Father Beiting and CAP (Christian Appelachian Project) has had, said Jerry Tucker.

Beiting, a Catholic priest, was sent to the area as a seminarian in-1946 and 'fell in lowe with Eastern Kentucky - not only with its beauty but with its storrow.

He never left.
