Towery said that it is very important everyone understand the process that will be followed in designing a facility plan.

The state will sufficient of the review the data supplied and visit each school building site within the district.

At that point the state will present their facility plan for the county and a public hearing will be held. After the public hearing is held the state will present their final plan in the local board. Ham told the jury that he would present evidence that would in fact prove that Margeret Alcom was guilty of murder beyond a reasonable doubt. Both Ham and Cox told jurors that there would be conflicting re-

ports from many of the witnesses and Cox said that the trial would be filled with stupidity and lies from both sides of the courtroom. Cox was referring to the wit-nesses who would be called in the

nesses who would be called in the case,
The defense attorney told jurors that while it was a tragedy that Elvina June Curry was killed. Kevin R. McCoy, "a confessed killer" shot Elvina June Curry not Margaret Alcorn.
The night of the shooting police arrested Alcorn and charged her with murder. However, Mt. Vernon city police later charged Kevin McCoy, 17, who confessed to police that he shot the child:
But Ham contended in his opening remarks that McCoy was pressured into confessing to the murder and that he did not shoot the child.
Cox, told jurors that everyone involved in the shooting was drinking alcohol, some more than others,

and that Kevin McCoy was intoxicated when he picked up a 12 gauge shot gun and fired into the car where the child was stitting in the back seat-with her sister. Cox said that McCoy certainly did not intend to kill the child, but that was the tragic result of the shotgun blas policie reports, the carthe child was riding in was owned by her mother, Lana Curry, who was also in the car with two other adults at the time of the shocoting. The three dadits were in the front seat.

In the engineering section, molds to be used to produce various plastie-products will be designed, according to Jackie Ivey, vice president and general finanger. The technology group will build, but continue to nurbase molds from

but continue to purchase molds from Italy and Canada. The company hopes

to make all its molds here and in its plant in Sparks, Nev. in the future. The tool section will be where molds are actually made with highly specialized equipment.

priority in the county at this time, partially because the building season is considered over.



ORDINANCE #13-90

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE #203 AND #324, AND PROVIDING FINE FOR OVERTIME PARKING VIOLA-

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KEN-TUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 13(b), Paragraph Two of Ordinance #203 and Ordinance #324 is amended so as to provide as follows:

The Police Officer shall place upon each vehicle parked in violation of Ordiance \$203 (Parking Meter Ordinance) and Ordinance \$324, a notice to the owner or operator thereof that such vehicle has been or is parked in violation of the provision of Ordinance \$203, and in violation of the provision of Ordinance #203 and Ordinance #324, instructing such owner or operator to report to the Clerk of the City of Mt. Vernon in regard to such violation. Each owner or operator may pay the sum of Five (\$\$5.00) dollars to the City Clerk within twenty-four (24) hours of the time such notice was placed on said vehicle, or deposit said sum in a collection box provided by the City at selected sites as full penalty for said violation. In the event said sum is not paid within twenty-four (24) hours, the owner or operator shall pay the sum of Fifteen (\$\$1.500) dollars to the Police Judge if said sum is paid within five (5) days of said violation. If the owner or operator shall not pay said sums in satisfaction of said violation within five (5) days thereof, the penalty for the violation shall be the sum of Twenty-Five (\$25.00) dollars.

Section 2. This amendment shall be effective upon
