Indictments returned

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down three indictments on Friday, all against local residents. Tonya Leann Denny, 25, of Rt. 1, Brodhead was indicted on three counts, in connection with a break-in at the home of Mark Loudermilk on November 21.

Denny is accused of taking jewelry and mail that was owned by Loudermilk after she allegedly entered his residence.

Marvin Cummings, 36, of Hwy. 2549, Mt. Vernon, was indicted on a count of stalking and one count of first degree wanton endangerment.

Cummings is accused of stalking Regina Lay, at her Mt. Vernon office and then entering the office, where he grabbed her arm, on October 26.

Christopher Sean Mullins, 24, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on one count of second degree escape.

He is accused of running off from Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan on October 27, while Doan was trying to serve papers on him.

No word from state on new landfill

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloffis who is vehemently opposed to a proposed landfill in the Little Clear Creek section of the county, said Wednesday that the state had made no decision on the matter.

Last week the Rockcastle Fiscal Court passed a resolution opposing the landfill, which would be on the property of David McFarland near the Rockcastle-Madison County line.

Police looking into burning of cross

Kentucky State Police Detective Mike Hopkins, a member of the Special Hate Crimes Unit, is investigating a cross burning incident, which took place in the county in late December.

Hopkins confirmed that the case involves Denver O'Neil, a resident, who lives on Oscar Isaacs Road in northern Rockcastle County.

Hopkins said that a cross was burned in O'Neil's yard sometime around Christmas and that someone fired shots at the same time.

"I think the shots were just fired to get Mr. O'Neil's attention so he would see the cross burning, because it went up pretty quick," he said.

Hopkins said he had few leads in the case, but that his investigation was continuing.

O'Neil is currently involved in a lawsuit with the county and several of his neighbors over the legal right-of-way on Oscar Isaacs Road.

Tech Center will benefit entire county

Rockcastle's new technology center will open in February, according to Rockcastle County Development Board Executive Director Bige Towery.

The technology center is located in the former Circuit Courtroom on the third floor of the old Rockcastle County Courthouse.

At the direction of the Development Board, the courtroom has been completely renovated for the Tech Center, which will feature video conferencing, free public access to computers and desktop conferencing.

The tech center in the courthouse is part of the CenterNet Regional Telecommunications Network, which is administered through the Center for Rural Development in Somerset.

CenterNet, a regional network, is bringing vast new telecommunications capabilities to Rockcastle and 39 other counties in Southern and Eastern Kentucky.

The network features both Internet services and high-quality video conferencing which allows individuals to communicate across long distances with both video and audio content.

CenterNet has been made possible by a \$7 million grant from the Small Business Administration. The Small Business Administration and the Center for Rural Development espouse technology to be used as a business recruitment and workforce development tool.

Locally, the development board has used donations from the Bank of Mt. Vernon, Citizen's Bank, Rockcastle Hospital, Rockcastle County Schools, The City of Mt. Vernon, the Rockcastle Industrial Development Authority, to raise the \$73,699 it took to do the work in the old courtroom.

"It will take time to identify local needs and the Center's use and ultimate success depend upon the initiative taken by the community," Towery said.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court has reached an agreement with the Rockcastle County school system, who will play a large role at the Tech Center.

"Linking the Center with the 21st Century Community Learning Center at the Rockcastle County school system will benefit the center greatly,"

Towery said. "This alliance should assist us with the staffing of the Center which has been a concern and it will also provide technical and professional expertise to make this operation successful," Towery said.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond said he was very pleased with the agreement between the school system and the board of the Tech Center.

"Through Century 21st we will be able to place our community education coordinator at the Center on a full-time basis," he said.

Still No Salt

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloffis said this week that the county road department still had received no salt for county roads.

Carloffis said that manufacturers have told him that because of the demand, not to expect any the rest of the winter.

That is not good news for the Rockcastle County school system which has already had to dismiss school ten days this winter because of sick roads.

The last day missed was Friday, when school officials had to call it off because of black ice.

As it stands right now, students would be dismissed for summer break on May 31.

Spring Break is April 9-13.

Clarification

A Mt. Vernon man pled guilty recently in Rockcastle District Court to two counts of criminal littering.

According to court records, Quentin Barnett, 82, was caught twice on video camera throwing trash from his car.

Barnett was sentenced to 60 days in jail and given a \$1,000 fine but, because of his age, the fine and jail time was suspended and he was placed on probation for two years.

