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

Still no principal at RCHS

The final agreement between Cash, Hammond and the board has to be approved by the local board, which will meet in special session on Thursday night at the Rockcastle County


Brodhead man found dead at Copper Creek

Child Abuse...A Matter of Fact

Reporting Child Abuse
One should report any child under 18 years of age who you have reason to believe has suffered any form of child abuse or neglect. It is important to note that you need to only suspect or have reason to believe that abuse or neglect is occurring; physical proof or other forms of validation are not required from the reporter. It is the responsibility of the children service agency, through its investigation, to determine if abuse or neglect is in fact occurring.

A report of child abuse or neglect may be made by telephone, in person, or in writing to the children service agency in the county where the child lives or was abused or neglected. Reports may also be made by any law enforcement agency with jurisdiction in the county.

Street Skills available at local library

People across Kentucky wishing to see KET's award winning, safe-driving series for teens, *Street Skills*, need only visit their nearest local public library.

State Librarian James Nelson announced that the popular four-part series is now available on VHS tape for use by individuals and groups, thanks to a cooperative effort among the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives, local public libraries and KET.

The Emmy-nominated series, which premiered statewide in October 1997, is a fuel-injected, high-octane, turbo-charged series with a serious message: "Driving can be fun. Driving can be freedom. Driving can be fatal."

Hosted by Lexington native and Hollywood actor Josh Hopkins, the four half-hour program uses contemporary music, fast edis and MTV-style videography to get across the mechanics, physics and psychology of driving.

Traffic accidents are the leading cause of death for teenagers; they

claim twice as many lives as homicides and nearly three times as many suicides. Many crashes, often result of carelessness and poor judgement, could be prevented.

KET's goal for *Street Skills* is to make better drivers by changing their attitudes about driving. The series intends to make them more thoughtful drivers, more aware of dangers and more capable of avoiding mishaps.

The *Street Skills* project was funded in part by Anthem Foundation, Inc. Advertising support was provided by the Kentucky Department of Transportation Cabinet.

Chairperson Ruth Allen called the meeting into session at 8:00 p.m. and welcomed those in attendance.

The council discussed the policy regarding the color of letterman's jackets for the various student groups. 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Younger students do better than older ones

Compared to students in the rest of the nation, Rockcastle County students on the average are no poorer students, they are not better students, they are basically average.

The latest round of scores from the Kentucky Instructional Results Information System (KIRIS) are due to be released on Friday.

Those scores determine how local schools are progressing and who will receive monetary rewards from the state department of education.

But because local educators wanted a better gauge as to how local students do when compared to others nationwide, the local system gave the California Test of Basic Skills the past two years.

Results of that test were presented to the Rockcastle County Board of Education a couple of months ago and the county to show what has become a trend in Rockcastle County.

Younger students seem to always score higher than the older students. Last year students in the third, sixth, ninth and tenth grades were tested in the areas of Reading, Language, Math, Science, Social Studies and Spelling.

On the average, Roundstone third graders scored better than Mt. Vernon Brodhead students. However, ever, all three schools scored well over the national average of 50.

At Roundstone, the total scores from all subjects averaged 67.9 in 1997 and 66.5 in 1998.

At Mt. Vernon the total scores averaged 61.0 in 1997 and 63.9 in 1998. At Brodhead the total average score in 1997 was 66.1 and 59.0 in 1998.

Sixth grade students scored lower over the past two years with an average of 46.45 than any of the other students, however, ninth grade students scored only 46.50, also lower than the national average of 50.

During the past two years sixth grade students at RCMS have not reached the national average of 50 in any of the subject areas tested.

Ninth graders managed to get above the average mark in Reading and Spelling in 1997, but was unable to reach the 50 mark in any subject area in 1998.

Tenth grade students at RCHS scored an average of 50.4 over the past two years with their highest marks coming in Reading and Language.

They scored over the national average in every category except for Math and Reading in the past two years. In those subject areas they did not score above the average of 50 either year.

Sixth, ninth and tenth grade students all scored well below the average in Math the past two years, but at each grade level the scores were higher in 1998 than in 1997.

