Forest fires out in Rockcastle; still burning throughout state

For the first time in weeks no fires were burning in the Rockcastle County woods on Wednesday, after a 185 acre blaze at Sand Hill was contained Tuesday afternoon.

Local Forest Ranger Marvin Stone said that his crews have lought St firest that have destroyed thousands of acres since July 14.

The largest fire of the season thus far was in the Wolf Creek. New Hope area where crews battled a blaze for days that consumbed 363 acres before being contained.

Rockcastle County is also under a 24 hour open burning ban because of the continued dry weather and Stone warned residents that investigators are in the area, trying to locate people who are intentionally setting the fires.

"Ninety percent of the fires we

"Ninety percent of the fires we have had in this county have been intentionally set," Stone said.

The suppression cost of the fires will climb anto the thousands and thousands of dollars not to mention the damage done to the forest land in the county. Stone said.

An eleven member Forestry Camp Crew has been brought in the county on at least ten different occasions and on Monday, the forestry service brought a plane in for drop on a fire at Sand Hill.

In order for the local burping ban to be lifted, Stone estimates that the county needs must be to make the county needs must be to make the county needs may be out in Rockeaste County, but they continue to burn in eastern Kennucky.

Since January I, there have be 2,186 fires, which have burned 83, ve burned 83 421 acres, making 1999 the worst fire season in the 90s in Kentucky.

Hundreds of firefighters w been fighting fires for the past sev eral days and in some areas for weeks, are beginning to tire, as well as becoming frustrated, according to a release from the state's Natural Resource and Environmental Protection Cabinet.

According to the release, many of the fires that are brought under control by firefighers have been reset by arsonsists or by homeowners setting backfire.
The Kentucky Division of Foresty, is asking citizens to abide by the outdoor hurning bans that are in, the county and also be on the looks of the or suspicious individuals in or around fires.

"We need the public's help in putting a stop to this crisis," said Mark Matuscewski, Director of the Kentucky Division of Forestry.

"We have investigators in certain areas to help with the arson problems and prosecutions are likely," he said Persons seeing anyone suspicious in or around the fires in your area, should call the Target Arson Hotline at 1800-27-Arson, or the Kentucky Division of Forestry at 1-800-866-0555. There is a \$1,000 reward for information leading, to an arrest

Arson is a felony and is punish-able by fines of \$1,000 to \$10,000 and up to five years in prison

Mayor says she will seek net profits tax

Petitions in circulation opposing tax

An occupational tax that the city of Mt. Vernon is trying to place on local worker's has apparently caused an uproar among some local people. Several petitions against the 1.5 percent tax are being circulated throughout the city and will be presented to the council at their next regular monthly meeting on December 6.

At least one of the petitions circulation also takes a swipe at the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court's in-surance tax as well as the cities tax

She said she had received some complaints about the tax being placed on pays olled employees and she was going in sak the council to pass a net profits tax of 1.5 percent to go along with the occurational tax.

The first reading of the occupa-tional tax did not include the nets profit tax. The Mayor said Tuesday that she wasn't sure how she would go about including the net profits tax, whether she could amend the occu-pational tax ordinance or whether the ouncil would have to pass another

The second reading of the occu national tax is scheduled for the next

pational tax is scheduled for the next council meeting on December 6. If the council is successful in implementing both the occupational tax and the net profits tax, the city will realize estimated revenues of \$500,000 annually.

Funeral services were held Mon-day for a local man who shothimself last week at his Red Hill home. Roger Wayne Rector, 42, of Hwy. 1955, Livingston died Thursday at the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

According to Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Sonya Prewitt, Rec-tor shot himself after Deputy Doug Thomas went to his home on Wednesday night to serve an arrest warrant

Rector, who was indicted in Oc-tober, accused of raping a female family member less than 16-years-old, apparently told Thomas that he needed to change clothes before going to jail.

Prewit said that Rector went into a bedroom, shut the door and shot himself in the head with a handgun.

Rector wa's taken to the Rockeastle Hospital and then transferred to U. K Hospital where he died.

