Bowling Ridge man iailed after shooting

A Bowling Ridge man is still behind bars this week, after a shoot-ing incident at his home on Saturday

ing incident at his home on Saturday night.

According to police, Benjamin Franklin Jones, 40, 40 Bowling Ridge, apparently shot Bobby Lee McClure, 44, of Castle Village Apartments in Brodhead around 7 pm., during argument between the two men.

McClure was taken to the Rockeastle Hospital and flown by helicopter to the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

According to police, Jones shot McClure twice, once in the righthand and once in the left forearm.

Jones is being held under a S20,000 cash bond and with three other stipulations.

Jones cannot have any firearms in his possession, have no contact with McClure and break no laws, if he is released no bond. His next court appearance is September 20.

State finally allows local jail to open

Nearly a year behind schedule

Rockeastle County Jailer James
Miller will finally get to hang out a

Nearly a year behind schedule,
the county's lock-up will be home to
Rockeastle County prisoners for the
first time since the fiscal court voted
to close the facility last July in order
to speed up the renovation project.
Rockeastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis announced Tuesday, during the Fiscal Court meet-

tive Buzz Carloftis announced Tues-day, during the Fiscal Court meet-ing, that the state department of cor-rections had finally given their ap-proval for the jail to re-open.

The court had hoped the jail would

pass its first inspection on May 11, but that did not take place and the jail failed another inspection later in the

The reopening of the jail is ex-

The reopening of the jail is expected to greatly improve the county's financial situation, which has been that he to elosing of the jail and the renovation project itself.

The new jail has 66 beds, compared to 30 in the old jail, and Miller aid Wednesday the state has promised to keep the jail full of state prisenes, which will bring in about \$27 per day for each prisoners.

"We will try to keep about \$0 state prisoners at all times," Miller said.

If the jailer is successful in keep-ing that many prisoners, the county