Students in the third grade scored over the national average in every subject matter in the past two years except for Brodhead students who fell just short in Spelling in 1998 with a score of 49.2.

When the results of the KIRIS tests are released on Friday, Rock-

castle scores are expected to be relatively good across the county.

The state is revamping the KIRIS test and it will no longer be given to students in the form it once was.

This will also be the last year for teachers reward money across the state. Any reward money will go directly to the school for instructional purposes.

Rockcastle County school's testing coordinator Claudina Cash said

Tuesday that the new test given by the state will have several different types of questions, such as multiple choice, open response, on-demand writing and writing portfolios.

The new test, the Commonwealth Accountability Testing System, (CATS), will be given in conjunction with the CTBS next Spring.

What is CTBS

WHAT IS IT? The Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills Version 5 Survey edition CTBS/5 measures students' mastery of basic skills in reading, mathematics and language arts (spelling, punctuation, grammar, capitalization, word usage and sentence structure). It is a norm-referenced test published by CTB/McGraw-Hill, one of the nation's oldest and largest test publishers.

WHO TOOK IT IN KENTUCKY? In the springs of 1997 and 1998, all Kentucky students (including those identified with learning disabilities and limited English proficiency) in grades 3 (end of primary), 6 and 9, took the test. In Rockcastle students in the 10th grade took the test as well.

HOW ARE THE SCORES REPORTED? The scores are expressed as Normal Curve Equivalents or NCEs. NCEs, which having many of the characteristics of percentiles, are the only scores which allow comparisons between tests, students, schools or different years of testing. The mean

NCE is 50. Any score above 50 is "above average," that is, it exceeds the mean score on the national sample of students used to "norm" the test. Scores below 50 are "below average."

WHEN WAS IT NORMED? The CTBS/5 was normed in 1996-97.

WHO GETS THE SCORES? Scores for individual students, schools and districts are provided to the districts. State and regional scores are distributed by the department of education.

HOW ARE THE SCORES USED? Parents can use the scores to see how their children compare to the average performance of students across the nation. Teachers can use the scores of individual students as a part of the process of determining a student's instructional needs. Schools can use the scores to strengthen curriculum that is, by changing what skills are emphasized. The 1998 scores do not count in Kentucky's school accountability system.





There is a Baby in Bethany
There is a baby in Bethany. This is the time of year for babies, so their timing was very good. This is a time for carolers who sing of joy and celebration. And the time of year for angels. Ah, yes, angels. They come to announce the birth of a King. After all it is that time of year.

The baby is small and cute as babies usually are. Ten little fingers and ten little toes. I have forgotten how small newborns are. After all it has been seventeen years since I spent much time around little ones. They are tiny, especially those toes. Perfect miniatures of adult toes, just without all the wear and tear.

No, the baby is not at my house, but I get to see him regularly. I am sort of an uncle, or let's face it, I'm old enough to be his grandfather.

This baby also has a grand friend-

ing a place in which to be born. A lot of the inns and relative's houses had no room for a him or his momma. They did find a place, though, a place in Bethany.

Sunday School stories still linger in my mind about Bethany. That great story about Jesus teaching Mary and Martha. The even greater story about Jesus raising Lazarus, their brother, after he had been dead for days. Bethany is a famous place.

There is another Bethany, though, and this is where Momma and baby Caleb found a place. This Bethany is not a city but a house. This house has held Marys, Marthas and many of their sisters who have been abused. It is a place where a woman can go when there is no other place to run.

The inn is full at Bethany House these days. (Bethany House will soon be enlarged, because, unfortunately,

domestic violence is still a major problem.) The victims need somewhere to go. There is a full house with residents sharing one kitchen and two bathrooms. Not a lot of extra space, but there is always room for a baby and his momma.

Momma was alone and concerned. No help seemed to be forthcoming from any quarter. The father was definitely not interested in the child, and others were busy with their own lives. At first she cried because she would be bringing her baby home to a "shelter" and not a real home. Later she grew more comfortable with the idea of bringing a baby to Bethany House.

