Joseph Lambert to be sworn-in as Chief Justice of high court



Kentucky Supreme Court Justice Joseph Lambert

Swearing to take place October 5

Rockcastle County's own Joseph E. Lambert will be sworn-in as the state's highest ranking member of the judicial system when he takes office as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court on October 5.

Lambert, 50, will replace Robert F. Stephens as only the fourth Chief Justice in the state's history.

Lambert, of Mt. Vernon, has served as a Supreme Court Justice since he was elected in 1986 to the seven member court.

He serves the state's third supreme court district, which is comprised of 27 counties. He ran unopposed for reelection in 1994. That term expires in 2002.

Replacing Stephens, who served as the court's highest official for 15 years, Lambert is the youngest person, at age 50, to ever sit at the top of the state's highest court. He was the youngest person ever elected to the court in 1986 when at 37 he defeated Laurel County Circuit Judge Charles Luker by 11,000 votes.

Judge Venters sentences Gary McKinney to death

On Monday, Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln County Circuit Judge Daniel Venters upheld a jury's recommendation and sentenced a Rockcastle County man to death for the triple murders of his wife and stepchildren.

After reviewing new sentencing options that became law earlier this summer, Venters imposed the death penalty for Gary Casper McKinney, 31, in connection with the shooting deaths of his wife, 29-year-old Shirley Bowles McKinney and her children, 11-year-old Brian and 3-year-old Amy Michelle Bowles.

Their charred bodies were found April 2, 1995, inside a four-room house on Poplar Hollow Road in the Plato Vanhook community of north-eastern Pulaski County. The three victims had been shot and died prior to the blaze, according to testimony at the trial.

Besides the murder charge, Ven-

ters sentenced McKinney to five years in prison for second-degree arson; 1 year for tampering with evidence; and 12 months each on three counts of abuse of a corpse. The terms of these sentences are scheduled to run concurrent with the death penalty.

A death penalty case is automatically appealed and Venters ordered McKinney's records be transferred to the Supreme Court. The defense asked - and Venters agreed - to contact the State Department of Public Advocacy who will likely represent McKinney on appeal.

Venters said the court also will instruct those involved in the case that no evidence be destroyed or lost.

Prior to pronouncing sentence on the murder charge, Venters said he considered three separate sentencing options before he arrived at his decision. A change in Kentucky statutes apparently gave Venters an option to possibly consider imposing a sentence of life in prison without parole.

He said some jurors had asked after the trial why this option was not part of the sentencing phase.

McKinney's attorneys, Mike Williams and Mark Stanziano, asked the court to consider the new sentencing alternatives.

Asst. Commonwealth Attorney Eddy F. Montgomery said the prose-

Sparks is accused of driving with his pants down and fondling himself while passing a tractor-trailer truck driven by Lisa Weesner of Casey County last week.


Court papers indicate that Weesner took down the license number of the truck allegedly driven

A look back at Rockcastle County

Reprinted from the 1992 Rockcastle History Book which was published by the Rockcastle County Historical Society.

Education in Rockcastle County
 The National Commission on Excellence in Education reported to the nation the status of education in 1983. A *Nation at Risk* was the title of the published report. This report prompted a series of reform efforts in education, beginning in the mid 1980s and continuing to the present.

In 1985, the Kentucky General Assembly enacted the first wave of reform for the public schools of Kentucky; however, the major mandate for reform in the Commonwealth came in 1990. The General Assembly responded to the Kentucky Supreme Court's Opinion that equity of funding and adequacy for education were not uniform across the state. A massive education reform bill, House Bill 940 - The Kentucky Education Reform Act - was passed and became effective July 13, 1990.

The Rockcastle County School District was well on the way to school reform/improvement before KERA was enacted. The district had been studying the literature - the research regarding quality education for the 21st century, how schools would be operated and governed, and what would be the new and different skills our students would have to master to be successful in life and in employment for the rapidly changing society.

