The active ingredient that once gave good control is no Jonger age to good control is no Jonger Resistance had developed at several locations in Kentucky where cattle ear tags impregnated with synthetic pryterhold insecticides were used for several consecutive years. So far, no resistance problem has been seen with organophosphate insecticides, the nervous system of the horn fly differently so rotation keeps from pressuring one activity site. Here are some tips for using insecticide-impregnated ear tags: J Rotate synthetic pyrethroids with organophosphates. Avoid continued use of a particular class of insecticide year after year.

2) Wait to tag. Begin treatment

too early, especially with ear tags, may mean poor control in late summer when the flies are most abundant and can lead to resistance.

Agriculture News

By Warden, chander, County Executive Director Sizu-up has stated for the Pro-duction Flexibility Program. This pro-gram replaces the Wheat and Feed Grain Program which has always been administered through FSA. Sign-up will extend until July 12. This is the seally concertuinty that producers will was extend until July 12. This is the only opportunity that producers will have to entroll in this 7 year program, except for producers with land comining out of CRP (Conservation Reserve Program). Any farm with a crop acreage base (CAB) is eligible to participate. Base allotment notices have been misted to receive and the producers of the prod have been mailed to producers who are eligible in Rockcastle County. There are no planting requirements and no set-aside acres for this new program. If at any time a producer who has signed up in the program wishes to terminate his contract within the 7 years, he may do so without penalties. Come in and we will be

the 7 years, he may do so without penalties. Come in and we will be glad to answer questions about the program and work up the amount of payment your farm would earn in this program. Farms with CABs that do not enroll in the PF Program, their CAB, will be reduced to zero. FCIC is no longer a requirement for USDA benefits. Producers who elect not to take out insurance coverage may waive their disaster benefits and still receive price support benefits. A maiver request form must be signed in the county office if a producer decides on this option. Waivers may be signed upon crop certification or anytime prior to receiving marketing cards or Production Flexibility contract payments.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) participants have the option to

extend their contracts, or apply for an early release. To apply for an extension of early release, application must be filed by May 31, this pertains to producers who-wish to restore their crop acreage bases for the 1996 crop year. For more details contact the

office.

Crop certification deadline will be July 1st, this is also the last day a tobacco lease may be signed. ALL crops must be planted at the time of certification. It is important for ALL producers growing burley tobacco

producers growing burley tobacco on their farm(s) to file a crop reports. It is also a requirement for CRP accage and fruit or vegetable acreage to be reported.

CRP acreage will be released in all counties nationwide for emergency haying and grazing, based on a national livestock economic emergency.

CRP participants may file requests in all counties in all states regardless of reemergency haying and grazing in all counties in all states regardless of weather conditions and production levels. Grazing provisions are effective limediately and haying provisions are effective bully 1. For more information, contact the FSA Office.

4) Lactating cows and growing calves appear to have the greatest potential for loss to horn fly attack. Give them top priority or Confirmed problems with pyre-throid-resistant horn flies in Kentucky are infrequent but can occur anywhere. The suggestions

listed above should minimize the potential for future problems. However, practices on surrounding farms will have an effect on flies. Should resistance develop, these suggestions are the only way to obtain satisfactory control.

Flies will move in from other areas. A recent Georgia study showed that horn flies can move three miles or more (other studies have shown greater flights). This means that dust bags or backrubbers may be needed if fly numbers move in and exceed 200 per head.



RECC crews begin summer clearing of rights-of-way

Overgrown rights-of-way can be hazardous to your electric service, and Jackson County RECC Has joined ranks of utilities across the country that are turning to herbicide spraying to keep them clear.

Crews will begin spraying 115 across in northern Jackson County and 450 acros in Rockcastle County this week. Almost 1300 acros in Lee and Owsley County are also targeted for spraying beginning in July.

The spraying program not only provides an economical way to clear overgrown trees and brush, but it also comes with an environmentally safe stamp of approval.

The herbicides used for the program are similar to common spray many of us use to control weeds in our own front yards, Roundung, said Jackson County RECC Operations Manager Lee Dunsil.

According to information from the Monsanto Company, which manufactures herbicides used by Jackson County RECC, the chemi-

Those used by the RECC spray-ing program have proven to be less toxic than ordinary table salt. The herbicides have also been classified as non carcinogenic by the U.S. En-vironmental Protection Agency.

The chemical is administered by

using a backpack sprayer, which enables crews to reach areas that had enables crews to reach areas that had been inaccessible to mechanical cut-ters. The backpacks also allow them to spay selective plants and areas, rather than mechanically clearing large tracts at a time. Spraying also reduces the use of heavy machinery, which can disturb the soil and wildlife nesting areas. In addition to beine environmen-

the soil and wildlife nesting areas. In addition to being environmentally safe, Dunsil said the spray will enable the cooperative to extend the right-of-way cleaning cycle. He hopes to eventually spray once every 10 years versus mechanically cutting a right-of-way every three years.

Dr. Harry M. Sparks, 88, president emerius of Murray State University died Monday, May 20 at
Murray-Calloway County Hospital.
He was born in Rockstate County
on July 27, 1907, the son of the late
Robert A. Sparks and Lena Bentley
Sparks. Dr. Sparks began his long
career at Murray State in 1948, serving first as professor and then chairman of the Department of Education.
After 15 years on the faculty- he tro-k

ing first as professor and then chairman of the Department of Education. After 15 years on the faculty, he took a leave of absence and served as Superimendent of Public Instruction for the Commonwealth of Funktier (Superince) of the 1968. On January 8, 1968, he became president of Murray State University, serving until his retirement in 1973. Dr. Sparks began his long and distinguished career of service in education in 1930 in the Breckinridge County Schools. He taught, cached and was principal and super-intendent. McDaniel's Elementary School was his first assignment, then Hardinsburg High School and Irvington High School. He then went to Russell High School in 1941 as principal and left in 1944 to entils in the U.S. Navy. He became principal of Mayfield High School in 1947. He received his early education in the Mt. Vernon public schools. He attended Bethany College in West Virginia and received an A. B. degree with cum laude honors from Transyl-vania University in Lextington. He completed both his master's and doctoral degrees at the University of Kentucky. His military-service in the Navy extended from June 1944 through 1946. He was stationed at the 7th Naval District Headquarters in Miami, with the rank of lieutenant

commander.





9.733 Rockcastle Countians registered

Rockcastle Countians contributed to Kentucky's new record high of 2.317/928 registered voters, according to Sefretary of State John Y. Brown III, chairman of the State Board of Elections.

The county now has a total of 9.733 citizens registered to vote in the May 28 primary election, according to Brown.
