

Tobacco settlement checks currently being mailed

The Kentucky Tobacco Settlement Trust Corporation, chaired by Governor Paul Patton, announced today that the trustee of the National Tobacco Growers Settlement Trust Segam mailing: approximately 252,000 checks to over 167,000 kentuckians. The Trust was established earlier this year by tobacco state political teadership and the four largest cigarette-manufacturers, to offset income loss by tobacco quota holders and farmers as demand for tobacco drops in the wake of last year's \$246 billion settlement between the cigarette industry and 46 tween the cigarette industry and 46

state attorneys general.

Kentucky's checks account for 43.4 percent of the total funds being

distributed by the Chase Manhattan Bank, the trustee, throughout the 14 states that are party to the Trust. Kentucky burley producers will re-ceive \$108,882,042.73 of the \$250 million being distributed by the Trust. The funds set aside for Kentucky during the first year of the 12-year program totaled \$113,177,543.34 after administrative expenses of \$603,839.42 paid to Chase Manhat-tan and \$255.076 naid in federal sous, 839.42 paid to Chage Mannat-tan and \$255,076 paid in federal income tax were deducted. David Tapp
David Tapp announced today his intent to seek election as Commonwealth's Attorney for the 28th Judicial Circuit which is comprised of Rockeaste, Lincoln and Pulastic counties. In his first bid for elected office, Tapp emphasized suguifications: "Since college, I've worked only in the criminal justice system—both in law enforcementand the courts. If the people want a prosecutor, that's me."

Tapp has prior experience as a

candidate. But if they want a prose-cutor, that 'sm."

Tapp has prior experience as a state cour felony procecutor and was responsible for several significant convictions, particularly involving defendants charged with sexual of-fenses, crimes of violence and drug offenses. In 1994. Tapp secured the conviction and 20 year sentence of a day care worker on five molestation charges. Tapp also represented the Commonwealth in the resulting ap-peal and won state supreme court approval for children to testify by closed circuit television rather han in the courtroom itself. In 1995, Tapp prosecuted a man for the rape of an eight year old girl in Nancy, and ob-tained a 40 year sentence. A 1995 Rockcastle County child pomogra-phy case prosecuted by Tappresulted





Crop Disaster Program (CDP)
The Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2000, and the Omnibus priations Act, 2000, and the Omnibus Act, Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2000, included a total of \$1.386 billion for the Crop Disaster Proposition (CDP), CDP assistance is for farmers who suffered losses to 1999 crops due to natural disasters. Farmers are eligible for compensation for 1999 crop losses directly attributed to adverse weather and related conditions. related conditions.

Producers who suffered greater than a 35% loss on insured/noninsured crops such as tobacco and com and the non insurable crops such as

commercial use are eligible to re ceive payment.

Payments to farmers will be pro-rated for all applications are reviewed in order to stay with the program's re-quirements and budget.

This payment, which many may consider a windfall, actually comes on the heels of a 2 year quota cut of 30 percent. 




