Board will decide on calendar Thursday

The Rockcastle Board of Educa-The Rockcastie Board of Educa-tion will decide mext Thursday on a calendar for the rest of the school year during a special called meeting beginning at 5 p.m.

School Superintendent Larry Hammond said this week he would present the board with several op-tions, including one that would ex-tend the school day for students. Hammond said the school system's calendar committee had come up with the final options and recommendations for the board to review last week.

The change in the calendar has been made necessary because of the number of days school has been dis-

on made necessary because of the inber of days school has been dis-sed because of inclement weather. To date, the school system has

missed twelve days and Hammond said that, because of the trend this winter, it is highly probable more days will be missed before winter is

over.

Hammond said that the calendar committee did not recommend students make-up any days during Spring Break but that would still be the final decision of the board.

Spring Break is scheduled for April 7-11 and even if the board does vote to go to school that week, the school system could only make up three days because of Kentucky Edu-

ion Association meetings.

Hammond said the recommenda Hammond said the recommenda-tion of the committee on the extended, day called for students to go 30 min-utes longer each day for 24 school days. He said that the committee also recommended going to school on Memorial Day and Election Day in

Rooster Fighting is what we called it on the holler:

These guys had converted old barns into areas and on Saturday nights they converged and encouraged game rooster to engage in mortal battle. They bet big money on the outcomes of these fights and I dare say that many a brother has lost everything he made in his coal company by betting on the wrong chicken. By living at the foot of the hill below the mines on 60 acres of Deech and poplar covered hilligide, my family had an ideal place for game chickens for roam and forage. Wed take in a rooster and a dozen-or more hers each from several miners, put them in the barn, teach them where the roost and turn them loose about this time of year. 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Silent Angina

Angins is a warning sign telling you to slow down and let the heart rest.

Although the reasons are not known, many people do not get these angina pains when the coronary circulation becomes tenuous. The person has no warning that he is over-extring. The angina is "sllent." Diabetics are particularly likely to have slent an signs. In fact, dathetics are likely to have selfent at tacks without even knowing it unless other sympto-

nicks without even knowing it unless other symptoms, such as shock or unjuftations, occur.

Although it is paintless, silent angins may be as significant as painful angins. And diagnosing silent angina is more difficult since the person does not know it is happening.

The two ways currently used to diagnose silent angins are treadmill testing and holter monitors. Of these, the treadmill is more helpful indignosing significant artery obstruction and prescribing an exercise regregam that is safe and appropriate for the degree of heart disease. Further studies, such as in angiogram, may be needed.

The holter monitor is a device that records all the heart-beats during a 24-hour period. The person keeps a diary of his activity level and any symptotis he develops. The symptoms are correlated with the findings on the recording. The holter monitor is an observable of the finding abnormal heart rhythms that may need medical attention.