Before the enactment of KERA, the Rockcastle County School District was designing a Strategic Plan to address identified weaknesses and to develop and implement a plan for improvement. The Strategic Planning Committee was composed of parents, community members, school staff and board representation. The Committee worked for eighteen (18) months and ultimately the Rockcastle

County Board of Education adopted the Strategic Plan and made a commitment to promote and support the plan. A mission statement was written and which encompassed the goals of the Strategic Plan.

Mission Statement - Rockcastle County District.

The mission of the Rockcastle County Schools is to develop students who have the knowledge and basic life skills to lead productive, fulfilling lives; therefore, we must create a positive education environment which requires a well defined curriculum, appropriate facilities and a total commitment from school personnel, students, parents and community.

All schools in Rockcastle County are implementing the Effective Schools Process and all schools are operating under a form of self-governance named School Based Deci-

sion Making. The Rockcastle County School District is one of ten districts in Kentucky participating in a program entitled The Institute for the 21st Century. The provisions of the Kentucky Education Reform Act are being implemented in all the schools within the district.

The decade of the 90s will result in a complete transformation of the public education system in Kentucky and the nation. Certainly, the Rockcastle County School District will be a part of this movement. It is an exciting and challenging time to be an educator.

The citizens of our county, all staff members and students are to be commended for the commitment made to achieve and maintain a quality education program. It is a team effort and as a result, the future will be brighter for our children. In Kentucky, we speak of World Class Standards for World Class Kids. The students enrolled in Rockcastle County School District are certainly world class kids and our school system will prepare them for employment and for life in the 21st century. I make no claim to being a patient person except when I'm in a doctor's office. Long-winded people make me tired and I suppose I make a lot of people tired myself because I'm prone to over-stating my case on frequent occasions.

I don't like waiting. Thank Heaven, there's always a guitar that needs tuning and strumming in the barber shop I use or I'd probably let my hair get far too long to be considered stylish for a man my age.

What really drives me nuts, however, is having to wait nothing else to do. In grocery lines, I usually avail myself to a magazine, which I can sometimes read cover to cover before finally getting to the checkout counter. In traffic jams, I can pop a bluegrass tape into the player and sing along. However, there's absolutely nothing meaningful to do while you're standing in line at a fast food joint except get more and more irritated.

It's not the sandwich and fries that give me gas and acid indigestion as much as the sheer aggravation of standing for an extended period of time between people just as irked as I am at the slowness of fast food lines.

First of all, there's a complete listing of the menu and the prices as posted big as a bill board above the counter that even I can read at great distances without my glasses. Within 30 seconds of getting in line I know exactly what I want and what it's going to cost. But the larger percentage of customers who frequent fast food places stand in line for fifteen minutes, get to the counter, and then don't have a clue about what they might like to eat.

"Oh, let's see, I think I'll have a hummmmmmmmmmm. Can I have just a minute to make up my mind?"

Ninety seconds later the counter attendant shows back up and pops the, "have you been waited on yet?" question. Now the customer has narrowed down somewhat.

"Yeah, I think I'll have the gut buster with fries and a small soda.

How much is that?"

"That's a number 3. It's \$2.99. Except it has a medium coke instead of a small," says the attendant.

"Oh I didn't see that. A package deal, huh? How much does that save me over ordering separately?"

"Let's see," says the attendant. \$1.99 plus .89 cents plus .59 cents adds up to hummmmmmmmmmm \$3.57.

"Did you figure that with a medium or a small soda?"

"Medium. That's what it comes with."

"Okay. How much is the whole thing separately if I get it with a small soda?"

"We don't see small sodas any longer."

"Okay let me have the gut buster and fries with a glass of water. How much does that come to?"

Now in the meantime, there are people in the back of the line who would shoot both this customer and the attendant if it were not for one small problem. We'd have to wait even longer for someone to clean up the mess before we could order lunch.

So I've come up with a major innovation for fast food places. It's called the Big Vacuum Thing (BVT) and what it consists of is a long tube about three feet in diameter that runs from each cash register, through the ceiling to the back of the waiting line. Inside each tube are rotating, lead-filled baseball bats.

Anyone getting to the front of the line would have exactly 10 seconds to place an order. If they were not speaking plainly and decisively within that amount of time, the BVT would suck them up, give them a good beating and spit them out head first at the back of the line.