Upward of fifteen aunts watch the baby's every move and vie to hold

him. Only one uncle thus far (me!), so I can get almost unlimited holding time. There is a lot of support in Bethany for a new momma. Experienced moms are all around for advice and counsel. Momma is deciding it may be an OK place to bring a baby.

Bringing a new baby into the world almost always brings anticipation and joy. A new baby brings total strangers closer, sharing with each other that common bond of concern for the young one. One resident stayed with Momma in the labor room until they chased her away. What a wonderful gift!

A new baby means hope. There is always hope for a new generation. At Bethany this hope is welcomed as an antidote to the despair that many of the residents feel. Even in the midst of abuse, a child is born, a son is given. And his name shall be called... Caleb.

Whether in Bethlehem or Bethany, join us in welcoming a new birth. Both babies deserve extra special care.

Birthdays, anniversaries, and holidays - these and other annual reminders of a loved one's death can be challenging, particularly during the first few years. Everywhere you turn, sights and sounds and smells trigger memories. In addition to fond remembrances, you may feel depressed or encounter waves of terrible loneliness. Be gentle, accepting, and kind to yourself. In years to come you will once again be able to enter wholeheartedly into these times of

celebration. When a loved one has recently died, you are likely to greet family celebrations and special events with mixed feelings. Remember to honor your personal sense of how best to handle these occasions. Talking with a trusted family member or friend can help you clarify your thoughts and feelings. While holidays, birthdays and anniversaries are difficult times for those grieving a close and recent death, don't create problems for

yourself by expecting the worst. Simply be aware that certain circumstances may trigger sorrow and other painful feelings. Be prepared, stay flexible, and trust your ability to handle whatever arises. Chances are everything will go relatively smoothly. It usually helps to plan ahead. As a general rule, even early in your bereavement, you'll benefit from joining family and friends on days of special celebration. Of course, there are expectations, and only you can know what is best in your particular circumstances.

If you may wish to decline some holiday invitations or perhaps stay at an event for a briefer than normal period. Because of your grief, your energy level is likely to be lower than normal. So pace yourself accordingly, and take advantage of opportunities for a little extra rest. Avoid staying overly busy. Give yourself some space so that you can

more easily respond to the wisdom of your body, mind and spirit. Ignoring your grief won't make it go away. Allow your feelings to be whatever they are, and remember that it's good to reach out and share your thoughts and emotions with those who understand. Don't be surprised if your sadness alternates with times of laughter and happy memories. This too is normal and healthy.

Healing doesn't mean forgetting. As the years go by your pain will soften while the fond memories of your loved one continue to comfort you and cheer you on. In that sense you will take the best of the past into the future with you. The healing that comes as you go through your grief brings learning, growth and renewal, but the memories of your loved one will always live in your heart. Winter Beef Feeding Workshop

How can a cow starve to death on a full feed of hay? No, it is not the old joke "because she can't get a square meal when eating round bales of hay". What sounds like a joke can actually happen with poor quality hay. A large percentage of first cutting hay this year was delayed by rain. Most fescue hay was cut in late June or early July. Different production stages in a beef cows life determine her nutritional needs. A dry cow in the fall actually has the lowest nutrient needs. Her nutrient needs start to increase 30 - 60 days before calving. At calving, and for the next 4 months, the nutrient needs are at their highest. This is the point that we see the greatest stress and weight loss. However, if we plan ahead we can help the cow be prepared for this additional stress.

On Thursday, December 3, at 7:00 p.m. in the Rockcastle County High School Vocational/Agriculture Department, a Hay Testing, Condition Scoring and Ration Balancing Workshop will be conducted. The Department of Agriculture mobile hay testing van will be running hay samples. University of Kentucky Extension Personnel will be showing how to condition score beef cows and plan a winter feeding program with the feeds farmers have produced. Call 256-2403 if you have questions on hay testing.

Also, beginning December 4, the Rockcastle County Health Dept., Dabney Feed Supply, Adams Feed Supply, and the Extension Service will offer free rat bait. A limit of 5 bags per household applies while supplies last. Come by the Extension Office or one of the feed supply dealers to pick up your bait. We ask that you observe the limits so that everyone will receive what they need.
