## Rockcastle County **Detention Center** open for business

The new Rockeastle County Jail
has been open now for about two
weeks and so far, things have gone
extremely smooth, according to Jailer James Miller

James Miller.

The new jail is much different than the old jail, mainly because of the different security measures in place. But there is also other changes from the old days at the old jail,

beginning with a name change.

The new jail is the Rockcastle
County Detention Center.

County Detention Center.
And, immates must wear black
and white uniforms at all times.
They are allowed no personal
items in the jail and no money.
Inmates are allowed to bring only
five white t-shirts, five white pairs of
socks, and five white pairs of underwear.

wear.

Miller said that because the state requires that air conditioners run all the time in the jail, each inparte is allowed to bring one pair of gray or white sweat suit to wear under their uniforms so they can stay warm.

Prisoners on work release are not required to wear the uniforms.
Toiletry items, food, drinks, to-bacco products and other items are available at the detention center's commissary, but inmates must present a money order to the commissary which is logged into a computer.

Inmates are allowed to spend the money they have logged for whatever reason they desire and when they leave the jail, if they have money left in their account, a check is issued

cameras inside and outside the de-tention center and all visitors and inmates must pass through a locked inmates must pass through a locked gate before gaining entrance to the just through another locked door.

The new detention center is also complete with a drunk tank, maximum security area and indoor and outdoor recreation area.





Kentucky had the highest adult smoking rate in the nation in 1997 at 30.8 percent, up from 27.8 percent in 1995. Instead of the number of smokers decreasing, that number is increasing in Kentucky.

Kentucky also leads the nation in the youth smoking rate. According to the CDC figures 47 percent of students in grades sine through twelve reported that they had smoked in the previous month. That is almost half

of the entire high school population

It is illegal to sell tobacco products to a minor in Kentucky, but young people under 18 continue to have access to cigarettes, dip, etc. Either parents are supplying their children with tobacco or there are still some stores that ignore the law Or both.

Almost everyone, with the possible exception of the tobacco companies, agrees that smoking is unhealthy. Even some burley growers who depend on the income from tobacco do notallow their children to smoke. The evidence keeps mountained the control of the control

Anti-smoking campaigns have long been seen as a political impossibility in Kentucky where two-thirds of the farms grow tobacco. In 1996 the state produced 27 percent of the tobacco in the United States, second only to North Carolina

But "the times they are a-chang-ing." Recently Kentucky tobacco right sections (sections) recommended as plan to use state cigarette settlement money to state cigarette settlement money to staken by the Burley Tobacco Growner Scoperative board. The resolution supports "a comprehensive plan focused on youth prevention and cossistion of lobacco use," according to a statement released by the board. The time is right for tobacco growers and health groups to join forces to stop youth smoking.

Not everyone thinks this is a good idea, but in states where the tax has been raised and anti-smoking campaigns have been instituted, smoking rates have declined. Kentucky's 3-cent tax per pack is the second lower in the nation. By comparison Florida leaves a 34-cent tax and Oregon a 68-cent tax.



Southern Madison Water District received a notice of violation for failing to submit the adequate number of Bacteriological samples, only five of the required ten samples were submitted for the mouth of May 1998. Any potential adverse health effects to any segments of the population could not be determined due to failure to comply with monitoring requirements. To reduce the possibility of future monitoring violations, we have notified our laboratory to unify us if they do not receive the correct amount of samples each month. We had no detects on any bacteriological samples.
