



Carmichael claims he is innocent of the charges and says he will be found innocent during his trial which begins October 5 at the U.S. Federal Courthouse building in Lexington. According to open court records, here is what its known of the case that eventually led to Carmichael's indictment.

Changes in burning laws take effect October 1st

October 1 is the beginning of the official Fall Forest Fire Hazard Season in Kenucky. With the passes on in Kenucky. With the passes on in Kenucky. With the passes of House Bill 488 by the 1998 General Assembly there is a significant change in the law concerning burning during forest fire hazard seasons. Kentucky law designates October 1 through December 15 as Fall Forest Hazard Season. During this time, the law requires burning within 150 feet of the woods or burning anything

of the woods or burning anything capable of spreading fire into the woods to the hours of 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.

woods to the hours of p.m. to 6 a.m.
The burning law was changed from
4:30 p.m. to midnight to the new
hours of 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. The change
in the burning law is intended to
prevent fires by allowing burning only
during the time when typically the
wind is calm and humidity is increased.

While burning is allowed between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m., no one should burn unless the air is calm and there is control of fire. It is illegal to start a control of tire. It is niegal to start a fire any time of the year on or near timberland without taking all reason-able precautions to prevent it from spreading. One of the leading causes of forest fires in Kentucky is fire accidentally escaping when people burn trash and other unwanted material. Reasonable

other unwanted material. Reasonable precautions require that the ground be cleared around a fire and that tools and water be readily available. The law also requires that all outdoor fires be attended until extinguished. Remember to check state air quality and waste management regulations, and local ordinances before conduct-

ing any outdoor burning.
Arson is another leading cause of forest fires in Kentucky. Deliberately setting fire to the forest is punished by fines and/or imprisonment. Forest arson can be reported by calling 1-

800-27-ARSON (1-800-272-7766). "Wildlife damages more than just trees. Wildlife habitat, residential structures, forest resources, scenic beauty, and water quality are lost or damaged by wildlife. Kentucky is blessed with IZ7 million acres of forestland. Please exercise extreme care with fire in and around our forests," said Mar Matuszewski, Director of the Kentucky Division of Forestry. Some ares in Kentucky already have local ordinances in place that have local ordinances in place that are similar to the new state require-ments. For example, Bell, Clay, Harlan and Jackson counties in the Cumberland Valley Health Depart-ment District already require a site evaluation for electrical hook-up and an approved sewage disposal plan. The local ordinances were enacted county-by-county over the last seven

The local ordinances were enacted county-by-county over the last seven years.

"When we first implemented the ordinances in Bell County, we probably tripled or quadrupled the number of legal systems, at that time, probably fewer than one in four systems were in compliance," said Damy Davis, the District's Director of Environmental Health. "We had no way of finding illegal systems."

Davis said during his 25 years with the district, he has seen vast improvements in the sewage disposal systems because of the ordinances and he thinks the state will benefit from the new requirements.

It has come to our attention that some burley tobacco warehouse operators are buying tobacco from producers and later reselling this tobacco as product tobacco. In order to obtain price support eligibility the producers' marketing cards are used by the warehousemen to identify the tobacco as a first producer sale. USDA regulations do not prohibit

may be made provided the following
conditions are met:

1. There is a written agreement
covering the advance.

2. The parties comply with the

less than the average net sale price

The written agreement, available from the FSA office, shall be between the producer and the warehouse operator, dealer or other person who makes the advance that fully and accurately sets forth the conditions of the advance. The written agreement shall contain:

1. The amount, nature and date of dvance of consideration.

The pounds of tobacco on which e advance or consideration is made.

2. The journal of the advance or consideration is made.

3. The date that final settlement will be made, which can be no later than the date of settlement on to-bacco for which there is no advance.

4. The signatures of the producer and the person making the advance. If you have been contacted to sell your tobacco by any means other than the traditional auction sale you may want to contact this office to assure that your marketing transaction is handled properly.

If you receive an advance, your tobacco should not be co-mingled with other producers' tobacco. You should be provided a copy of the sale

bill showing when the tobacco was sold at auction. Compare the auction price with the advanced price to see if the warehouse owes you additional

Producers who fail to follow proper marketing procedures may be subject to prosecution under Title 18, Section 1001 of the U.S. Criminal



OF THE ROCKCASTLE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION
On October 22, 1986, President Reagan signed into law the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response
Act (AHERA, Public Law 99-519). The law required EPA to develop regulations which provide a
comprehensive framework for addressing asbestos problems in public and private elementary and
secondary schools. On October 30, 1987, EPA published the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools
Rule (40 CFR Part 763 Subpart E). This rule requires all public and private elementary and secondary
schools to inspect for friable and non-friable asbestos, develop asbestos management plans that address
asbestos hazards in school buildings, and implement response actions in a timely fashion.
To carry out the above activities involving inspections, management plans, and response actions the
Rockcastle County Board of Education has utilized accredited personnel. On April 30, 1987, EPA
published the Model Accreditation Plan (40 CFR Part 763 Appendix C to Subpart E) required by AHERA,

Cooper, P.E. who completed an initial inspection to locate all asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) and developed and submitted to the State of Kentucky an asbestos Mangemant Plan that includes the results of the inspections. In December of 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education began to implement this management.

Children often can't eat enough at mealtime to supply the energy they need each day. An after-school snack is one way to provide a steady energy supply and help children make healthy snacks a lifetime habit.

Because children have small appetites and stomachs, it doesn't take much to fill them. However, growing, active children need a lot of energy. In fact, their total energy needs are comparable to an adult's. Research indicates that snacking is a good way to give children the variety of mutrients necessary' for growth and development.

necessary for growth and development. Snacks don't have to be high-calorie, low-nutrient foods. Wise snack food choices can provide the essential nutrients children need. For example, fruits and vegetables, make fast, easy snacks that are jampacked with vitamins, minerals and

fiber.

Lifelong eating habits are formed during childhood so this is a good time to instill a balanced approach to smacking. And the Food Guide Pyramid is a good place to begin.

The Food Guide Pyramid emphasizes five major food groups that give children the essential

nutrients. Each food group provides some, but not all, of these nutrients. Youngsters ages two years and older need at least six child-size scrings from the bread, erecal, rich and pasta group; a combined minimum of five child-size servings of fruits and vegetables; at least three servings from the milk, yogurt and cheese group; and at least two child-size servings from the group containing meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts.

Other factors affecting the number

of servings daily from each food or servings daily from each look group include the number of calories a child needs and the youngster's size and activity level. The small tip if the Food Guide Pyramid represents fats, oils, and sweets. Eat these infrequently because they generally contain a lot of calories but have very little nutritional value.

Foods like cookies, ice ream and potato chips can be part of a varied diet in moderation. But remember, indoctation is the key here. Give your children small and infrequent servings of high-fat and high-sugar foods.

A hands-on-training course is recommended for all ATV operations. Inexperienced riders in their first month of using a ATV have 13 times the average risk of injury. Beginning riders should receive a training course from a qualified instructor. Basic maneuvers taught in training should be practiced regularly on safe terrain.