The county has cameras at illegal dumpsites in the county and Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carloffis says the county will prosecute anyone caught illegal dumping.

Agreement between RAAP, county reached

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has reached an agreement with the Rockcastle County Adoption Agency for Pets.

The two had been negotiating a contract for the past several months, but at last week's fiscal court meeting the magistrates and Judge finalized an offer to RAAP, who accepted it. The county has agreed to provide

part of the labor for the construction of RAAP's new animal shelter on Old Sigmon Road in the Roundstone section of the county.

The county is currently involved in a lawsuit with the Trixie Foundation, a group that sued the county and 59 others in the state last year.

In their suit, the Trixie Foundation claimed that the county was not taking care of the stray animal population correctly.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carloffis said that last week's action by the court will help the county to do a better job of taking care of stray animals and it will also help RAAP, who has been working for the past three years trying to build an animal shelter.

The county has agreed to provide partial labor and equipment for the construction of the facility and continuous labor for maintenance of the grounds, once the project is completed.

The maintenance labor would be provided by work release prisoners from the Rockcastle County jail.

The county also agreed to maintain the road to the facility and give \$500 per month to RAAP to help with monthly operating expenses once the project is completed.

Last week's action also enabled the county and RAAP to apply for a \$60,000 grant from the state of Kentucky through the Animal Control Advisory Board.

Carloffis said he did not know if last week's action would help the county in their lawsuit, but he said that either way, it was something the entire county could benefit from.

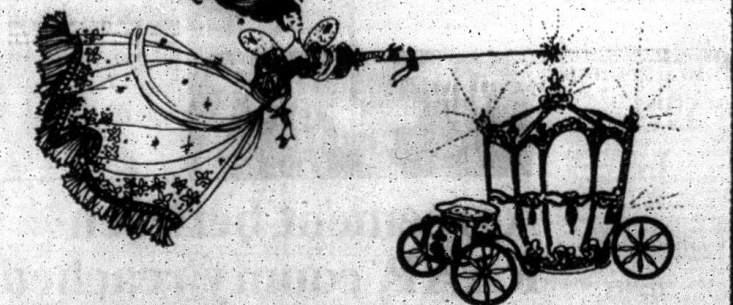

Agricultural News

County Committee (COC) Election

The 2001 County committee held the first monthly COC meeting of the year on January 4th. The members voted and elected officers as follows: Darrell Wayne Whitaker, Chairman; Joe C. Bullen, Vice Chairman; Clarence Raymond Brown, member. The committee meets the first Thursday of each month at 8:00 a.m. in the Rockcastle County FSA Office, Hwy. 150 and Freedson Street Road and is open to the public.

Marketing Cards

Producers who have sold the current year's crop of tobacco are encouraged to return their marketing card to the FSA as soon as possible. Marketing cards are then compared to sales records for accuracy. Failure to return marketing cards promptly delay correct information for the 2001 data.

2001 Burley Tobacco Quotas

Producers have been questioning our office concerning the 2001 burley tobacco quotas. The Secretary of Agriculture has until February 1st to announce the quota. Therefore, any "quotas" you now hear of the 2001 quota will be increased 30% is only hear say. Remember: February 1st is the date! Notice to producers of the 2001 quotas will be mailed after the announcement.

Quota Referendum

Questions have been asked about the upcoming vote on the continuation of the quotas. To date we do not have the final date for voting, however this is the year to vote on the program. Watch for upcoming details.

Dairy Market Loss (DML/ALH) Payments

Rockcastle FSA Office recently

issued over \$58,000 in DML/ALH payments. These payments were for to help dairy farmers cope with the low milk prices, which have declined for three consecutive years, and are now at the lowest level since 1991.

Payment Eligibility and Limitations

A limitation on the total annual payments that a "person" may receive under agriculture programs has been in effect since enactment of the Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996, modified the provisions that define a "person" and the rules for payment limitation and payment eligibility.

The basic regulations apply to payments and benefits made under a variety of programs, including produc-

tion flexibility contract payments, loan deficiency payments, and the Conservation Reserve Program payments.

The status of an individual or entity on April 1st of the applicable program year or fiscal year is the basis for determining the number of persons for payment limitation purposes.

