City council hears numerous complaints

Takes no action on privilege licenses, again

By: Richard Anderkin The Mt. Vernon City Council and Mayor Karen King heard numerous complaints during their regular monthly meeting on Monday night. Several of the complaints were from their own employees and one was from a Mt. Vernon resident who has had a flooding problem at her Newcomb Street home for five years. Water superintendent Dennis McClure told the council that he did

Wouldn't it be great to throw out those heavy boxes and bottles of laundry deer gent and crepitace that the state of the s Cleaning instructions are required Cleaning instructions are required on most textile clothing. They are not required on clothing made primarily of suede or leather, footwear, items for the head and hands - stuch as hats and gloves - or on household items like sheets and towels. However, many manufacturers of these items manufacturers of these items provide care information voluntarily.

* Pre-treat stains.

* Sort by color. Wash whites separately; light and medium colors together; and brights and darks by themselves. a piece, can last for thousands of loads - and save customers hundreds of dollars in detergent costs.

Before you toss out your tried and true detergents, consider this: Tests show that these gadgets do little more than clean out your wallet. At best, these products are only slightly better than washing clothes in hot water alone, and not as effective as washing them, with launder.

* Don't overload your washer. Cloths need room to move and enough water to carry away the soil. * Follow product instructions. Use

reoliow product instructions. Use the recommended amount of detergent and other laundry products, and follow the recommended procedures. Some products are added to the water before the clothes: others, like liquid fabric softener, are added at the start of the rinse cycle. SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action. Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of shool bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education:

Kentucky Department of Education:

- entucky Department of Education:

 1. Arrive at bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.

 2. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage sefety measures for pupils as they walt for the bus and walk home from the bus.

 3. Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.

 4. Take a seast upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.

 5. The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating.

- Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
- 7. Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.

- 7. Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
 8. Obey the rules posted on each bus.
 9. Do not block aisles in any way.
 10. Khives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus.
 11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a complete stop.
 12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
 13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
 14. Ride only our assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal.  17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's intructions.

 18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.

 19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times:

- - a. Use of profane/foul language
 b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus
 c. Fighting on the bus
 d. Destruction of bus property

d. Destruction of bus property
e. Deflance of driver's authority
f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.
20. <u>Disciplinary Action</u>: Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to
the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall
be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil
and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such
disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall
be furnished to the parents and the superdisorderity. be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.
