With the second reading of the annexation ordeniance and publica-tion this week in the Signal, the area automatically becomes part of the city.

Bald Eagles winter in Kentucky, Majestically perched in tall, barrer trees along a narrow waterway, bald cagles settled in for the night at one of their favorite roosting spots in Westem Kentucký

I was privileged to witness the wintering cagles along with a team of wildlife research biologists for the Department of Fish and Wildlife ources R

Begatinen to Past and Windie Resources. Besides watching eagles in cap-tivity, or on television, this was my first live, on-site experience with the ergal birds. And what an experience it was - one that I plan to repeat. Several eagles were already rest-ing in the trocs when we arrived at the roots its under a gray, late alfermoon sky. The weather was cold, yet rela-tively mild, on this particular day in early December, making our obser-vation jost quite comfortable. While quietly sitting in a vefilefer only yards away, the three of us

While quietly sitting in a vehicle only yards away, the three of us counted at least 24 bald eagles as they gracefully glided over our heads and across the water before taking up another night's lodging in Kentucky. The biologists identified eight eagles as mature birds, I Sa simmatire (less than four years old, but the age class of the last eagle to preive before use of the last eagle to arrive before we left the roost site couldn't be determined because not enough natural light remained to distinguish the bird's rkings.

The next day, 14 bald eagles were observed along the Mississippi and Ohio rivers in Western Kentucky as the biologists took to the air for a flight survey. I not only had the chance to spot two cagles near Fulton, but to take my first airplane ride while on a portion of the survey course. The fish and wildlife department

takes a keen interest in eagles year-round. Specific research surveys are conducted November through March

conducted November through March in Kenucky, beginning with bird counts that peak in January and con-inuing through the nesting activity period in late winter. In 1967, for the first time since the 1960s, a pair or bald eagles produced two hatchlings on Ballard wildlife Management Area in Western Ken-tucky.
