

Rockcastle County school bus drivers will soon be tested for drugs

Local transportation director Glen Vanwinkle told the Rockcastle County Board of Education at their regular monthly meeting that fed-eral law now required all school systems to test 'school bus drivers

January 3.

According to the federal law, the local system must test each driver before he or she can be employed. Drivers now employed by the system will be tested at random.

Vanwinkle said that all alcohol tests will be given directly before or directly after a driver has driven a

Drug tests can be given at any

Rockcastle County schools could begin their testing as early as

pool with the rest of the drivers, meaning that adriver could be tested more than once during a school year. Vanwinkle said.

Vanwinkle also said that, as soon as practical following an accident where there are injuries the driver will be tested.

Any driver that is suspected of using drugs and alcohol can also be tested at the request of Vanwinkle or Superintendent Bige Towery, Jr.

The federal law requires that the school system test at least 25%

of their drivers for alcohol and 50% of the drivers for drugs each calenyear. The employment of any driver

The employment of any driver who tests positive for substance abuse or alcohol will be terminated, Vanwinkle told the board. In other business the board updated some policies, including one that deals with smoking on school

The fleet consists of 2 raised-roof wheelchair lift equipped vehicles and RTEC takes pride in providing an accessible service for persons with disabilities. Also, there are mini-vans, 15 consequence vans and two large buses 15 passenger vans and two large buses and some cars. Some are leased to

1994 models. Some vehicles are leased, some were acquired from agencies with a contract for transpor-tation. A few have been high-mileage cars and vans, purchased and refurbished, but most of the vehicles have been new vehicles granted RTEC and other agencies providing

RTEC and outer agentices provining the match.

RTEC; which was founded out of the old Rockeastle County Public Transit System, provides services in 11 counties of southeast Kentyk and has 39 employees. RTEC provides an average of 17,000 passer trips per month, including access to community services, medical care, shopping and employment.

In a discussion about the people who operate the vehicles, Cummins explained, They are trained and highly skilled vehicle operators, sensitive to needs of the passengers. RTEC recently recognized 21 drivers for safety awards.\*

A Saturday bus service is pro-vided in Mt. Vernon on designated

routes from 9 a.m. to noon. The cost to ride the bus on Saturday is 50 cents each time boarding. Stops are made in town, at grocery stores and Westgate Shopping Center. The regular fare on weekdays in town is 51 ceach time boarding. Rural routes and out-of-town transportation is 50 cents per mile.

RTEC continues to expand its services and, over a period of 4 years, has grown from the one-county public transit system to a system which travels over 1,000,000 miles per yea travels over 1,000,000 miles per year with an average of less than 5 miles per passenger. In 1990, RTEC began its operation with the use of 5 vehicles ranging rom 1977 to 1989 model vans leased from the Senior Citizens Centers of Rockcastle and Whitley County. been recognized by the State for its performances as a Section 18 Grantee, including awards for "Outstanding Grantee for Eastern Kentucky" Grantee for Eastern Kentucky,"

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

#### **Nutrition During** Pregnancy

By: Hazel Jackson County Extension Agent for Home Economics



There are many factors which influence pregnancy. Some of these factors, such as diet and nutrition, are controllable. Both human and animal studies provided the data for the establishment of guidelines about before and during pregnancy. Adherence to these guidelines may reduce the risk of prenature birth, a low birthweight baby, a stillborn birth, birth defects or other problems during birth. Women likely to develop nutrient deficiencies include those who: "are young adolescents

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

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

**Babbage outlines** more chances to register to vote

Citizens in Rockcastle County will have expanded opportunities to reg-ister to vote when Kentucky imple-ments the National Voter Registration Act of 1993 on January 2, 1995, according to Secretary of State Bob

according to Secretary of State Bob Babbage.

Babbage, who by law is designated the state's chief election officer, is in charge of implementing the federal law in Kentucky.

"We expect over 90 percent of eligible Kentuckians to be registed to voteby 1999 as a result of this new program." Babbage said.

Known by the nick-name of "Motor-Voter" because it permits voter registration when and where persons obtain driver's licenses, the law expands voter registration opportunipands voter registration opportuni-ties once limited to the county clerk's

Each motor vehicle driver's license application, including any renewal application, will serve as an applica-

application, including any renewal application, will serve as an application for voter registration unless the applicant fails to sign the voter registration application. Previous voter records may also be updated using the new system. Voter registration will also be offered for the first time by agencies which provide benefigts under the Aid to Families with DepAndent Children, Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants, and Children, Medicaid of Food Stamp programs. Registration will also be available to Armed Forces recruiting stations

to Armed Forces recruiting stations and to agencies which provide services to the disabled. Babbage noted that young Ken-tuckians are the least registered of


ny age group. Last August only 2,271



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