Conservation District Cost Share announced

The Rockcastle County Conservation District will be accepting requests for cost share funding under the Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program beginning February 1, 2001 and extending through February 28, 2001. The Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program was created to assist agriculture operators protect the soil and water resources in Kentucky. The program was created in 1994 and received its first appropriation of \$650,000 from the Kentucky Department of Agriculture. Over the past six years the program has now grown to an annual appropriation of \$11,150,000 coming from general fund appropriations from the General Assembly, dollars transferred from the Kentucky Department of Agriculture and now from Phase 1 tobacco settlement agreement funds. With the passage of the biennial bud-

get to be eligible for payments and benefits under some programs, a producer must be considered "actively engaged in farming." Generally, in order to be considered "actively engaged in farming," the producer must provide significant contributions to the farming operation which are commensurate to the claimed share of the farming operation and at risk.

get by the 2000 General Assembly and HB 611, an appropriation of \$18,000,000 over the biennium was direct funding to the cost share program by the General Assembly. These additional funds will supplement the existing cost share program, which provides landowners with technical and financial assistance to address environmental concerns associated with agriculture production.

Sign-ups for the 2001 program year will include some additional changes to the existing program. A new practice will be added, KWPS - Closure of Agriculture Waste Impoundments, and additional components to existing practices will be added which include travel lanes, trails and waterways (KWPA). Changes will be made to the number of paddocks required as a minimum in rotational grazing systems (KSW3)

and likewise changing the cost share rate for this practice from 65 percent to 75 percent. Funding for practices will be approved by the Soil and Water Conservation Commission of the Kentucky Division of Conservation located in Frankfort as funds are available. Cost share rates are a maximum of 75 percent of the actual cost not to exceed \$7,500 for agronomic practices and \$20,000 for animal waste concerns.

Jackson Energy offers scholarship, trip to area students

Jackson Energy is just one of several area groups and companies to award scholarships. Applications for the co-op scholarship contest will be accepted beginning January 1, 2001.

Since the scholarship program began in 1992, over \$40,000 has been awarded to area students. "We want to improve the quality of life in the region we serve," said President & CEO Don Schaefer, "and helping students continue their education is an investment in the student and the region."

Each year, Jackson Energy awards four \$1,000 scholarships to students from the co-op's service territory. The scholarship contest is open to high school seniors and college students, as long as the student is not over 21 years of age. The student, the parent or the guardian must be a member of the cooperative.

Jackson Energy will also introduce a new program for area high school students this year, the Washington Youth Tour. Students who are members of the co-op are eligible for the program, which includes a week-long trip to Washington, D.C. The Youth Tour is part of a nationwide program administered by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA).

Eight students in the Jackson Energy service territory will be selected to attend a Frankfort Youth Tour in April, and four of those students will be chosen to participate in the Washington Youth Tour in June.

The Washington tour will be an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. and the surrounding area. Students will learn about the federal government, as well as visit with legislators and other officials during the trip.

The deadline for entries for both the scholarship and youth tour programs is March 1.

The Rockcastle Rockets put together two of their most impressive wins this last week. Rockcastle traveled to Madison Southern Tuesday night for the 76-55 win and hosted a very young Williamsburg team last Friday night for the 76-52 blowout.

Sophomore Aaron Anderkin was the leading scorer in both games, but on Tuesday night he could not be denied as he racked up 29 points against the Eagles.

Anderkin hit seven threes and added three buckets and two free throws for good measure.

The Rockets did not stop in the second, going on a 18-2 run before the Yellow Jackets could find the basket. Anderkin hit two threes for the Rockets in the second as Rockcastle was just too much, going into the locker room at halftime up 35-12.

By the end of the third quarter, nine Rockcastle players had seen scoring action with the Rockets outscoring Williamsburg 20-8 to end the third up 55-20.

Much of the fourth quarter belonged to the starting JV players, with Austin Miller and Chris Settles each adding a three for the 70-32 Rockcastle win.

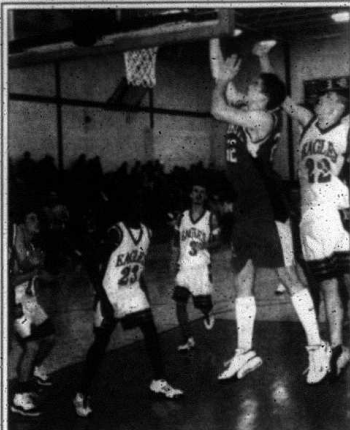

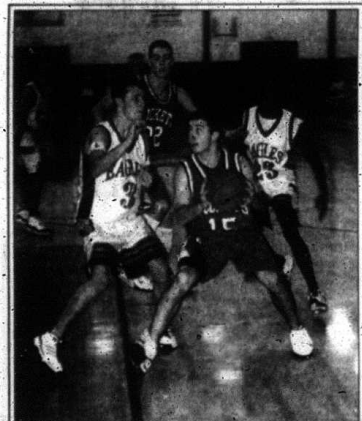
At Madison Southern Monday night, the Rockets came back from a desultory first half and a deficit score 24-23 to post their 13th win of the season 64-56.

