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



When Miracle returned to the jail from the dentist office, he was searched and drugs were found. Miracle was arrested the same day as Allen and charged with promoting contraband and possession of a controlled substan

trolled substance.
Apparently Miracle had obtained
Cocaine, Valium and Marijuana either on the way to the dentist or
errofue back to the jail.
The County Attorney said that
Allen has pled guilty to the official
misconduct charge, which is a misdemeanor.

Allen will be fined \$250 plus costs and receive a six month probated sentence. He will also be required to serve eight days in jail and resign as deputy jailer, a position he has held six months.

Anthony Tumer, 22,0 Sand Gap, Anthony Tumer, 22,0 Sand Gap, who was also arrested at the same time as Miracle and Allen, pled guilty in Rockcastle District Court on Wednesday and received six months for promoting contraband.

Two other Rockcastle County men were indicated on drug related charges as well.

Elmer Boyd Stewart, 34, of Orlando was indicated for possession of a controlled substance on March 13. He is accused of unlawfully hav-

ing 96 Tylox pills, a schedule II controlled substance in his posses-

Stewart was also indicted for Stewart was also anucted for being a persistent felony offender. Stewart has been of three other felo-nies in Rockcastle County since 1992. Two of the convictions were drug





"If I could recommend one lifestyle change to most people, it would be to participate in some form of regular exercise.'

"On average, most patients with an episode of back pain will come to us for 12 one hour visits. We see problems brought on by anything from arthritic changes to an employee lifting boxes they have lifted for 25 years. One of our recent patients continually leaned over her desk at work. She severely strained her lower back through the accumulation of chronically slouched posture in a poorly-fitted chair. Even reading in bed with a pillow under your head can lead to a future episode of back pain," Coy says.

Pain control, therapy, exercise and patient education are all a part of Rockcastle Hospital's Physical Therapy Department's treatment for back injuries. "When people first come to us with their back injuries, we generally begin with the use of pain control modalities. We may use heat or ice, ultrasound, electrical stimulation or a combination of these to promote healing and reduce or block the pain. These are all short term treatment strategies. Long term, we teach strengthening exercises, proper lifting techniques and proper posture. We have an exercise gym that includes aerobic equipment which we like to progress our patients to."

"What makes our program special is that we try to do a lot of patient education. We have great equipment and we are very pro-active in believing the patient should learn everything about their diagnosis, treatment, exercise program and basic back care so they can prevent future reoccurrence. We are very high on back injury prevention and do a significant amount of patient and community teaching on back injury issues. The answer lies in prevention: posture, exercise and proper lifting. We want everyone to have a healthy back."
