

Rockcastle needs more

foster homes for children

RockcatelCounty is in desperate need of foster parents to provide care for all types of children, according to Mike Bryant, Director of Social Services in the county. During the month of April alone, 13 cases of child abuse or neglect were investigated by Bryants office: That brings the total of children that are in some type of state program to 28. Of those 88, 12 children are in foster care, chin relative shomes, three in private child care, two in skilled nursing and one in a residential treatment facility. According to Bryant, 18 Reckcastle County children were placed outside of the county because no appropriate bed was available in the errory.

To qualify as a foster parent, you must be 21 years old or one parent in the home less than sixty-five, married at least two years, have enough income to provide for own family, have three personal references and two credit references and be willing to take eighteen hours of required training. And, all members of the family must have a health examination and a check of the parents' criminal record will

And, at memoers or the family must have a nearine sammation and a check of the parents' criminal record will also be made. A foster home must also have enough space to accommodate a foster child. Morgan indicted for murder

A Rockcastle County Grand Jury has indicted a Mt. Vernon man for

murder. Marty Morgan, 33, was indicated in connection with the March 28th shooting death of Donnie Clemmons. Clemmons, 28, of Berea, died at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington, after he was shot in the chest. The shooting occurred on Main

shot in the chest. The shooting occurred on Main Street in Mt. Vernon around 8 p.m. The Fayette County Coroner, Office said that Morgan was shot with a handgun at very close range. During an April 11 hp reliminary hearing in Rockcastle District Court,

hearing in Rockeastle District Court, Morgan pleaded not guilty. His autor-ney, Jerry Cox, contended that Mor-gan shot Clemmons in self-defense. However, other witnesses at the scene testified that Clemmons was not armed when he was shot. Morgan is free on a \$15,000 property bond until a trial in Rock-eastle Circuit Court.

The violent episode at the school, while shocking to the community, was not totally unexpected, accord-ing to the court file on their pending orce.

Only a week before the shooting, Mrs. Greer swore in an affidavit that her husband had threatened to kill her

her husband had hreatened to kill her and himself if she proceeded with her divorce plans. Court documents say that Greer, 46, had talked about killing his wife and himself when she broached the subject of divorce with him. On one occasion, Mrs. Greer said in her soom statement, Greer actually was loading the gun as he talked of using on her and himself. The Alien With a Grudge


This story goes back 57 years to the summer of 1933 when I was 11 years old, but what I am going to describe is still vivid in my mind as though it happened just a short time ago. In Rockcastle County there is an area with many underground caves with openings known as sinkholes. I was fascinated by these entrances to unexplored worlds, but the experi-ence I'm about to relate cured me forever of any inclination to go cave exploring. I wouldn't enter one today for any amount of money. In a ravine down below my Aunt Mary McGuire's place was a sink.

One day, my brother Chick and I were gathering up the largest nocks we could carry and rolling them into the sinkhole just to hear the echoes as they bounced against the walls of the cave on the way down. After a few minutes of this, I prepared to launch a rock about the size of a football while waiting for Chick to locate another one.

It was only about five feet tall and was waining a shiny infoil-ilke suit with something over its head closely re-sembling the space helmets of loday. Chick was back a ways with his at-tention focuse on another boulder and didn's see the thing I saw, but he did pay attention when I shouted, "Run for your itid."

Chick and I could run in those days, and we both later became county-wide track stars. He was operating under the assump-tion that Greer was still in the build-ing with his shotgun After taking some time for the Somerset dispatcher to determine sust where Waynesburg Elementary is, the call wentout to area police that guman was loose in the school. State and local police began streaming into the school area from as far away as London. They quickly determined that Shannon Greer had villed his wife and fled. Police began searching for him but found no trace. Somerset and Pulaski County Iaw officers were watching roads to the south to see if he might be heading their way. Local officers suspected that he might be heading for the Fishing creek area area Waynesburg, where head spotted in nearby Casey County and that he sopped by a gro-cery store in Walltown and pur-chased shougun shells.

cerry store in Walltown and pur-chased shotgun shells. Deputy Sheriff David Smith said he and a state police man were driv-ing down Salyers Road in Casey

County about 11 a.m. when he heard what sounded like a gunshot in the woods to his right.

woods to his right. The state trooper, Rick Muse, stopped the car at the entrance to an old logging road and Smith ran to-ward the sound of the shot.

He ran a shot distance up the log-ging road when he saw the white Chevette and went back to the patrol car to call in the other officers. A state police swat team ap-proached the car and found that Green

proached the car and found that Green had shot himself with the same shot-gun he used to kill his wife.

The divorce papers that Greer had gotten earlier in the week were on the dashboard with the words "There was no divorce" written across the page. Demrow said Gmer had put the

twin barrels of the shotgun on the bridge of his nose and shot himself een the eyes as he sat in the car.

It isn't known what may have happened in the two hours between the time Glenda Greer was murdered and when Shannon Greer took his own life. Demrow speculated that Greer may have sat alone in his car for some time contemplating what he had done and was about to do before

whether some medication of the was taking may have contributed to his violent behavior last Thursday. When word of the shooting got

back to Stanford, Mrs. Greer's attor-ney, James W. Williams III became concerned for his own safety. He had been counseling Mrs. Greer

for several weeks and was convinced that her fear of Shannon Greer's potential for violence was real. Williams said that threats are common in about 60 percent of the

divorce cases he sees but Mrs. Greer's fear convinced him that this threat was more than idle.

Williams went to the sheriff's office until it was confirmed that Green was no long a threat to him. The aftermath

that it would be best for the school to be held the following day, Friday:-School counselors and mental health experts from Stanford, Som-erset and Danville voluntecred to come to the school on Friday and there was a counselor for each class-room.
