This is the January 1, 1990, assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1990 will be due about September 15, 1990.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and m inspected between the hours 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Any person who wishes to appeal a real property assessment must file a written letter or petition with the county clerk within the above period of time. This letter or petition must state the reasons for appeal, Identify the property in question and state the taxpayer's estimate of actual fair cash value (KRS 133.120).

Appeals of personal property assessments shall **not** be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132,450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administra-

tor. (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he

believes to be the fair cash value of his property.

(2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Taxation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.

[3] This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.

[4] The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.



Council approves Mt. Vernon dispatch

If county, Livingstor and Brodhead are using dispatching service from the county jail, they had better clock elsewhere after Aug. 1.

The Mt. Vernon City council voted at a called meeting Monday night to terminate dispatching services from the jail at the request of Jailer Billy Kirby.

Kirby, who receives \$125\square\text{month} to dispatch for Mt. Vernon, reported earlier he can no longer continue to dispatch because of other pressing duties.

The equipment, which belongs to the city, will be taken to the Mt. Vernon City Hall, set up and a new

number allocated that will reach both, and only, city fire and police. The Rockeastle Ambulance number will remain the same. Dispatching ambulances is, and will continue to be done through the Rockeastle Hospital number. In voting to change the dispatching service to city hall to be run by the city, the council approved sending the necessary people to Eastern Kentucky University to qualify as dispatchers. A second and final reading will be held Thursday night at called meeting and will be followed by publication in its entirety in the Signal.

The vote was 4-0 with Councilwoman Clarice Kirby and Lloyd Cain unable to attend.

The ordinance is one of the most extensive pieces of legislation the city has ever approved and covers all kinds of violations that could "injure or endanger the comfort, repose, health or safety of others." The council could have used an

The council could have used an ordinance already on the Kentucky Statutes, but the new ordinance spells out more in detail what the word nuisance means to the city.

Brodhead used the Kentucky Stat-

ute to have a piece of property cleaned up several months ago, but that Stat-ute is not nearly as detailed as the new

ute is not nearly as detailed as the new city ordinance.

Under the ordinance, an officer designated by the city council will follow up on complaints to determine if the complaint is in violation of the ordinance. The officer will then recmend to the council the necess

If needed, a written notice will be sent to the violator giving the prop-erty owner five days to clean up or erty owner five days to clean up or abate the nuisance, or request a hear-ing. If no action is taken by the owner, the city will have the nuisance cleaned up and bil the owner for the cost. If there is no payment a lien will be placed on the property and the cost added to the property. Calried to the extreme the property could be sold for the debt if the lien is brught into court by the city. Ordi-

brought into court by the city. Ordi-nances on nuisances have already been upheld by the courts.

The ordinance includes such nui-sancés ao bistructions in streets and sidewalks, dilapidated buildings, weeds, noises, amoving vibrations, stagnant water, animal noises and numerous other provisions.

You can be in Mexico before the care swarmed upand that's where they took while I was in their neck of the woods a couple of weeks ago--about a third of the way down that long that sticks out into the ocean and belongs to Mexico

called the Baia. And at first Its called the Baja. And at Irist glance I had no difficulty figuring out why we let Mexico keep it when the restof the Westchanged hands. Fresh water is pretty scarce and it shows. "Less than an inch of rainfall a year," "Less than an inch of rainfall a year,"
John told me, Huge mountains, upon
close inspection, turn out to be seemingly scuptured lava bounded by miles
and miles of desert on either side.
Thick mesquite and iron wood shrubs
intermingled with a few specie of
cactus cover the desert floor. John swears that there's stuff growing on the mountains, but it was to small for

me to see.

It's a paradise for roadrunners,
rattlesnakes and coyotes. Lots of song
birds go there for the winter. But it's
not the sort of place that would make
you want to run out and plant a pea
patch. I doubt very much that anybody living on the Baja owns a lawn-

moves.

The eastern shore of the peninsula fronts the Sea of Cortes which separtes it from the rest of Mexico. A few folks make meager livings fishing for tuna, shrimp, mackaral and whatever clee they eatch. "You won't starve to death, on the Baja," they tell you. "You can always eatch a fish." That's a good attitude to-have, especially when you don't have much of anything else to eat. On the other hand, I saw some folks living in what, thing else to eat. On the other hand, I saw some folks living in what we would consider pretty dire straits, but I didn't see anybody who appeared to be hungry. They just get by without a lot of stuff that we take for granted. Electricity for example. Not many

washers and dryers on the Baja. The temperature is routinely over 100 degrees Farenheit but most Joks don't have air conditioners. Clothes dry fast though, Gasoline or small diesel powered generators produce enough electricity for a light when folks realy need them. Stoves and refrigerators run on propane if they run at all.

The road we travelled down the coast was made by spraying oil on the sand and then letting the sun bake it hard. The folks who live on coal haul roads in Eastern Kentucky would begin counting their blessing after being on parts of it. The guy who built it is in jail. Maybe that's where the guy in charge of keeping I-64 up ought to be. But the road down the Baja.isn't travelled much. I watched the odometer on one stretch. We travelled 53 mfles without seeing another vehicle. Occassionally a small white ross beside the highway marks the ite of a fatal accident. Perhaps Mexicans wear sombre-ros in other parts of the country and perhaps they take siestas, but I weas in Mexicafi (pop. 1,000,000+) in the middle of the aftermoon. I didn't see anyone sleeping and the only som-breros were for sale at tourist stands. Sombreros have about as much util-





Last year's child abuse and neglect numbers, 27,712 reported cases in-volving 44,170 children, indicate that child abuse and neglect are major problems in Kentucky. Gary Hansen, sociology specialist with the Kentucky Cooperative Ex-tension Service, said he believes that the problems associated with child abuse can best he addressed through the formation of coalitions of indi-viduals, organizations and agencies viduals, organizations and agencies which cooperate with each other to implement child abuse prevention

Although activities like par-enting education usually are not seen as child abuse prevention programs,

what is being done and offered in his

Alternatives to Lashing Out At Your Child

If you are a parent, chances are you experience frustrations. Everyday

If you are a parent, chances are you experience frestrations. Everyday pressures may build up to the point where you feel like lashing out at your child.

