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Reducing the Risk program conducted at high school

"Some people believe it is useless to try to change things, but we think differently," Ms. Sexton said. She is referring to the high teenage pregnancy rate in Rockcastle County and the attitude some have expressed that nothing can or should be done about it. The health department and the school system recently completed a program where they worked together in an effort to educate teens about the risk of sexual involvement. Many young people are pressured into becoming sexually involved by their peers. They are afraid they won't fit in'f they don't do what everyone else is doing, the fact is, however, the majority of teens are not having sex. We provided teens with the facts and encouraged them not to believe the myth that 'everyone is doing, it when they realize they are not different from most of their peers if they are not sexually involved, they will not feel as pressured by those few who are. In addition to dispelling many of the myths, we taught the students refusal skills. Many teens are afraid of hurting someones feelings or losing their boyfriend or guiffriend. This leads the teen into compromising what he or she really wants to do and they often 'give in' to the pressure. We provided them with the skills necessary to effectively give a strong, clear refusal, yet at the same time communicate their feelings toward the other person."

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

Cumberland Valley Economy to take a hit

About 2,900 families in the Cum-

berland Valley Area are targets.

This number represents nearly as many paychecks as were provided last year in Kentucky by Reynolds Metal Co. and American Greetings

Corp.
The actual targets are tobacco farms
-- 2,909 of them in 1992 -- in Bell,
Clay, Harlan, Jackson, Knox, Laurel,

Rockcastle, and Whitley counties.

If you don't raise tobacco and don't smoke cigarettes, however, why should farm numbers matter to you? Because among your region's 80,400 households, one in 33 earns some or all of its family income from tobacco farming.

And statewide in 1991, tobacco

And statewide in 1991, tobacco generated one in 16 jobs in farming. And statewide in 1991, tobacco generated one in 16 jobs in farming or or 6.3 percent of the Commonwealth's total work force.

But the Cumberland Valley relies even more heavily on tobacco than farm numbers indicate, because laboring in the fields isn't the only way to earn money from the crop. Tobacco's Broader Reach In 1992, the region's eight counties were allotted 9,320 burley quotas to farmers who actually raise the crop. State wide last year, 147,299 burley quotas were infect, or one for every 10 households in the Commonwealth. Notonly are farms and quotas being.

Not only are farms and quotas being

Obacco-related wages and salaries in wholesale/retail trade and in manufacturing.

Statewide in 1991, compensation from all of these sourcestolated 51.35 billion of 4.1 percent of all wages, salaries, and farm proprietars, salaries, and farm proprietars, incomes in the Commonwealth. Since the bulk of that billion-plus came from tobacco auctions, other targets in your region's local commonwies are the annual warehouse sales. In London, for example, 1981.

In London, for example, 1992 burley auctions introduced \$18.57 million into the county's economy. Compared to Laurel County's to-

tal, annual, spendable incomes for all its households -- which was \$428.3 million in 1992 -- London's burley sales brought \$1 of \$25 into the

county.

Taking aim at these targets, of course, is Washington's plan to impose an additional \$2 excise tax on

cigarettes.

Industry analysts expect the \$2-a-pack increase to reduce tobacco sales statewide by \$300 million a year

statewide by \$300 million a year. That statewide loss equals over 16 years of incomes at 1992 levels for your region's tobaccor growers who sell burley on the London market. Can these farmers -- your neighbors -- withstand such a blow? And given your region's dependence on tobacco dollars, can any busines? The numbers argue no. It may include budgeting, health care, child care, training in oling a parent, abuse counseling, or supporting participants when they appear in court. Job training was recently added to the program. This program includes testing for employable skills, instruction on how to prepare resumes and (Cont. to B2) death."

Becoming more knowledgeable about tornadoes is one way to be prepared. A tornado watch, for example, means that tornado development is possible.

"During a tornado watch, keep an eye on the sky for threatching weather and stay turned to the radio and television for weather bulletins," Priddy said.

A tornado warning is more serious because a tornado has been sighted or indicated by radar. Priddy suggests to seek shelter immediately during a tornado warning.

tornado include; storm cellars or pre-designated shelter areas, steel-framed or concrete reinforced underground excavations, basements, and interior hallways on lowest floors. If these ideal types of shelters are not available, there are alternatives for protection

for protection.

If the building is not reinforced by

steel or concrete, Priddy suggests to go to a nearby one that is, or take cover outside on low, protected ground. If there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine. "In homes, seek shelter under sturdy

furniture, in the center part of house or in a small room (such as a closet or bathroom)," Priddy added. There are specific rules to follow

to insure safety:

to insure safety:
Stay away from windows
Stay out of auditoriums, gymnasiums, or other structures with wide
free span roofs.
Do not try to outrun a tormado.
Avoid mobile homes, especially
those not secured by cables anchored
in concrete footing.
Move away from the tormado's path
at right angles.
