

# No changes for buses

Last week's state-level decree to add an extra roof-top-emergency exit and increase access space to the rear emergency exits on Kentucky school bases by 1990 won't have any imme-diate, effect on Rockcastle County schools schools.

Further complicating planning for those requirements is the on-going work in implementing an "all new" school system in the state. Those changes have been brought on by the inequities in educational funding from om stem to system, county to county. But, Towery feels the county system's bus situation is solid at the moment. He pointed out Monday that the county sold this summer the last of its "pre-1977" buses, which did

# **Burley crops 10 days behind**

At mid point in the growing cycle, the burley tobacco crop is about 10 days behind schedule in the county, according to Harold Ballinger, county executive director of ASCS.

Ballinger said the cause has been the wet weather and the inability of growers to get the plants in the ground. He also pointed to plant "drown-ing" as a factor and cool tempera-

states. Statewide, the crop is behind sched-ule as well, according to a report by the Burley Tobacco Growers Coop-erative Assn.

the Burley Tobacco Growers Coop-entive Assi. This year, many tobacco farmers have experinced an extreme tran-around from the drought conditions they were wincessing last year, and now too much water is causing the most concern halfway through the normal 90-day growing season. Excessingistue in most of the eight-state burley belt this season has made to 1998 corp "extremely variable." said Dr. Gary Palmer, extension specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. "We're seeing all sizes – from shoe top'in waise-high – within the same field. I would rate the overall cond-tion of burley as only fair at this time," he said. William O. Myers, managing di-tector of Burley Subbilization Corpo-mition it Knoxville, Tenn, agreed the Palmer on the situation within his state. "There is much neivenness iour tobaccoffelds. Our forecast for the next few days is for day cond-tions, so were hoping this will give

# National group buys 1,126 acres on Rockcastle River

By they recentre There's a little less private land in Rockcastie these days. The Kentucky Chapter of the Na-ture Conservancy, a private organi-zation that protocts nature's doundant hapitast, has pruchaed 1,126 arres in Pulaski and Rockcastle counties never to be touched again for com-mercial purposes. They want to save the Cumberland bean mussel, the Kentucky lady-silp-re, the Rockcastle Aster, the barry Jacob's ladder, and 26 different other mussels.

Amous summer, and 26 different other mussels. Located along the Rockcastle River, the area is considered one of the state's most biologically diverse patural areas. Lojons the river which is protected by the Wild Rivers Act. The Chapter paid almost \$500,000 for the property which includes: forests and a small flood plain. Announcement was made at a news conference at the size last week with moderator Ronald Cicerello, a biolo-gist with the Kentacky State Nature Preserves Commission.

Preserves Commission. "This is the center of evolution for freshwater mussels," Cicerello said. He noted the river has 26 different mussels, 12 less than orginally, with the remainder on the list of endan-

He added that recent strip mining, logging, farming and building dams to impound rivers may have harmed to impound r the shellfish.

Cicerello, anxious for ev see what the mussel looks like, waded into the river and felt in the water for one. He didn't find one.

The discrete market before the area has a variety of trees, ferms and the Acck-castle Aster, a plant found only along forw-mite stretch of the river. As planned, the conservancy will sell annost all of the land to the Forest Service by the end of the year, that would free conservancy money to purchase other land. A bitl that would allocate \$1 mil-tion to acquire the habitats of endar-gered species and threatened species for the Dariel Boone National Forest has been spongered by U.S. Rep. Handl Rogers. The Conservancy plans to sell all

## WIC program increased

More low-income Kentuckians may become eligible for a maternal and child nutrition program due to annual federal government revisions in poverty levels, the state Depart-ment for Health Services announced. On July 1, annual income limits for femilian enchains for WCC formable

On July 1, annual income limits for families applying for WIC, formally known as the Special Supplemental Rood Program for Women, Infants and Children, increased Between three and four percent. For example, the annual maximum income for a fam-ity of four increased from 521,553 to 522,385.

Those families with incomes near the current maximums may become eligible, according to Peggy Kidd, state WIC director.

Almost 82,000 Kentuckians now receive WIC benefits monthly, Kidd said, as compared to 74,000 recipi-ents in June 1988. WIC provides nutrition education and specific foods high in protein, iron and vitamins A and C to low-mont memant some new moth-






