Everybody knows about appendicitis, but it is still a very diffidingnosis to make in finany cases.

Appendicitis is the first concern of parents when a child gets a six ash ach. But other causes, such as viral pastronmose causes of abdomital pain. The main problem with appendicitis is the risk of rupturing which can caises a life-threatening infection in the abdomen. A ruptured appendix commonly can occur within about 36 hours after the onset of pats, so a person should never delay when appendicitis is a possibility.

She speaks for the women who are hurt by the men in their lives with words to ugly to piu on paper. And she too ugly to put on paper. 