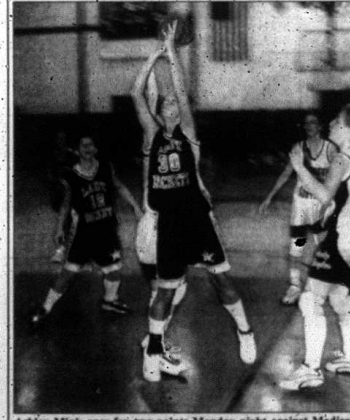

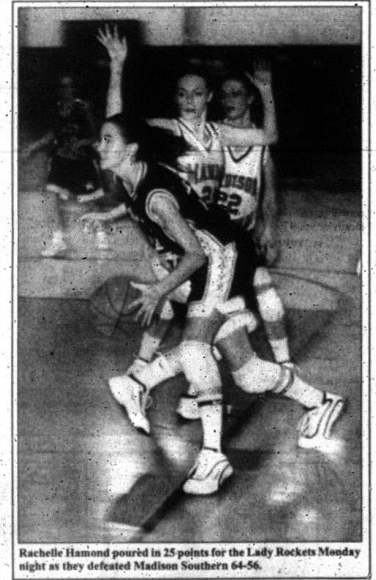

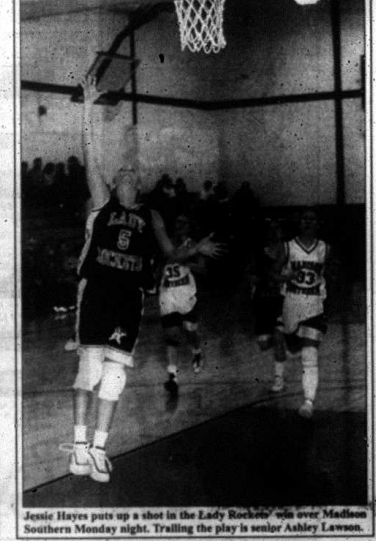

to realize that Dad's apology was not enough. The never had told Mom what really happened," she said angrily. "She still believes all he did was touch me a couple of times, and it was a lot more than that."

He has never really admitted what he did and how much he hurt me. I want him to come clean. I want him to tell the whole story."

Dad's forced apology was not enough, Jane needed for him to apologize to his crime.

Terry was in another abusive situation and he was the abuser. He had been abusive to his wife many times over the past three years. She had left him several times and gone to a shelter. Every time he called and said that he was sorry and promised her that it would never happen again.

"She wanted to believe that he would change, and she would accept his assurances and return home. Each time he was good to her for a few weeks, but then the abuse would begin again."

I met with Terry and listened to his story. He spent the first twenty minutes telling me how Mary was a

failure as a wife. His complaints were mainly that she did not keep the house clean and did not want to have sex with him.

Finally, I interrupted him to explain that he was not taking responsibility for his own actions. He had been abusive but he did not want to admit it. He did not even see what he had done as abuse.

I told Terry that in order to have even a possibility of changing he would have to educate it what he had done. I asked him to make a list of the ways that he had been abusive to Mary and then to share that list with me.

Since Mary had told me much of what had happened, I knew what needed to be on that list. Nothing less than full disclosure would do, I told him.

The important thing was not that Terry tell his counselor what he had done. The important thing was for Terry to be honest with himself about his abuse of Mary. Educating to his crime would be the beginning of taking responsibility for what he had done.

"I'm Sorry Is Not Enough"
That is not good enough. Your Honor," said Jack McCord. "The defendant must elucidate to his crimes." McCord is the prosecuting attorney on "Law and Order," still one of my favorite television shows.

I have learned from watching that show that it means for the defendant to disclose. In disclosing he confesses the defendant must admit the particular details of what he did, admit in open court the acts that he committed. Just pleading guilty is not enough.