"If you ever feel that way, it is important to know and practice alternatives to lashing out," said Gayl Hansen, oxicology specialist with the Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service.

Hansen offered these alternatives from the National Committee for Prevention of Child Abuse:

1) Take a deep breath and then another. Remember that you are the adult.

1) Take a deep dreath and then another. Remember that you are the adult.
2) Close your eyes and imagine you're hearing what your child is about to hear you say.
3) Press your lips to gether and count to 10, or better yet, to 20.
4) Put your child in a time-out chair. Remember the guideline of one time-out minute for each year of age.
5) Put yourself in a time-out chair. Think about why you are angry. Is it your child or is your child simply econvenient target for your anger?
6) Phone a friend.
7) If someone can watch the chil-

dren, go outside and take a walk.

8) Take a hot bath or splash-cold water on your face.

9) Hug a pillow.

10) Turn on some music. Maybe even sing along.

11) Pick up a pencil and write down as many helpful words as you can think of. Examples include "I love you. "Let's talk about it," "I believe you can do it" and "Good job." Save the list and resolve to use those words.

12) Obtain prevention information.

The Senate Agriculture Commit-tee today overwhelmingly approved a bill sponsored by Senators Mitch McConnell and Thad Cochran (R-McConnell and Thad Cochran (R-MS) that will provide for the estab-lishment of rural health and safety

McConnell and Inad Centari (ve. MS) that will provide for the establishment of rural health and safety education programs.

The bill, titled the Rural Health and Safety Education Act, Complements related rural health provisions of McConnell'S Comprehensive American Health Care Program unveiled last week during a tour through Kentucky.

The intention of this bill is to provide information to rural residents available for the establishment of safety programs for those people working in the farm and timber industries, "McConnell said. These are people who are exposed to many potential dangers. I want to let them know exactly what those dangers are, what they can do about them, and where they can go for help, he stated. The legislation includes provisions that will: provide funding for safety will be the safe they are proposed to many detection programs related to agriculture and timber harvesting works: tup programs for fraining volunteers in health promotion and health care services; and streamline and coordinate all programs with state rural health foffices.

A controllable weed is robbing

A controllable weed is robbing Kentucky farmers of pasture production. The weed, called nodding thistle, can be controlled by attacking them at the right time. The weed produces thousands of seed each year capable of producing thousands of seed each year capable to take measurests control the order is set steed, which is usually in Jack May and early June. Once seed has set, it is difficult to control the spread of the seed and farmers will need to wait until fall or next spring to obtain control of even more weeds.


The nodding thistle emerges as a rostet which is a circular cluster of leavish the growing point close to the ground. The dark green fossett is six to eight inches in diameter. Rosettes

rappearing in the spring can be sprayed and killed. Herbicides such as 2, 4-D and Banvel, are more effective when the rosette is small and actively grow-ing. They can be sprayed in the spring as long as daytime temperatures are as long as daytime temperatures are above 50 degrees. Timing is critical for good control. The weed must be attacked when it is small if the sprays are to be most effective. This mean late April will be the last chance for

farmers to get an effective chemical controlline spring.

If spraying is delayed until the plant is older, it can be controlled by either mowing the plants or hoeing it out by er, with either method, the weed must be destroyed before it sets seed. Mowing at or after bloom may mean that the seeds produced

Saul man pleads guilty to trafficking in "pot"

A Saul, Kentucky man pleaded guilty in Rockcastle Cirucuit Court week to trafficking in marijuana over eight ounces and carrying a

concealed weapon.

Danid Gibson. 28, was arrested on September 21st of last year and Charged with the crimes after his vehicle was stopped on 1-75 by state trooper Jimmy Silvers. Silvers found over eight ounces of marijuana and a. 38 caliber hand gun that was being concealed.

A Rockeastle Grand Jury indicated Gibson and three other people who were with him on September 22nd.

For his guilty pleas, Commonwealth automey Benny Ham recommended sentences of one year and 12 months to be served at the same time, a \$500 fine and confiscation of the car and pistol.

Charges against the three other people were dismissed, because Gibson told prosecutors the dope, gun and car were all his.





For many people, the reason choosing abstinence is to avoid an unintended pregnancy. No birth control method is 100% effective, but those who are sexually abstinent do not have to worry about birth control method failure.

Abstinence also guarantees protection from sexually transmitted diseases. Allhough AIDS can be contracted in other ways, sexual abstinence can greatly decrease the risk of getting this deadly virus for most people.

Deciding to abstain can also give protection from the emotional pain that often results when couple engage in intercourse before they are ready. Being involved in a relationship that includes sexual-indimacy-encourages people to open up emotionally to each other. If their trust is betrayed, one or both partners can end up with intense emotional pain. Once a decision has been made in favor of abstinence, teens may need


