

Rogers says tax would hurt

U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers and former Defense Secretary Richard Cheney and a Series of stops in Southern and Central Kentucky yesterday. Kentucky springtime and fertilizing lawns

It is Kentucky's April awakening, and everyone is ready to fertilize their lawns. But, hold that nitrogen, spring-time may not be the best time to fertilize a Kentucky lawn. The butk of fertilizers on lawns of cool-season grasses should be applied during autumn months, not during spring-time.

Leaves of cool-season grasses grow fast enough in the spring on their own. Any excess nitrogen fer-ulization during the springtime causes abundant leaf growth on grass as well as summer weeds. Fertilizing in the spring can mean more mowing in the summer as well.

In addition, excess nitrogen can aggravate certain diseases, such as brown patch on tall fescue and leaf spot and mediting out of Kentucky bluegrass. An acceptable amount is a light springture application of not more than one-half pound of nitrogen per one-thousand square feet. This is 1 1/2 pounds ammonia nitrate per one-thousand square feet. 
