Wheat Danger

A wheat disease that has been iden-tified in Kentucky only once before now, has been positively identified in a field in Marion County.

"Wheat streak mosaic virus can infect a field in a matter of days after first symptoms develop reduce yields, in severe cases, to the point where it is no longer economical to harvest it," said Dick Stuckey, Uni-versity of Kentucky Extension plant pathologist. The disease, he said, has been quite

The disease, he said, has been quite severe in , Atansa and Nebraska wheat fields this year. The confirmed ease was reported in Marion Comiy and other suspected cases are being studied, Stuckey said, Initial pathology reports for those fields were inconclusive and sero-logical samples have been sent to Comell University for further test-ine.

ing. One of the symptoms of the disease include the yellowing of the top three leaves of the growing plant. The yellowing is the color of a legal note pad. Streaking of leaves may be pres-ent in some wheat varieties. In the

The virial disease is transmitted by the virial disease is transmitted by the wheat curl mite, which is about 1/ 100 of an inch in length and looks much like a speeck of pollen. If the disease strikes a field early, the grain spikes emerge without grain kernels present. If i strikes later, the spikes have only a few ker-nels. Stuckey said.

If hey are fresh to start with and are prop-erly refrigented, they will keep bright and fresh for several days. Strawberries picked at the right stage are quite a treat when frozen. Be sure to add ascorbie acid to help hold boh flavor and color. Strawberry Parfait



Here is an easy-but-elegant dessert to serve: Slightly crush clean, fresh strawberries. Sweeten them if you strawberries. Sweeten them if you wish, then alternate them with layers of vanilla ice cream in a parfait glass or tall goblet. Top with whipped cream and a big, perfect strawberry with the cap still on. Canning strawberries is not worth the effort. People used to can straw-

Canning staveerus is not woru he effort. People used to can straw-berries, but he product is disappoint-ing. The color is very faded and the flavor is not too good. It is better to spend your time and effort in freez-ing strawberries, or in making jam, jelly or preserves. To freeze strawberries, handle them in small quantities and freeze them at the peak of their maturiy. To help hold color and flavor, add ascor-bie acid to the sugar or syrup when you freeze the berries. If you use ascorbie acid in crystal-line form, use 1/2 teaspoor for each quart of strawberries. If you use an ascorbie acid mixture, follow the directions on the label.

ascorbic acid mixture, follow the directions on the label. It is not a good idea to freeze straw-berrise without sugar for pics. It is possible, of course, but 1 think, you will be disappointed in the product. Sugar or syrup helps retain the flavof and color of strawberrics. When us-ing your frozen berries for pic.make allowance for the sugar already added. What is the best way to prepare fro-zen strawberrics for cating? Thaw package in refigerator for several hours and open just before serving. Frozen strawberrics are at their best while there are still some iccerystals. You can use frozen berries just the way you use them fresh in most reci-ses. Remember to allow' for ary sugar or syrup that was added in frezing.

Appeals Process

The U.S. Department of Agricul-ture is proposing changes in the proc-ess-that allows the public to appeal decisions made by national forest of-ficials.

ficials. "We reviewed the current regula-tion and found that we needed to streamline, simplify, expediate and eliminate confusion in the appeals process," said F. Dale Robertson, chief of USDA's Forest Service. The propresed concernee procede

The proposal separates appeals on permits with the Forest Service to use or to occupy National Forest System lands from appeals involving objec-tions to land and resource menage ment planning and project implem-entation decisions.

currently, all appellants use the same process. They can obtain re-view of a forest officer's decision at view of a forest officer's decision at two higher levels of authority. For example, a district ranger's decision can be appeaded to the forest supervi-sor and then to the regional forester. The decision can be changed at either of the levels. Under the proposal, both types of appeals would be given a stream-lined, one-level review at the next administrative level, with discretion for further review at one more level.

for further review at one more level. Appeals involving special use per-mits would retain many of the fea-tures of the current rule. Contractual disputes would not be subject to ei ther rule

"Our appeals process is a valuable way to review key decisions, but it


had become too slow and too costly a tradeoff that impeded land and re-source management activities," Robertson said.

Robertson said. If the proposed rules are adopted, the Forest Service will monitor how well Deciding Officers and Review-ing Officers meet deadlines and prompt action will be taken to rem-edy excessive delays in processing of appeals, Robertson said.





ACP Sign-up begins Tuesday

The Rockcastle County ASCS Of-fice has announced the second 1988 ACP sign-up period as being June 1 through July 15, according to D.G. Abright Chairman of the Rockcastle County ASCS Committee. Mr. Albright stated that practices available to the farmers of, this county include cover crops new sectings; encountons, water conser-vation, critical areas, and forestry practices available for this period is available in the county office. Specing practices, both new sect-ings and renovations must first have acurrent soil sample, in the County Extension Office before signing for Cois-Sharing.

Cost-Sharing. Rockcastle Co. is now under the variable cost-sharing method. Re-quests are evaluated at the end of the sign-up period according to soil ero-sion. ACP practices which result in

the highest saving of soil may receive up to 75 % of the actual cost of completing the practice. All requests must be filed and ap-proved by the ASCS Committee prior to the starting of work pertain-ing to the practice. Mr. Albright urges: Rockcastle County farmers interested in apply-ing for ACP cost-sharing practices to bring their soil samples to the county agent's office as soon as possible.
