

tricts. It would help if we were told when the cuts are coming so we can be prepared. Our water runs on a leck and that should be taken into consideration by Mt. Vernon.
City Attorney Jerry Cox said he was aware of the problem and suggested the three districts send someone to the Mt. Vernon City Council to discuss the matter.

After over a year of claims and counterclaims, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court agreed at its regular meeting Tuesday to do some work on Lake Linville Road. The county finally relented after Mt. Vermon officials said the city had not worked the road since it was deeded to the county in September 1970.

The kind of work to be done will likely be minimal, probably patching potholes. The county plans to ask the state to take over maintenance of the road sometime after the fiscal year begins in July.



On May 10th Beef (or Dairy) producers will vote in a referendum on the future of the \$1 dollar per head Beef check off. October 1, 1986, the first check off funds were collected to promote beef through consumer education, research, promotion and media advertising. Just as poultry, fish and dairy have advertised and fish and dairy have advertised and promoted their products, the beef

industry is following suit. Beef's "Real Food for Real People" is a readily identifiable image of the Beef Board's efforts to bring beef to the

public's attention.
Farmers wishing to participate in the referendum may vote on Tuesday, May 10th at the County Extension Office between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The Extension Office is located on Richmond Street in the Agricultural Service Center

A complete list of the rules are available, but a brief high light is as follows. Persons owning cattle between Cet. 1, 1986 and March 31, 1988 are eligible to vote. Make No Bones About It: Osteo Can be Prevented

Most people think of osteoporosis as an old ladies' disease, but it's something you need to start thinking

about when you are a teenager.

In the United States, 15-20 million people have this brittle bone condition. Women are eight times more

likely to have osteoporosis than men. Osteoporosis develops gradually. It is often called the silent epidemic because by the time you notice symptoms, you already have the dis ease and there is not much you can do about it. Symptoms include back pain, loss of height and spinal de-

pain, loss of height and spinal de-formity.

At about age 35, bone starts being withdrawn from the body. At meno-pause, bone loss accelerates even more. Whether esteoprorsis devel-ops depends on many factors, includ-ing how much bone mass you star-with and how fast you lose it.

The most important step you can take to prevent an old age marred by this disease is to make sure your diet has adequate amounts of calcium. The average intake of adult women for calcium is only 500 milligrams a day. Women who have not yet had day. Women who have not yet had the "change of life", and older, post-menopausal women who take estromenopausal women who take estrogen supplements need 1000 militigarams a day. Postmenopausal women who do not take estrogen need about half-again more. Teenag grifs need 1200 militigrams of adapting the control of the

whether it comes from food or sup-plements. Among these are high amounts of protein, caffeine and alshol in the diet.

There are also things that help prevent calcium loss. Vitamin D, the sunshine vitamin - also present in fortified milk - aids in calcium absorption. And there is evidence that acidic foods such as oranges help the body use calcium.

body use calcium.

USDA findings show that the mineral boron also may help prevent
bone loss, as does moderate weightbearing exercise such as aerobic
dance, walking and tennis.

If you already have osteoprosis,
check with a physician about
hormone therapy in conjunction with
vitamin D and calcium. At home,
take precautions to reduce risk of
bone injury, such as installing rubber
mats and grab bars in the bathroom,
rearranging furniture and removing
scatter rugs.