Meanwhile, the attendant would calmly say, "Next please." The fast food places would have a far more satisfied customer base and those of us in a hurry would have something interesting and entertaining to watch while we stand in line.

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

NOTICE

Rockcastle County Schools Special Education Programs are in the need of volunteers to serve as surrogate parents.

A surrogate is required to be appointed by the district when:

- A. no one can be identified who meets the criteria of "parent",
- B. a parent is identified but efforts, including registered mail to the last known address, fail to locate the parent; or
- C. the child is a ward of the State (i.e., all parental rights have been terminated by a court of competent jurisdiction). A child or youth is a ward of the State when legal responsibility to make decisions regarding the welfare and education of the child or youth has been assigned to a State agency or a representative of a state agency.

The surrogate must be an adult; have knowledge and skills to represent the child; and have no interest that conflicts with the interest of the child. Employees of any agency involved with the care or education of the child are not eligible to serve in this capacity.

First Christian Church celebrates 168th anniversary this Sunday

This coming Sunday, September 27 the congregation of First Christian Church will celebrate their 168th anniversary with the theme "Immeasurably More!" This theme was adopted due in large part to the tremendous blessings received in recent years. Blessings that are a testimony to faithful Christians and God's faithfulness. The apostle Paul writes in Ephesians 3:20-21, "Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be the glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen." This verse speaks to what God has done and is doing within the congregation.

Recent happenings had their beginning 10 to 12 years ago when the leadership of the church entered into a long range plan and vision for the congregation that included spiritual growth and physical improvements. Among those physical improvements were the plans to renovate the present building and build a fellowship hall. The congregation committed themselves to this plan and to God in seeing this vision come about.

The fulfillment of this vision began to take shape upon the receiving a nearly \$100,000 bequest from the estate of the late Rosa Gentry Caudill

in 1992. Upon receipt of this the congregation put together a committee to look into the best use of the money, which had been designated to use in building a fellowship hall. After much prayer the recommendation to the congregation was to enter a three phase plan to remodel the present building and build a fellowship hall. The work began in August 1995 with Harbour, Inc. having put together this plan and hired to manage phase one, the remodeling of the present building which dates back to 1923.

As we prepared for this much time was spent in a study of the Old Testament books of Nehemiah and Ezra, a Bible study entitled, "Experiencing God" and a series of messages concerning God's ownership of all things and His calling us to be good stewards. The people of First Christian Church truly placed their hands to the plow without looking back and committed themselves to a task they believed was a God sized project that only He could accomplish as we entrusted our lives to him.

The congregation left the present building in September 1995 and during their absence worshipped in the building of Our Lady of Mt. Vernon Catholic Church for nine

months. We learned during this time that as part of the body of Christ we were the church, not the building and the scriptures from Acts 17: 24-25 "The God who made the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth and does not live in temples built by hands, as if he needed anything, because he himself gives all men life and breath and everything else," and Hebrews 11:10, "For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God." We were also able to build deepening relationships with the people of Our Lady of Mt. Vernon and the Lighthouse Assembly of God congregation who used their facility following us because of a fire destroying their building. This doesn't mean we stand in agreement in our interpretation of scriptures with them, just that we have a deeper understanding and earned the right to converse in a positive manner that uplifts Christ.

We reentered our present building in June of 1996. The final cost of the remodeling was nearing \$500,000. Along with the gift of Mrs. Caudill our people had given already nearly \$100,000 leaving a debt of approximately \$280,000. Through a commitment campaign, Together Everyone Accomplishes More the congregation committed themselves to repaying this debt and continuing on with the vision began in the late 1980s. Along the way gifts of \$10,000 and \$30,000 were received anonymously and many of our elderly people who have been a part of this congregation for 50+ years gave their "widow's mite."

We received a bequest from Bill and Dorothy Landrum, long time members of First Christian Church and respected leaders in our community, in the amount of \$50,000 all during the first year. All of this was an answer from God to what had been laid down as a challenge. "Text me in this," says the Lord Almighty, "and

see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have enough for it." Malachi 3:10. The challenge made from the pulpit was to commit ourselves to the Lordship of Christ and that He would amaze us in how He could provide. He more than amazed us.

