### Jury gives Robinson life for Alma Jean Brown murder

Don Brown returned to work this week but he doesn't believe he'll ever be able to return to normal after spending the past two weeks attending the jury selection and trial of his wife's murderer.

spenung ure passavo ing the june passavo ing the june passavo ing the june passavo in trook a Lincoln Circuit Court jury only 12 minutes Friday to decide that Kenneth Wayne Robinson, 18, was gully of the Sept. 15, 1988 murder of Alma Jean Brown at the store she and her husband operated in the Dog Walls section of Lincoln County. It took the same jury two hours on saurday to decide on his punishment – life in prison with no possibility of parole for 25 years. Robinson, who has already served more than a year in juli awaiting trial, could be paroled at the age of 42, four could be paroled at the age of 42, four

years younger than Jean Brown was when Robinson and his brother Steven, both of Mt. Venton, robbed her of \$100 to purchase drugs. Kenneth, then only 17, shot her five times to insure she could never testify against them.

insure sine could never tessury against

Don Brown was back behind the
counter this week at Don's Country
Market and was upset with the jury's
decision on the punishment.
"The boy killed my wife," he said.
"He came in here and shot her five
times. It was premeditated and in cold
lood."

Robinson testified at the trial the
he and his brother visited the store on
the aftermoon of Sept. 15 with the idea
of robbing it to pay off Clinton Hensley, who he said had sold them co-

drove to a nearby church parking to where they plotted their robbery and decided that Kenneth, who was single and without a job, would kill her so that no winnesses would be left. Brown didn't buy the argument that the brothers were high on drugs when they planned and performed their crime. Neither did he buy the argument that Robinson, who has a hearing problem, has low self esteem because he must wear hearing aids.

"The only thing he had was they said he was son nancotics," Brown recalled of the trial. "That was never proved. They offered no facts other

proved. They offered no facts other than he came in here and killed her in

cold blood."

Brown said the jury apparently believed that the Robinson brothers were under the influence of drugs and that Kenneth Robinson suffered some emotional problems because of a hearing impairment that he blamed for his inability to hold a job. "His witnesses were programed."

"His witnesses were programed
and phony," Brown said. "It was
something they worked up and the
jury fell for it."

The Browns have a deaf son who is also legally blind. Brown said their son attends college in Rochester, N.Y, and holds down a summer job. "I've got a deaf child," he said.

Commonwealth's Attorney Thomas Lockridge told the jury was true:

Brown said that he had hoped for the death penalty for Robinson or at least a sentence of a definite number of years to insure that Robinson would never gain his freedom some day through parole.







Anyway, LeBrun suggessted that devote this space to letting readers know how many brocolli, cauliflower, cabbage plants a lerady had growing indoors and whether or not my peas were up yet. Apparently he is already cating tater onions, has his windows full of transplants and has hoed his peas twice. I'm ashamed to tell it, but LeBrun is ahead of me.

I have however, performed the carpentry on an outdoor seed bed that I will get started soon. If you're still reading, the rest of this column is intended to be serious because I'd like to tell you how to save some money on plants and maybe even make some.

I dig a hole about two feet deep and fill it with a combination of wet leaves, straw and barn manure. The

hole needs to be about 18 inches to 2 feet in diameter. Then I biild a box 4 feet wide and tewleve feet long with lumber that is at least a foot wide around that hole. I rake the dirt that came out of the hole up around the united of the seed box and then pour six or eight large bags of potting soil misde the box and rake it down so that the soil is four or five inches deen.

deep.
Then I sowall manner of plant and flower seeds in it. Last year we had over a hundred varieties. Enough for several large gardens. We sold enough to pay for the material and seed and gave away bundles of plants after we got out garden going. The bed has to be covered with thick, clear plastic like the kind Wall Mart sells to cover

be covered with thick, clear plastic-like the kind Wall Mart sells to cover windows. It has to be tacked or stape-like downso that the wind won't blow it off. I put strips of cardboard across the plastic and staple through it. The straw and manure will rot and to fine has and the plastic will hold it in. Punch a couple of holes in the plastic to water the bed every day or so and reseal them with duct tape. You should have at least six to nine inches of growing space between plastic and soil, so you should have several thin pieces of wood or plastic pipe across the top of the box to keep the plastic from sagging. Plants will not be hurt unless theweather stays very cold for several days and you should have enough for the whole neighborhood. In fact, our night consider doing this project

you might consider doing this project with several other people. Have one buy cabbage seed, another tomatos, another brocolli, etc. and also split the cost of materials five or six ways. It's not only fun, but it's very eco-nomical and you will have plenty plants to share

nomical and you will nave plently plants to share.

If robberts start stealing all your beef-steak tomatos, you might consider investing in an AK-47. We been told that people who go around stealing transplants are terrified of them. Take the AK-47 and tack it to a tall pole like you would a scarecrow right beside your seed bed. Tie a string to the trigger and run it into your house. Everytime you hear the dogs bark, just yank on that string a few times and things should quieten down. Til guarantee that nobody will mess with your beefsteaks.







The advertisements give the impression that legistators use the Gen-eral Fund for some sort of "slush fund" and possibly use the fund for something other than government-related purposes. Of course, those who are familiar with the operation of state government understand that this is a ridiculous accusation. The Gen-

state government understand that this is a ridiculous accusation. The General Fund is the largest of seven operational funds through which all government programs are funded, most of which goes to fund elementary, secondary and higher education. The Revenue Cabinet is responsible for collecting billions of dollars in taxes, of which a majority is deposited into the General Fund. Furthermore, the Kentucky Constitution plainty places responsibility for state government speed in the most positive programment speed in the Mental Popular Commonwealth to represent their interests in Frankfort.

