## Gilpatrick admits he made weapon found by police

Mt. Vermon social worker Allen
Gilpatrick made the weapon that was
apparently used to brutally beat his
wife to death on February 7, 1993, it
was learned in the first day of testimony in the much talked about,
widely publicated case.
Gilpatrick, 49, is on trial in Somerset, charged with the murder of his
wife, Virginia "Gimy" Gilpatrick,
55, on that Sunday evening.

Jury selection lasted all Monday morning and Commonwealth's At-torney Ray Carmichael began pre-senting evidence after a lunch break to a Pulaski County Circuit Court

"What you're going to hear, ladies and gentlemen, is a story of love, betrayal and murder," Carmichael told the jury during his opening state

Mt. Vernon Police Officer John Mit. Vernon Police Officer John Bradley was questioned extensively by both Carmichael and John Clontz, Gilpatrick's attorney. Bradley said he was the second officer to arrive at the Gilpatrick residence the night of the

Bradley testified that the weapon police believe was used to beat Virginia Gilpatrick was not found fintil the day after the killing, when police and Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell conducted a more extensive search of the house.

Dowell found agancer hast that held

Dowell found a paper bag that held the bloody, homemade club, Bradley said, in a corner of a room on the opposite end of the house from where the killing occurred. After donning a pair of surgical gloves, Bradley demonstrated how the weapon was apparently put together to form a three-pronged club.

Two curved strips of metal were

fitted together at one end to form a 'Y." with a wooden dowel in the middle, Bradley explained. A piece of metal tubing fitted over one end to form a handle, which was wrapped in

forma handle, which was wrapped in silver duct tape.

Bradley testified that he and Mt. Vernion Detective Boldio Pelaney interviewed Glipatrick the following day, and questioned him about the device.

"He said it was his, that he han dade it . . . in the basement of his house," Fardley testified. "He said that's just for . . . just in case."

The officer also testified that had seen a similar device in Gilpatrick's car sometime prior to the killing.

#### Pathologist says:

#### "Ginny" Gilpatrick struck 16 times with blunt instrument

Family members and friends of "Ginny" Gilpatrick wept silently Tuesday in Pulaski Circuit Coura sata state forensic pathologist described the injuries Mrs. Gilpatrick received on February 7th, 1993, when she was beaten to death in her Mt. Vernon home.

Mrs. Gilpatrick suffered massive, blunt force head trauma, Dr. Carolyn Coyne, testified in the second day of

estimony in the trial.

Allen Gilpatrick, 49, is accused of beating his wife with a homemade club 16 times. The Rockcastle County trial was moved to Pulaski County at the request of defense attorney John

the request of defense attorney John Clontz.

Rockcastle County Coroner Billy Dowell, Dr. Tim Wilson, the emergency room doctor who tried to resuscitate her; and Dr. Coyne, who performed the autopsy on the victim, all testified Tuesday morning. Eddie Delaney assistant chief of the Mt, Vernon Police Department and lead investigator of the case spent the rest of the day on the witness stand and was expected to resume his testimony Wednesday.

Coyne spent several minutes acribing the lacerations and bruises all over Ginny Gilpatrick's head and said the base of her skull was fractured in two places.

Coyne also testified about a stab wound on the right side of the victim's neck, which penetrated 1 5/8 inches. However, Coyne said the "blunt force impact injuires" to her

head killed her before the stab wound caused her to bleed to death. Under cross seamination of Gilpatrick's co-counsel Carl Clontz, the injuries to Mrs. Gilpatrick could have been caused by a ball hat or wood been caused by a ball hat or wood been caused by a ball hat or wood homenade club introduced as the murder weapon could also have caused Mrs. Gilpatrick's mignines. Coroner Bill Dowell testified about finding the club the day after the

#### Controlling bagworms

orms, caterpillars that make Bagworms, caterphinas una mate distinctive spindle-shaped bags, are a major pest of evergreen trees and shrubs in most regions of Kentucky. When abundant, bagworms will strip juniper, arborvitae, cedar, pine and

spruce of their foliage and cause them to die. Honey locust, maple, rose, box elder, willow and many other woody landscape plants can be at-tacked by this pest but rarely are admaged seriously. Orchards are seldom bothered because sprays used to control other pests will also control bagworms.