There also are times outside of court when "I'm guilty" is not enough. At these times it is important for the offender to tell exactly what he or she did.

On some occasions this is true in the counseling situations in which I am involved. Following are two examples. While these are true situations, the identities have been changed.

Tom sexually abused his daughter Jane when she was a little girl. Now that she is an adult, she has suffered from depression because of that abuse.

When she became suicidal, she was hospitalized. When Jane first talked about the abuse, her father denied everything. "She's making that up," he told his wife. "She's asking me to believe what she says."

At first Mom did not believe Jane either, but as Jane provided more and more information about times and places, Mom began to have her doubts about Dad's denials.

After Mom confronted him several times, he finally admitted, "OK, I sexually abused her a couple of times, but nothing much really happened."

He and Mom met with Jane and her counselor, and Dad told Jane that he was sorry, without providing details.

As months went by, Jane began

I've had four bird feeders hung from the limbs of the two big persimmon and maple trees in my front yard ever since we moved into the place four years ago. Two are those long tubes that I fill up with thistle seed for finches and the other two are supposed to look miniature versions of something humans would live in except the roofs come off of I can dump in black oil sunflower seed, cracked corn and millet.

A fill-up in the finch feeders will last two or three weeks and keep the twenty or so finches that fly in little flocks of 5 or 7 happy and well nourished.

When they start running low I am awakened by loud twipping and peeping or whatever one calls the noise that finches make when they are fighting over who gets the last perch where feed is available.

The other two feeders hold about two quarts each but the feed doesn't last as long. At least two dozen species show up throughout the day. We even have wrens hanging around that are probably wondering why they didn't head to Carolina when the weather was nice enough to fly along with cardinals, jays, chickadees, nuthatches, phoebes, woodpeckers, sparrows, doves, and the ever present and despicable blackbirds and starlings.

There's a bunch of feathered friends who show up that I can't even find in the field guide that Jeni Hoofield gave me for Christmas. I'm content to gill them pretty birds when I can't make a positive identification and let it go at that.

The trouble is, my feeders often go forgotten. When there's snow on the ground they can get emptied in a matter of hours and if I don't fill them, the birds find a better offer. I'm not the only person in the neighborhood who buys bird feed fifty pounds at a time.

Anyway, a while back I was thumbing through a bird magazine and found a picture of a feeder based on a big platform with a bin that holds about half a bushel of seed at a time. It was mounted on a post in somebody's front yard and even

though there was not a pattern available, I allowed that I could use the picture and come up with something at least as large and functional.

So I took the picture out of the garage and established a set of good intentions which I shared with Rufus Harrison by way of the Instant Messenger thingamajig we both have on our computers. Rufus said he had more time on his hands than I did and I'd send him the picture he'd make it for me.

Somehow I misplaced the picture. I expect the wind blew it off the work bench where I placed it and landed among the piles of stuff I need to be rid of in my garage. It never even crossed my mind to look for it.

In fact, I don't think I'd even start looking for anything less than a \$500 reward.

Anyway I work a two later, Rufus said I'd told him enough about the feeder that he had taken the concept and run with it and that my feeder was finished except that he needed a few squares of roofing shingles to cover it.

Sunday afternoon I drove down to Woods Creek Lake and picked it up, after Rufus finished the roofing job. I haven't got it installed in the front yard yet because I've been hauling it all over the county showing it off and waiting around while folks make a few preliminary drawings so they can build their own.

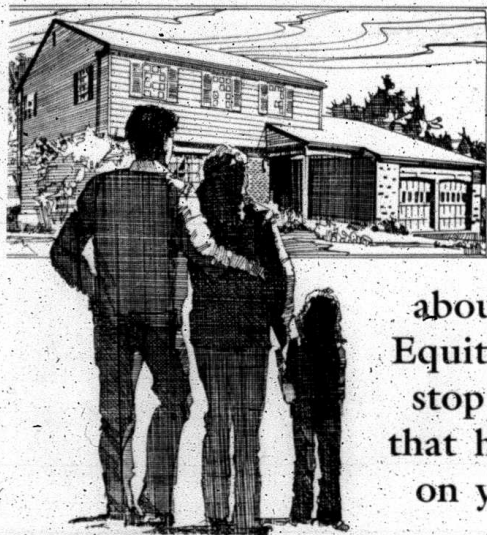
Rufus says that I should tell folks not to call and bother him because this is the first and last one he's building.