### Selective Service

Young men who will turn 26 in 1990 will be reaching an important milestone, according to the Selective Service System

Beginning on Jan. 1, 1990, men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1982 will be turning 26 and will no longer be eligible for induction should a draft be reinstituted. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man reaches his 26th birthday. Selective Service State Director



The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet plans to spend \$539,013 on secondary rural roads in Rockcastle County during the 1990-91 fiscal year. That was, the information Jerry Gadberry of the Somerset District, of which Bockcastle is and brought to

Gadberry of the Somerset District, of which Rockcastle is apart, brought to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at its meeting Tuesday.

Gadberry recounted that Rock-castle has 114.9 miles of secondary rural roads and the state estimates it will cost 5287,400 for routine main-tenance alone, or 52,500 a mile. He estimated \$251,613 will be seen for road improvements and said

spent for road improvements and said the district is recommending four major road improvement projects in

major road improvement projects in the next fiscal year.

They are: 2.4 miles of Ky. 3245 (Negro Creek Road) from the junc-tion of Bryant Ridge Road to the junction of U.S. 150 at a cost of junction \$61,100:

junction of U.S. 150 at a cost of \$51,100; 2.07 miles of Ky. 3274 (Chestmut Ridge School Road) beginning at the state maintained road and running to 01d Chesturut Ridge School Road, at a cost of \$53,900; .74 of a mile of Hurricane School Road (Ky. 3275) from the junction of U.S. 25 to the bridge over 1-75 at a cost of \$19,800; .179 miles of County Line-Climax Road (Ky. 2614) from eld mine shaft entrance road to beginning of the blacktop, at a cost of \$117,900. Last year, the state allocated \$318,538 to the county system with

five projects listed. However, the state did not get around to the Negro Creek Road Project and rescheduled it for

In other action at the Fiscal court meeting, the court was notified by Robert E. Philbeck that he had made a mistake on the estimates of materials for covering the grandstand at Brodhead fairgrounds and was withdrawing his \$19.834 bid. Nextlowest bid was \$24.500. The court then shelved the project until a later date when more money becomes available. The county was granted \$21,250 to spend on the project. That money will be put into a certificate of deposit until more money/can be obtained for the project.

Jack C. Crawford, engineer of Burnside, told the court he was making a survey of areas of Rock-castle that do not have, a water supply and would make a report to the court when the survey is completed. He said he is looking mostly at the south, east and northeast sections of the

A survey of the courthouse build-A survey of the courthouse build-ing paid for by-a group Leadership Rockcastle, was presented to the court. Compiled by Garlan Vanhook, the report suggested the court con-centrate on a new roof for the courtcentrate on a new roof for the court-house as a first priority. The court approved hiring Yanhook as archi-tect for the roof project with the hourly rate not to exceed 5 percent of the roof bid. In a ruling handed down January 29th, Venters concluded that Wilcop acted properly in giving Wallin the "F, for not attending and performing at the Baccialureate service. 
In the eight page summary judge-ent Venters concluded that Wallin

In his judgement, Venters said the requirements for the class were not something that Wilcop decided upon a "Whim" or after the absence oc curred, it was part of the written con-





### **Kentucky Afield**

Kentucky turkey hunters are ex-pected to surpass last year's record harvest by taking more than 1,000 wild birds during the 1990 spring season, according to George Wright, turkey program coordinator for the Department of Fish and Wildlife

Based on last year's harvest infor-

Based on last year's harvest infor-mation, Wright predicts good turbey hunting throughout the state this spring, especially in southeastern portions of Kentucky where turkey oppulations are rapidly expanding. Counties producing the highest harvest during the 1989 spring turbey season were: Nelson, with 99 with turkeys taken. Harlan, 92; Christian, 87; Letcher, 72; Caldwell, 68; Hopkins, 62; Butler, 37; Ballard, 30, Bell, 26; and Bullitt and Logan, 23 each.

This spring, 64 Kentucky counties or portions of counties will be open for turkey hunting.

Kentucky is divided into two turkey hunting zones for the spring spason. Zone A opens April 11 and continuestruouph April 29, while the shorter season in Zone B runs April

11-17.

The daily limit is one turkey and the season limit is two turkeys with visible beards.

Hunters may take two turkeys in Zone A, while only one turkey may be harvested in Zone B. Hunters who take a turkey in Zone B may attain their season limit by taking a second buff from Zone A as long as the gobbles aren't bagged on the same-day.

gobbles arent bagges on and day.

Generally, wildlife management areas (WMAs) lying within open counties or open to turkey hunting and are governed by the zone regulations in effect for the area in which the WMA is located. There are exceptions, however.

Turkey hunters required to pur-chase a hunting license must possess both an annual hunting license and a turkey permit. In addition, turkey hunters under tha age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult and remain under the control of that adult while hunting. All turkey hunters born after 1972 are required to have a valid

hunter safety certificate in posses-sion when hunting turkeys in Ken-

sion when hunting turkeys in Kentacky.

The 1990 Kentucky Turkey Hunting Guide includes information on season dates, zones, limits, exceptions, licones, permit and tagging requirements, along with a list of turkey check sations.