"The data indicates many adults smokers want to quit, but they do not have the resources to do so," said Todd Warnick, tobacce control manager for the Department for Public Health. "Of particular interess are the data showing young adults interest are the data showing young adults interest in Kentucky more likely to attempt quiting." Smoking cessation programs should be accessible to all adults who want to quit."

Stephanie Keelin, the tobacco prevention coordinator at the Green River District Health Department in Owensboro, said smoking cessation programs have become increasingly a ware appende become increasingly a ware

of the health hazards of toba The health department works with several other local groups in offering

the smoking cessation classes. "By offering reputable smoking cessation classes, such as the Cooper-Clayton Method to Stop Smoking, we are providing the education and support for people who want to quit, but don't know how to go about

it," Keelin said. "With our current program offered in the Daviess County community we've experi-enced a phenomenal 46 percent suc-cess rate based on questionnaires given at the end of the classes."

Here are some tips from the Cen-ters for Disease Control and Preven-

1. Don't smoke any number or any kind of cigarette. Smoking ever a few cigarettes a day can hurt your health. If you to try to smoke fewer cigarettes, but do not stopcompletely, soon you'll be smoking the same amount acids.

2. Write down why you want to

Smokers who live after a heart attack are the most likely to quit for good. They're yery motivated. Find a reason for cutting the force you have no to have the

3. Know that it will take effort to quit smoking. Nicotine is liabit forming. Half of the battle in quitting is knowing you need to quit. This knowledge will help you be more able to deal with the symptoms of withdrawa that can occur, such as had mood and really wanting to shoke. There are many ways smokers quit, includ-ing using nicotine replacement proding using nicotine replacement prod-ucts (gum and patches), but there is no easy way. Nearly all shockers have some feelings of nicotine withdrawal when they try to quit. Give yourself a month to get over these feelings. Take quitting one day at a time, even one minute at a time—whatever you need for sucreed."



Forest or Wildland Fire
What is a Wildland Fire? There three classes of wildland fires.

1. A surface fire is the most com A surface fire is the most common type and burns along the floor of a forest, moving slowing and killing or damaging trees.
 A ground fire is usually started by lightning and burns on or below the forest floor.

3. Crown fire spreads rapidly by wind and moves quickly by jumping along the tops of trees. Wildhard fires are usually signaled by dense smoke that fills the area for miles around. Danger zones include all wooded, brush, and grassy areas - especially those in Kansas, Mississippi, Louisan, Georgia, Florida, the Carolinas, Tennessee, California, Massichusetts and the national forest of the western United States.

areas are the forest areas and towns of Southeastern Kentucky and that means us!

Every effort will be made to keep parents and concerned citizens informed as to school closings, early dismissals and possibly a delay plan.

The number one concern is the safety of students. After an extensive evaluation of road conditions in the county, taking into consideration all roads, a decision will be made in regard to closing school.

School closings will be announced on radio stations and 3 television stations. They are as follows: Radio - WRVK (AM 1460), WVLK (FM 93), WBUL (FM 8.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WRSL (FM 96.3), WLKT (FM 104.5) WKQQ (FM 100.1). Television - WKYT (Channel 27), WLEX (Channel 18), WTVQ (Channel 36), If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a decision by 6 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m. This will be conducted the same for the delay plan, if it is concluded the delay plan would be the appropriate plan of action.

If the delay plan is used, breakfast will be served upon the arrival of students at school.

Early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on WRVK. Roads will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. If the need for early dismissal does occur, parents should make arrangements to meet children as they arrive early

Parents and students should not call any radio or television station to inquire about school closings. This could delay the information distribution to the necessary channel by tying up phone lines.

Rockcastle County School System Delay Plan

Occasionally, there are mornings when an additional hour is needed to check bus routes and temperatures/weather conditions sometimes can change between 6 a.m. and 7 a.m. As a result, the Rockcastle County School System will consider a one hour delay in school opening due to weather conditions.

If a one-hour delay is warranted, the delay will be announced by the following radio stations: WRVK (AM 1460), WVLK (FM 93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WRSL (FM 96.3), WLKT (FM 04.5), WKQQ (FM 100.1) and the following television stations: WLEX (Channel 18), WKYT (Channel 27), WTVQ (Channel 36), at 6 a.m. or as soon as possible.