In early fall of 1997 the congregation received word that they were to receive the residual of the estate of Myrtle Webb. Mrs. Webb was a long time resident of Madison County where she had been a very giving person through the years, having given property to the Westside Christian Church to build, providing land for the Salvation Army among many others. In memory of her husband,

Gentry, Mrs. Robbins is well overdue for a brief respite from at least one of the numerous duties she performs on a weekly basis. I feel sure she wouldn't mind my offering thanks on her behalf to all of you who have kept her in your thoughts and prayers for the past few weeks.

On a happier note, I can relate that those of us who work at the library have emerged from the dreaded "inventory weeks" in August with a greater appreciation for all the library professors who started the whole library concept many, many, many years ago.

staff would like to encourage each of you to sample the different varieties of books we hope to include in future exhibits.

For our avid readers who anticipate the arrival of new books, we have a few to add to our shelves. Included among these offerings are: **YANKEE DOODLE DEAD** by Carolyn Hart...The folks on the Board's Rock library board want to declare their independence from new member, retired Brigadier General Charlton "Bud" Haich. A man accustomed to being in charge, Haich has commandeered the Fourth of July Festival, a benefit for the library, and has maneuvered it away from its original theme, a history of South Carolina women, transforming it into his own testosterone-laden vision, "Points of Patriotism." Haich's take-over attitude has alienated every woman in town, including good-natured Annie. But she finds it difficult to ignore him during the crowded patriotic festival - especially when he's shot dead before her eyes.

With a list of likely suspects that could fill Town Hall, Annie and Max are stumped when the police arrest an innocent young man who recently quarreled with the malevolent martinet. In the spring of '76, the determined Darlings take up the suspect's cause and forge a campaign to identify the party that dispatched Haich.

THE MERCY RULE by John Lescaort...Vowing to spend more time with his wife and kids, Dismas Hardy is hesitant to take on the case of Graham Russo, a could-have-been-great baseball player turned lawyer indicted for the murder of his father, Sal. Everyone close to the Russos knew Sal was dying, and that he needed morphine injections to ease his suffering. Graham freely admits to administering those injections, but insists he wasn't there the night of Sal's overdose and resultant death. Was it suicide, murder or mercy? With personal and professional tension mounting, Hardy finds himself face-to-face with a terrifying truth: if this was a murder, he might as well be the next person to die.

With his mastery of courtroom drama, and solid connection to the human element that makes his fiction so compelling, John Lescaort has created in **THE MERCY RULE** an

intelligent and richly satisfying thriller that will keep readers turning the pages far into the night.

FIELD OF THIRTEEN by Dick Francis...In this superbly crafted collection of short stories - many of them new and never before published - the settings range from a spring race meeting at Cheltenham, England,

where a middle-aged owner falls hopelessly in love with her jockey, to the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs, where demon drink and willing willpower take their toll. Dick Francis' fans have a wonderful treat in store; thirteen tightly knotted plots to marvel at, thirteen sets of classic characters to admire, thirteen signs in the tait to gasp over. In **FIELD OF THIRTEEN**, Dick Francis proves himself as much a master of the short

story as he is of the novel.

And, lastly, we have four new western novels to please the western buffs by authors, Jack Logan, J.R. Roberts, John Sharps, and Judd Cole. Come in and browse our shelves.



Expressing Anger Appropriately Requires Compassion

"I feel much better, Doc, since you helped me learn to express my anger," Warren told me. (All characters are fictitious.) "I don't get those headaches like I used to and my depression is a lot better. You were right: Expressing my anger does make me feel better."

This was wonderful news from Warren, who had suffered in silent rage most of his life. His wife called for an appointment, however, and I learned from her that all was not well at home. "Warren tells everybody what he thinks now," Samantha explained. "In some ways this is better than having him be so quiet, but he is hurting the people he loves."

From Samantha I learned the "rest of the story" about Warren's newfound ability to express himself. "He hollers at the kids now when they do anything wrong. They are all walking on eggshells. It's quite a change from the Warren who never said anything!" "And what about you, Samantha?" I asked. "How has Warren been treated."

