Both facilities produce a line of thermicformed containers for the foodservice industry with similar products that can be provided from a single plant. There currently are 25 hourly and 7 salaried employees at the qualitad plant. In making the announcement, Mike Roder, president, Reynolds Food Packaging, said "the closure is

the result of excess capacity. While it was a difficult decision to make," there just wasn't a need to continue to operate two plants producing simi-lar products when production can be andled by one facility. 

Taking Care of Fevers

What ishould you do when you child gets a feve checked right away or can it be treated with acetami-nophen or bhopycofen?". A forew is merely a symptom which means an infection or occasionally some other illuses is going on. Typically, the fever is low grade with viruses and higher with bacterial infection. Generally, the higher the fever, the worne the infection. However, some children will get a fever of 100 swith mild fectors and very sick children may have only mild fevers.



fevers. In infants under three months old, any fever should be considered serious, and be evaluated very prompty. In older chil-dren, a low grade fever with the synchical viral synchrons of a runny nose and cough may best be treated with acetaminophen or ibuprofen, decongertants and cough appressants. If a child has persistent or high fevers, or localized symptoms such as an earache or ios or throat, he should be examined to determine if anibotios are acache or ios or throat, he should be examined to determine if anibotios ser

eded

Once antibiotics and other specific therapies are started, it is wise to treat the fever to make the child more comfortable, help him rest better and help

avoid dehydration. Acetaminophen-or ibuprofen should be given on a regular basis to main-tain a therapeutic level. Sporge bathis may be helpful once the medicines have reset the "thermostat" in the brain. Always give plenty of fluids. Al-though aspirint is normally avoided in children with infections because of the risk of Reye's Syndrome, ibuprofen is safe, effective and long acting, mak-ing it a oppular choice.


