Kirby and his current girlfriend Juniain McCormick Walkins, 30, also of Castle Village Apartments, were arrested on Monday by Brodhead City Police Officer William Harris.
Harris arrested the two after the Rockcastle 9II dispatch received a complaint.

Harris said that when he arrived at Castle Village, Kirby and Watkins were apparently making the illegal drug methamplietamine in a wooded area behind the apartment complex and that they had several of the ingredients used to make the illegal drug in

it.

The Rockeastle County Fiscal Court voted last week to take over ownership of the former Livingston Schöol property and to begin the necessary steps to put it back in condition for public use.

The school was closed in 1994 by the Rockeastle County Board of Education and has deteriorated and been heavily vandelized.

Daniel Boone Development Corporation bought the property in 1996 hanks to a \$42,000 state grant, but no work has been done on either structure.

Following is a time line of events surrounding the Livingston School: 1994: Rockcastle Board of Edu-cation close the Livingston School.

1994-1996: Livingston School property continues under ownership of the Board of Education. Board of Education becomes concerned about the future use of the structures and

the future use of the structures and the property's vandalism.

1996: Daniel Boone Development Board, Inc., with main office manachester, looks over the buildings and seeks ownership of the property. By state law, the School Board cannot hand over the property without just compensation.

July 1996: State Representative Damy Ford provides \$42,500 state flunding to Daniel Boone Development Council, Inc., to purchase the Livingston School property from School Board. Transaction is com-





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