"ing you?"

"We have always had a quiet relationship," Samantha answered softly. "We've never been people who raise our voices a lot. Now it seems Warren's voice is always raised, especially at me. When I protest, he tells me he's just doing what his counselor told him to do. You started this, Doctor. Now you've got to help us."

It was evident that Warren, while he may have helped his depression, was making his family miserable. His newfound outspokenness needed to be tempered with compassion.

At his next session I asked about Warren's relationship with his family. "Oh, it's OK, I guess," he ventu-

red. He knew his wife had been to see me. "Isn't that what my wife said?" he wanted to know.

"Confidentiality prevents me from answering that question, Warren," I replied, "but I think we need to look at the way you are expressing anger." "Just let it out!" he quickly responded. "Isn't that what I supposed to do?"

Giving a good counselor answer, I said, "Sometimes yes and sometimes no. You have to consider the feelings of your family. Take your children, for instance. What have they ever done to hurt you?"

"They make me a little crazy sometimes," Warren admitted, "but other than that I guess they don't really hurt me."

"And your wife," I questioned Warren. "What has she done? Is she a good mother and wife?" Warren admitted that she was good to him and his children.

"Then why are you dumping all your anger on them?" I wanted to know. "At whom are you really angry?"

Warren then listed some people in his life who were more deserving of his anger. "So should I tell my boss how mad I am at him?" he asked.

"Not unless you have another job waiting for you," I answered. "Talk with me or your wife about how angry you are. Vent those feelings and then they won't bother you so much."

"You mean I don't have to confront him to get rid of my anger?" Warren wanted to know.

"No, just vent it somewhere else," I replied, "without taking it out on your family. They don't deserve it."

of tractor or machinery accidents, parents should make sure children are physically big enough and mature enough for the task.

A child has to be big enough to reach the controls, and to react quickly in an emergency to stop the tractor.

Other suggestions are:

- Have a 'tractor operator only' policy. Do not allow riders on tractors or other machinery since that is an unnecessary risk.
- Youngsters should operate only tractors equipped with cabs having rollover protective structures (ROPS). The structures offer protection if the tractor turns over.
- Keep safety shields in place, especially with young operators, to give as much protection as possible.
- Educate children on safe tractor and machinery operation and encourage them to participate in tractor driving and safety programs such as those sponsored by 4-H and FFA.

Setting a good example is important in encouraging children to use safety precautions. Training is essential. Remember that children don't have much experience with equipment or in potentially dangerous situations, so they don't automatically know

the job, the hazards, and what to do in an emergency. Adopting safe work habits at an early age will result in lifelong benefits.

Farm News

Keep Farm
Children Out of
Harms Way



Kids growing up on a farm are probably subject to more life-or-limb threatening hazards than are their friends in cities or country subdivisions.

For one thing, the tools of farmwork are just outside the back door -- the tractors, chemicals, livestock, silos, power tools, and the pond. Parents in other occupations usually leave home to do their work and their families' are not endangered by hazards they face on the job. But farming parents must be aware of all homeplace hazards and try to reduce risks to their children's safety.

Children are more precious than any commodity we raise on the farm, but sometimes we can forget their safety when we're busy trying to get work done.

Farm Safety Week is observed each September. This is a good time to remind parents that, with fall harvest in full swing, the stress of long hours increases the need for, and the importance of, Farm Safety.

First, recognize the hazards inherent in farm equipment. Nearly four out of five agriculture accidents involving young people also

involve tractors and machinery. About 3/4 of these accidents occurred from tractor over turning or passengers falling off. Four out of five passenger victims are under 16 years old. Per hour driven, young people have four times more likelihood of an accident than do their parents when driving a tractor on public roads. To minimize risks

Farmers participating in the Agriculture Marketing Transition Act (AMTA) program will be able to obtain marketing assistance loans or LDPs for all of their production of wheat, corn, and other program crops without regard to how the commodity is harvested. Similarly, producers of non-contract commodities such as soybeans, designated minor oilseeds, and extra long staple cotton will be able to take advantage of these changes.

