For the third time in five seasons

For the third time in five seasons the Rockets are district champs, thanks to a 18-10 win over highly touted Estill County Friday night. Possibly the largestcrowd ever to winess a Rockeastle County football game, saw the Rockets turn in their best performance of the season. Head coach Tom Larkey gave Estill a look at the shougun offense, something the Rockets have not done all season long and it seemed to keep Estill County off balance throughout the night.

Estill was actually a bigger team Estill was actually a bigger team than Rockcastle and the shotgun for-mation helped keep the Engineers from stacking up the middle of the defensive line.

The Rockets also did something they have done very little all season, they put together a first quarter drive on their first possession that ate up over nine minutes of clock and resulted in a 28 yard field goal by Ray-

mond Blackburn.

After the Rockets took the 3-0 lead, the Engineers took the ball on a long drive of their own, resulting in a 22 yard touchdown by back Jimmy Farthing, which gave Estilla 7-3 lead. However the Rockets took the lead back before halftime after mount-

lead back before halftime after mounting another good drive that culminated with a one yard touchdown nun by quarterback Jamie Linville. Blackbur added the extra point to give the Rockets a 10-7 halftime lead.

The Engineers tide the ballgame again in the third quarter when placekicker Ander Neace kickeda 24 yard field goal midway through the

quarter. The Rockets were happy to allow the field goal after the Engineers had intercepted a Rocket pass on the 21 yard line. The Engineers got the ball to the eight yard line before the Rocket defense surfied the Engineers. The Engineers threw at defensive back Ronnie Vanzant twice inside the ten, but both times he made good plays to knock down the passes. Rocket head assistant Tony Saylor said that Friday night's defensive effort was the best put forth by the Rockets since they lost to Whitesburg earlier in the season. Saylor said that several Rockets played extremely well on defensees especially sprior Neil Sparks who had seven tackles and arsists on the night. Saylor also had praise for first year player, senior Adam Browning who had two sacks on the night. Jarrod Singleton also played well with five tackles, considering he separated his shoulder in last week's game with Madison Southering he separated his shoulder in last week's game with Madison South-

The Rockets and the Engineers waged a defensive battle for most of the rest of the second half before the Rockets would take the lead for good

Rockets would take the lead for good on an eight yard touchdown run by tailback Dallas Rigsby.

the final minute.

The crowd at Friday's game was so large that several fans were actually forced to stand on the track around the field to watch the game. Many Estill fans stood around their team on the opposite side of the field and apparently with 52 seconds left in the game, one of those fans made some derogatory comments that prompted. the head official to throw a flag. However the Rockets were the team



It has been determined that there is no practicable alternative to avoid this impact. The basis of this determination is as follows:

The proposed water system must be located within the floodplai in order to serve the proposed customers.

The applicant will be required in the RECD Letter of Conditions to

amend its bylaws whereby it will deny service to any new customers planning to build in a floodplain.

The proposed action conforms to applicable state and local floodplain protection standards. ARC will be participating in the project.

It has also been determined that the proposed action will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment and will not prepare an environmental impact statement.



Our first venture into improving the crude way of doing the wash, by setting the tubs on a homemade bench vard close to the furnace that heated the water, was to buy a com mercial bench that held two tubs with a hand operated wringer between them. This bench was set on a level

a nand operated writing electroeia them. This bench was set on a level place close to the spring with the furnace built next to it. This way the water would not have to be carried up the hill but the wet clothes would have to be so they could be hung on the lines in the yard to dry.

The wringer was a real improvement of the hand wringing but it was still a tiresome chore to feed the clothes into it with one hand and turn the handle that operated the rolls that pressed the water out of the clothes with the other. But at least it was progress over the old way of wringing them. And even in the depths of the mountains of Kentucky progress was in motion. in motion

was in motion. The next improvement was getting a gasoline-powered washing
machine. What a beating washing
machine. What a beating washing
machine with wringer attached sitting on the
back porch was a dream come true.
Now I would not have to bend over a
washboard and scrub the dirt out, the
washing machine would do that for
me, and the attached automatic
wringer was a blessing for now there
would be no more blisters made by would be no more blisters made by wringing them by hand and they would dry much quicker. This was not the only benefit the new washing not the only benefit the new washing machine brought to us, it also had a charger connected to it that charged the battery to the radio we listened to every Saturday night and, sometimes, if the juice held out, in the evenings when friends came to visit. The radio was another modern blessing of that time. There was seldom a Saturday night passed that we didn't have a house full of young people who came to hear "The Grand Old Opry." And after they left there was seldom to hear "The Grand Old Opyr." And after they left there was seldom enough juice left in the battery to listen to John Lair's Sunday morning Gatherin." It took several hours to only became necessary to have clean clothes it was also necessary if we were to have entertainment the next Saurday night. About this time we also invested in another important aide to the laun-

in another important aide to the laundry. This was a gasoline iron. A small tank that held white gasoline was attached to the back of the nice was attached to the back of the nice shiny stainless steel iron and acted as a rest for the iron when it wasn't in use. I remember we had to loosen a valve somewhere and pump air into the tank with a pump air into the tank with a pump air and to it, then light it, and soon a sizzling sound announced it was hot enough to iron with and I no longer had to switch irons every few minutes nor keep a fire in the stowe. White gasso-line for the iron, lamp and lanter which we were now using had to be which we were now using had to be kept separate from the gas used for the washing machine and this some-times caused problems when visitors offered to fill them and didn't under stand the difference. We also had to

stand the difference. We also had to keep fue oli of forthe refrigerator. Yep, we had one of those also.

Then came the advent of electric-ity in our area. Now we had water in our house and an electric automatic washer and iron was added to the joy of living in an isolated area. A hot water tank was crowded into corner of the kitchen, the washer
