Local family sues ER doctor, hospital

A Rockcastle County woman has filed suit against the Rockcastle Hospital and an emergency room doctor on behalf of her deceased mother.

Gwen Flannery of Roundstone filed suit in Rockcastle Circuit Court on June 7th of this year seeking damages in connection with an October 24, 1993 incident involving her mother Dorothy Pearl Bullock, 77, who died the next

According to the suit. Dr. Rollin F. Snide an employee of Coastal Emergency Services and an emergency room doctor at Rockcastle Hospital, was negligent in the care he provided Mrs. Bullock on Oct. 24, 1993 when she was taken to the emergency room. "As a result of Snide's negligence Mrs. Bullock died on Oct. 25, 1993," the suit

claims.

"The care provided Dorothy Pearl Bullock by Rollins F Snide was a gross deviation from the requisite standard of care and constituted recklessness or gross neglience," the suit continued.

According to Flannery's attorney, Jerry Cox, Mrs. Bullock had classic signs of a heart attack when she was taken to the emergency room on Oct. 24. "She was treated

taken to the emergency room on oct. 24. She was treated and sent home and she died the next day," he said.

In their answer to the suit, the hospital, Snide and Coastal Emergency, deny that improper treatment was given Mrs. Bullock and have asked that the suit be dismissed and that a judgement be rendered against Flannery for their legal expenses.

(2) I have never proposed a tax increase on tobacco. I oppose a tax increase on tobacco.






pass out condoms in schools, and ban smoking, recently called religious Christians "un-Christian" and said they are "selling out children in the name of religion."