 Bagworms are the larvae or caterpillar stage of a moth that is rarely seen. In fact, only the males develop into typical moths capable of flight.
 The adult female is grub-like and remains inside the bag until just before site dies.
 Bagworms nass the winter in the

Bagworms pass the winter in the bagworns pass me winter in use egg-stage, inside the bag-hat con-tained the female. In late May or early June the eggs hatch, and the small larvae crawl from the bag in search of food. By using silk and bits of leaves, bark or twigs, they soon build a small bag around their hindpart. As the larvae grow, they add to the bag, making it large enough for them to withdraw into the bag when

disturbed. By early september the bags reach their maximum size of 1

ulsutroca. By carly specmoer into bags reach their maximum size of 1 1/2 to 2 inches. At this time the larvae permanently suspend their bags from twigs with bands of silk. The larvae then transform into the pupa or resting stage before becoming an adult. Adults emerge from the pupal stage in early September. Males are black, try, clear-winged moths with about a 1-inch wingspan. They are active fliers and move in search of mates. Thecreamy white females lack wings and legs and appear to be no more than grubs. The male flies to the female bag, inverse his abdomen in the hole in the bouton of the bag and mates with the ternale. 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

#### Rogers pleads not guilty to conspiracy By: Jack Brammer Herald-Leader Frankfort Bureau

Federal prosecutors have turned over 28 audio tape recordings to the defense of Senate Minority Leader

detense of Senate Minority Leader John Rogers, whose trial is sched-uled to begin June 20.

Rogers, 53, pleaded not guilty yesterday before U.S. District Judge Joseph M. Hood to charges of con-spiracy, attempted extortion, mail

fraud and lying to FBI agents in the continuing investigation of corruption in state government known as Operation BOPTROT.

The charges deal with a 1984 banking bill backed by former Gov. Wallace Wilkinson.

The indictument says Rogers lied to the FBI about money betwoogh Wilkinson owed him for his support of the banking bill that allowed banks to expand beyond county and state lines. Wilkinson has denied any wrong-doing.

Rogers, a Somerset Republican who has been a lawmaker since 1976, who has been a navinated since 170, said nothing to the judge at his arriagnment. His attorney, Jack Smith of Louisville, entered the plea for Rogers, whose wife, Debbie, sat in the courtorom. He was released on

his own recognizance, with no re-strictions on his travel. Federal prosecutor Steve Pence said the government has 62 pieces of evi-dence to introduce in the trial, includ-

dence to introduce in the trial, including at least 28 audio tape recordings. He would not say whether there are more tapes.

The charges carry a five-year statute of limitations, but that limit runs from the point of the dest act in the conspiracy. When that allegedly occurred is not clear.

Spurrier was placed on probation for two years yesterday for corrup-tion charges.

During the bribery trial last year of Wilkinson's nephew, Bruce Wilkinson, Spurrier said that in 1984 Wal-lace Wilkinson promised Rogers, Wester, Miller and himself interest in wester, Miller and himself interest in a bank if they would help get the banking bill passed. All four have said the allegation is without substance.




Bagworms are often kept in check by several species of wasp parasities. Management practices should con-serve the benefits of these natural controls. If your bagworm problem is limited to only a few small trees or shrubs, removal and disposal of the bags during the winter or spring may be sufficient to minimize the prob-lem. When many small bagworms are attacking evergreens, insecticides are needed to prevent serious damage to the trees. The best time to apply an insecticide is before the bags are 1/2 inch long or greater or as soon as there is noticeable damage to the trees. The stually is late June or early July Do not wait for extensive damage. Throughly wet the foliage to obtain the best results. 