If you are a farmer who is a participant in the AMTA program or a producer of non-contract commodities in 1998 - we urge you to come to the local FSA office and obtain more details and to file for the LDP payments.

County Committee Education America is built on the legacy of a democratic agrarian society. President Thomas Jefferson, who was also a farmer, believed that the best government was that which was closest to the people. In that spirit, the US Department of Agriculture believes that the best decisions made about agriculture are made by farmers them-

selves. That's why USDA relies on farmer-elected county committees to make national programs work locally. Farm Service Agency county committees prioritize conservation projects, determine eligibility for loan programs, administer commodity and emergency programs; and supervise the operation of the local county office, including hiring people to deliver FSA's programs. They also partner with other groups on behalf of the Department to bring conservation and marketing opportunities to local farmers. It is their input that helps the Secretary of Agriculture be responsive to the needs of individual communities.

Important decisions that impact local agriculture are being made right here, by people who understand the issues faced by local farms and businesses. By bringing people in at the local level, it makes the Farm Service Agency county committee system the most effective voice for American agriculture.

Sworn statement, Sparks had his pants pulled down, fiddling himself as he passed her truck.

Danny Godfrey, Lincoln County superintendent of schools, said that Sparks remains on the job as grounds maintenance man for the schools following his investigation of the alleged incident.

Godfrey said that "inconsistencies" in the woman's complaint against Sparks and the school employee's denial of the allegation make him unsure that the incident took place.

Godfrey said that Sparks, whom he described as "an outstanding employee," and his wife both say that he picked her up in the school board vehicle at the time that Weesner said he was following her south on I-75.

"He says he didn't do it," couldn't have done it," Godfrey said. "I don't think the evidence supports the charge," he said.

Sparks is given a school board truck to drive because his job takes him all over the county. He commutes in the vehicle from Rockcastle County so that, if needed, he can get to where he is needed more quickly should he be called out for a maintenance emergency.

Sparks is scheduled to appear in Lincoln County Court Monday to answer the indecent exposure charge.

Venters gives McKinney death penalty

Confusion did not have a problem with the court considering the option. However, Montgomery said the state recommends the death penalty for crimes he called "the most brutal of crimes."

Venters said he did not take this decision lightly and carefully reviewed the evidence presented. "I think the proof is compelling, and I find myself believing that McKinney committed these terrible crimes," he said.

In another matter, Venters overruled a motion by the defense for a new trial.

"The defense raised several issues in asking for a new trial - two of which were reviewed in court yesterday.

In the request for a new trial, Stanziano maintained in his motion for a court denied funding assistance for a forensic pathologist who the defense contends would have assisted McKinney in the planning, preparation of the defense, including the cross-examination of the commonwealth's experts.

The denial of this assistance resulted in the defendant's being deprived of state and federal rights to due process, a fair trial, equal protection of the laws, and effective assistance of counsel," Stanziano wrote. Williams argued in court the defense would have handled things differ-

ently if he had known the contents of the victims' stomachs would have been in the trial.

He said the defense would have had its own experts do an independent analysis on the stomach contents. According to testimony, McKinney told police Brian had not eaten lunch that day.

However, experts testified at the trial that "green vegetable matter" and other substances were found in Brian's stomach. A member of the Bowles family testified that Brian ate meat loaf, scalloped potatoes, cream-style corn and green beans the night before the shootings and fire.

Based on this information and other evidence presented, the prosecution adopted a theory that Brian, Amy and Shirley were killed the night before the fire.

If the defense had had this information from the pathologist, Williams said the defense team would have had its own analysis done on the stomach contents.

Montgomery said the defense knew about the autopsy and "the facts were well known to everyone."

The defense also contended in its motion for a new trial that the commonwealth withheld certain information from the defense team relating to the testimony of one of the witnesses, Jamie Allen.

The defense alleges Allen knew information about Amy's injuries before this information was released by police. Williams said the defense was not able to interview certain people who knew Allen and knew how Allen may have come by this information.

Montgomery argued information that Amy was shot in the mouth was a "well-known fact," and anyone, including McKinney himself, could have shared this piece of information with others.




